The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

He lived on the Homestead in Westchester, Westchester Co., NY with his mother, and after her decease resided there till his death.

In 1744, he was appointed by the Propagation Society the Schoolmaster of the Parish of Westchester, under the Crown, which position he held for nineteen years.

He had no children by his first wife.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Basil Bartow, of the Borough Town of West Chester. After my just debts and funeral charges are paid I leave to my wife, Clarina Bartow, all the goods and chattels that are remaining which she brought with her, and was her own property, at or before our marriage, also two good feather beds, bedsteads, bedding, and furniture thereunto belonging, such as she shall choose, the sitting chairs, tables, looking-glasses, and china wear usually kept in the parlour, my riding chair and horse, and the sum of £800 in cash or bonds, to be paid to her within six months after my decease. I give to my wife the use of the room called the parlour, and the chamber over it, in my now dwelling house, the use of the northwest part of the cellar as partitioned off, the use of such part of the kitchen for her wench to live in and do her work in, the use of the east side of the garden and peach orchard on a southerly line from the north gate, as the middle walk now runs to Quinby's orchard fence, her firewood, and apples for eating and cider for her own use, liberty of the wells and liberty to pass

and repass to and from the several places of privileges without molestation or hindrance, also pasture for two cows and a horse, during her natural life or as long as she remains my widow and no longer, and is in lieu of her Right of Dower. Unto my daughter Clarina £800, a negro girl called Jude, one feather bed, bedstead, bedding and furniture thereunto belonging; also one third part of my religious books, and household furniture not otherwise disposed of, and the privilege of her living in my now dwelling house with her mother or brother during her natural life or until marriage. My executors to pay the principal and interest of the money to her when she shall be twenty-one years old. Unto my son Punderson, all the lands, buildings and salt meadow which I bought of Sarah Hunt and her son Gilbert; also the lot of salt meadow called the Parsonage meadow; also the lot of land, and buildings thereon, called "Haddens Lott," which I bought of my brother, John Bartow; also the lot of land adjoining thereto which I bought of Duncan Reade; also a lot of woodland lying at north part of Cowswamp, adjoining to my brother John's land; also one half of two lots of upland and two water lots at New York, belonging to my brother, John Bartow, and self, and which we hold of the Devises of Abraham Vanhorne and the Corporation of New York (the water lots were granted to my brother, John Bartow, and the half part of them, by him, released to me) together with one half of the improvements that may be made thereon; also half of my right of the lands on Minefords Island, or the new City so called; also my equal half part of a fourth part of a farm at the nine partners, belonging to my brother and self, which we bought of George Bugbee; also one third part of my religious books and household furniture, not otherwise disposed of, and the sum of £200. Unto my son, Basil John Bartow, all my lands called Homestead, with the buildings and improvements made thereon (excepting a piece of land in the field on the hill adjoining the old orchard of three rods square, two rods in the field westward and one rod eastward into the orchard as it is staked out for a burying ground for myself, my children, and their heirs, brothers, and their families, if they choose to bury there, which I hereby give and grant for the aforesaid use of a burying ground for ever, with the privilege of passing to and from the King's Road through the old orchard to the said burying ground without molestation or hindrance); also my lands and salt meadow called below, and the lot of land known by the name of Scabby Indian, being all the lands and meadows devised to my brothers and self by our deceased father, and which are now vested in me solely by a release of right from my brothers to me, together with a £25 privilege of commonage in the sheep pasture of West Chester; also the lands called and known by the name of "The Personage Land," and the lands I bought of John Oakley, and the lot of land and salt meadow called the Causeway lot adjoining the Great Creek, and the lot I bought of Hester Nichools, all in the Borough Town of West Chester, and also one half of two lots of upland, two water lots at New York; also an equal half part of one fourth part of the farm at the nine partners, belonging to my brothers and self, which we bought of George Bugbee, also the one half of my right in the lands on Minefords Island; also one third of my religious books and household furniture, not before disposed of. I give to the Minister, Church Wardens and Vestrymen, of the Church of England, known by the name of St. Peter's Church, in the Borough Town of West Chester, £50 towards building a new church in said Borough Town, or repairing and enlarging the present church, to be paid to them when they shall actually engage in such work. My executrix and executors are to sell any part of my personal estate not herein disposed of, together with the shop goods, for the best prices they can get, and the proceeds and the outstanding debts due to me and the other moneys remaining after the foregoing legacies are paid, be put out at interest for the use of my two sons, Punderson and Basil John, the principal and interest thereof to be paid to them when of age. If my daughter Clarina should die without lawful issue before she attain the age of twenty-one years, the moneys I have given to her I give to my two sons, Punderson and Basil John. My wife Clarina shall have the use of my real estate for herself and my children's support and maintenance. The remainder of my estate whatsoever not herein before disposed of (after my just debts and funeral charges are paid) I give to my said two sons, Punderson and Basil John. My earnest desire and request is that my wife, Clarina Bartow, and my executors do take an especial care that my children be virtuously and religiously educated and kept from associating with vain and idle company, and that they be careful to have them learned to read, write, and cypher, and such branches of the mathematicks and literature as may qualify them for some necessary and useful employment in the world. I make my wife Clarina, executrix, my brother, John Bartow, my nephew, John Bartow, son of Theophilus Bartow, and the Reverend Samuel Seabury, executors. Dated December 16, 1780. Witnesses, Theophilus Bartow, William Bartow, yeoman, Augustus Bartow. Proved, December 17, 1781.

