

-- BUDD --

The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolution of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

In his will, he wrote: May 27, 1722. I, Joseph Budd, of Rye, in the County of Westchester, Esq., being sick. I leave to my wife Sarah the use of one half of my house, barn and orchards, And one half of all my lands and meadows and orchards which are situate in Rye, on the west side of Blind Brook, between Westchester Old road and the Sound, Also a certain piece of land to the northward of Westchester Old road, lying between the land of Colonel Caleb Heathcote and John Horton, Except that parcel of salt meadow on the east side of a certain ditch, at the going on to the Little neck, the which runs down from the Fresh meadows, through the salt meadows, and so into the Little creek neck, Also my salt meadow on the south side of Little neck, Also all that my piece of salt meadow lying at the place called the Hole, at the west end of said Little neck. And my wife is to have the use of said lands (except as above) until my son, John Budd, is 30 years of age, or until she marries. I also leave to my son John the other two thirds of all my houses, lands and meadows before mentioned, except the three pieces of salt meadow, And he is to pay the following legacies, viz: To my sons Joseph, Elisha, Underhill and Gilbert, each £10 when of age. I also leave to my son John, when he is 30 years of age, the house and buildings, the use of which is left to my wife Sarah. I leave to my son Joseph all my piece of salt meadow on the east side of the ditch, as above mentioned, Also all that my certain piece of land lying on Causeway ridge, in the White Plains Purchase, as bounded by marked trees, Also £10 in money. I leave to my son Elisha all that piece of salt meadow on the south side of Little neck, and all my other land in the White Plains Purchase, Also £10 in money. And they are to take possession immediately after my decease. I leave to my son, Underhill Budd, all that my piece of salt meadow lying at a place called the Hole, on the west side of Little neck, And 10 in money. My executors are to sell all my lands and meadows in the town of Rye on the east side of Blind Brook, and the money is to be put at use for the benefit of my son Gilbert till he is of age. I leave to my daughter, Hannah Palmer, 1 cow and 10 sheep. My executors are to sell the rest of my personal estate, and the money to be put at use for my four daughters, Sarah, Anne, Tamar and Mary. I make my wife Sarah and John Stevenson and Samuel Purdy executors. Witnesses, David Ogden, Daniel Purdy, William Foster. Proved, June 28, 1722.

Bounded E by driftway; S by said William Budd; W by land now or formerly belonging to Ezekiel Ball; N by said Nathaniel Boilston. Signed by Nathaniel Boyston, Abby Boyleston. Witnessed by Abraham Dodd, Elias Winans.¹

In 1738, Underhill Budd of White Plains, exchanged with Henry Fowler (the 4th), his brother-in-law, of Mamaroneck, his 120 acres of land in White Plains, for Henry Fowler's land in Mamaroneck (White Plains, Liber G, p. 253).¹

In his will, he wrote: ...May 10, 1755. I, Underhill Budd, of Mamaroneck, in Westchester County, being weak in body. I leave to my wife Sarah her choice of bed and furniture, and a horse and side saddle, 1/4 of my movables, and £100, and the use of my dwelling house, and all estate until my son Gilbert is 21, "and she shall be at the expense of maintaining my son Gilbert and to give him good Learning." I leave to my son Gilbert the reversion of all my lands and houses. If he dies, my executors are to sell all houses and lands and pay the money to my wife and my 3 daughters. I leave to my son Gilbert £35, to purchase a negro when he is of age, also all my wearing apparell and my gun, sword, and cane, and a horse of £14 value, with bridle and saddle. I give to my daughter Sarah, wife of Andrew Lyon, over and above what I have already provided for her, £40 and 1/4 of movables. To my daughter, Thamer Budd, 1/4 of movables, and to my daughter, Mary Budd, 1/4 when she is 18. I make my wife Sarah and Captain John Gedney, of the Manor of Scarsdale, executors. Witnesses, James Horton, yeoman, I. Wetmore, "Clerk," Anne Griffin. Proved, May 31, 1755.

On 30 March 1805 (recorded 8 October 1805, Bergen Co. V:422) Jonathan Mulford of Barbadoes Neck and Phebe, his wife, conveyed to William Budd of the same place, for \$359.80, 8-97/100 acres in S end of said Barbadoes Neck, beginning SE corner of Nathaniel Boileston's land. Bounded N by Nathaniel Boileston; E by Wm. Halsey, Esq. and said Jonathan Mulford. Signed by Jonathan Mulford, Phebe Mulford (her mark). Witnessed by Thomas Ward.¹