James Bartow, 44, farmer, and Mary Ann Bartow, 46, his wife, were listed in the 1880 Federal Census, living in Washington Township. Living with them were their daughters: Cornelia Maria, 17; and Sarah S., 14. Also living with them was John Monroe, 24, laborer.

James and Mary Bartow were listed in the 1885 New Jersey State Census, living in Washington Township (Chestnut Ridge), Bergen County, NJ. Listed with them were: Cornelis Bartow and Sarah L. Bartow.

James Bartow, 63, Farmer & Basket Manufacturer, and Mary A. E. Bartow, 66, his wife, were listed in the 1900 Federal Census, living in the Borough of Saddle River, Bergen County, NJ in a house they owned. His parents had been b. NJ; her father b. Portugal, her mother b. Rhode Island. Listed with them were their daughters: Cornelia M., 37, single, housekeeper; and Sarah L., 34, single, basket maker.

Mary Ann Bartow, 70, was listed in the 1905 New Jersey State Census, living in Waldwick, Bergen County, NJ with the family of Charles Wramage, her son-in-law, and his wife, Sarah L. Wramage.

In his will, he wrote:....January 24, 1725. I, John Bartow, of the Borrough Town of Westchester "Clerk," being sick and weak in body but of sound and perfect memory, "Praises be given to God therefor." I leave to my wife, Helena, one third of my personal estate, my debts and funeral expenses to be paid out of the rest. Provided that whereas John Marsh of Westchester, boatman, in consideration of my being bound for him, He and his wife Rosamond mortgaged to me April 6, 1722, a certain home lot in Westchester, and a £25 right of Commonage; If they do not pay all such obligations, I direct my executors to sell the said lot and privilege, and the money to be applied towards paying my debts. My wife is to have the use of all the rest of my personal estate during her life or widowhood, and after her decease to my 6 sons, Thomas, Theophilus, Theodorus, John, Anthony, and Basil. In consideration of my wife bringing up my children, I give her the use of my dwelling house and homestead and all my land joining thereto, and all my land at the place called Scabby Indian, bounded southeast by land of John Williams, west by the country road, north by the road that goes to Thomas Hadden's saw mill, and by Daniel Turner's land; Also 2 acres of land lying within said Daniel Turner's land; Also my orchard land and salt and fresh meadows, at the place commonly called "below," which was formerly Edward Colliers, Daniel Hustis, and Horseman Molyneux; Also a £25 privilege of Commonage in Westchester, during her life. I also leave to her until my son John comes of age, the use of all such part of my land in Westchester which I lately purchased of David Hustis, Nathaniel Underhill, Daniel Clark, Thomas Hadden, and John Hustis, which I have not already let out on lease. I leave to my son, John Bartow, all those tracts of land I lately bought as above, and a £25 privilege of Commonage, and all my right in a tract called the Long Reach, and 4 acres of salt meadow which i bought of James Ferris, by deed dated January 15, 172 3/4; Also my land and meadow at Barnegate in East New Jersey, being 60 acres; Also 1/4 of 1/2 of 1/16 of 1/24 of a Propriety in East New Jersey, granted by Gawen Drummond to John Reid, Sr., and by said Reid to me, I also give him my least gold ring, and a new English Bible in Quarto. I leave to my son Theophilus my saw mill in Monmouth County, New Jersey, and all my tracts of land and purchases adjoining, containing about 1,000 acres; Also 1/24 of 1/10 of 1/24 of a Propriety in East New Jersey, granted by Marcus Campbell to John Reid, Sr., and by him to me; Also my heaviest gold ring, and an English Bible in Quarto. I leave to my son Thomas all my tract of land in Monmouth County, New Jersey, on Millstone brook, joining to Colonel Anderson's land, containing 1,100 acres, which was granted to me and my wife Helena, by my father in law, John Reid, by deed dated November 10, 1705; Also 1/2 of 1/40 of a Propriety in East New Jersey, granted to me by said John Reid, by deed dated April 4, 1714; Also all my Greek and Latin books, and a new English Bible in Quarto. I leave to my son Theodorus, all my tract of land in Monmouth County, New Jersey, on the East Branch, containing 500 acres, joining to James Edwards; Also all my meadow on the south side of said Branch, from the lower end of the timber swamp down to the mouth of said Branch; Also all my tract of Indian Purchase land, to the northward of this tract. Also 1/4 of 1/2 of 1/16 of 1/24 of a Propriety in East New Jersey, granted by Gawen Drummond to John Reid, Sr., and by him to me; Also my other gold ring, and a new English Bible in Quarto. I leave to my son Anthony, all my tract of land on Monlapan river, beginning at the head of Mount Brook, and runs thence southeast 52 chains, thence North northwest to the land of Robert Barclay, then southwest to said river, where said Mount Brook falls into said river, then up the stream of said brook to where it begun; Also that tract of my Indian Purchase land, joining on the south to my son Thomas' land; Also 1/4 of 1/2 of 1/16 of 1/24 of a Propriety in East New Jersey, granted by Gawen Drummond to John Reid, Sr., and by him to me, And a new English Bible in Quarto. I leave to my son Basil all my tract of land in Middlesex County, New Jersey on South river, containing 450 acres, and 60 acres of salt marsh in the roundabout meadow; Also 1/4 of 1/2 of 1/16 of 1/24 of a Propriety in East New Jersey, granted by Gawen Drummond to John Reid, Sr., and by him to me; Also my tract of Indian Purchase land called Price Hill, and a new English Bible in Quarto. All the rest of my lands and buildings, after my wife's decease, I leave to my six sons equally, And all my English books to them and my wife. And whereas James Miller lays claim to part of my land in New Jersey, and has offered to sell to me his right for £100, my executors are to pay for the same. I make my wife Helena and William Forster, executors. Witnesses, Thomas Madden, William Thompson, Daniel Turner. Proved, April 1, 1727.

25 June 1753 (Westchester Co. Land Record, Liber G, p. 561) -- An indenture between the heirs of John Bartow, dec'd, June 25, 1753. Whereas the sd. Theodosius is dec'd. and hath left a daughter under age...Whereas since making and executing the foregoing Indenture, our mother, Helena Bartow, is dec'd, and we, the sd. Thomas Bartow, John Bartow, and Anthony Bartow, and also Theophilis Bartow, hereby confirm the same (deed) to our nrother Theophilus Bartow. April 29, 1763.¹
