The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolution of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

In one or two instances he signed his name Claes Cornelise van Voorhout, but it seems that in most cases he did not use "Van Voorhout."

In the NYC Ref Ch record of their marriage banns, they were: Claes Corneliszen Van Voorhout, en Brechtie Marius, j.d. Van N. Nederlt.

They lived on a farm on Papscaanee Island, near Albany, from 1648 to 1658.

He was accidentally killed in a brawl by Andries Herpertsen in 1662.

1663/4, Feb 1 -- Agreement of the guardians of the minor children of Claes Corneliszen van Voorhout and Brechtie Maryns with Jan Tyssen, second husband of the late Brechtie Maryns, regarding said children's inheritance ... for themselves and herein representing and undertaking for Lysbet Tyssz, mother of the late Brechtie Maryns, late wife of said Claes van Voorhout, and in that capacity as guardians related by blood of the four children left by him, Claes Corneliszen, named Maryn

In his will, he wrote: ...February 23, 1762. I, Nicholas Eggmont, of Coxackie, in Albany County, yeoman, "being reduced to a weak state of health, by age and other infirmities. I direct all debts to be paid. I leave to my well beloved step-grandson, Anthony Winnie, all my estate, real and personal, in the County of Albany or elsewhere, That is, all my ands, houses, etc., To him and his heirs and assigns. I leave to my loving niece, Marytie Van Valkenburgh, daughter of my loving sister, Anettie Schermerhorn, the painted press and 3 largest cups standing thereon. I leave to my sister, Anettie Schermerhorn, my negro wench "Boggie," "and my brass kettle, of about 7 pails measure." I leave to her son, Luke Schermerhorn, all my apparell, both linnen and woolen. "I leave to Marytie, wife of Matys Boon, the Bed and Bedding whereon I may happen to Dye." "I leave to the Poor of the Protestant Church of Coxackie £15." I make Anthony Winnie, and Anthony Van Bergen, and Jan L. Bronck, executors. "Done in my dwelling house in Coxackie." Witnesses, Anthony Van Bergen, Henry Van Bergen, Jacob Freeze. Proved in Albany, April 17, 1762.

Cornelis Seger Van Voorhout/Van Egmont (his "surname" is found both ways in records) was the first of this family in America. His sons used "Egmont/Van Egmont" as a surname; and in the third generation, the family began to use "Segers" as their surname. The name is also found written Seegers, or Sagers.¹

Cornelis Segerse Van Voorhoudt, the immigrant, came to Beverwyck in 1642. The family of Cornelis and Bregje plus 3 sons and 3 daus arrived in Rensselaerswyck in 1643.

Cornelis Segertsen van egmont, farmer, about 44 years of age, made a contract 25 Aug 1643 with Patroon Kilian Van Rensselaer, binding himself and his wife and six children with his wife Brechtgeb, 45, and children Cornelis, 22; Claes, 20; Seger Cornelissen, 14; Lysbeth, 16; Jannetje, 10; and Neeltje, 8. He signed with his own hand; hus wife signed by mark. They sailed from Amsterdam in Sep 1643, on *het Wapen Van Rensselaerswyck*. Upon his arrival in Rensselaerswyck, he at once took up the farm formerly occupied by Brant Peelen, deceased, which was one of the two farms on Castle Island, near Albany. In 1646 he took over, from Adrian Vanderdonck, the other farm for the remaining three years of its lease, and thus came into possession of the entire island. An inventory, taken in 1651, showed him to be the owner of 13 horses and 22 cows, and that the farm contained 70 morgens (140 acres), the rent being 1210 guilders. The farm was called Welysburgh.¹

In a Rensselaer Oath of Allegiance to the Patroon in 1651, signed by 42 residents, one of the signers was Cornelis Segersz Van Voorhout.

He lived at or near Albany, NY. He is mentioned several times in "The Early Records of the City and County of Albany and Colony of Rensselaerswyck 1656-1675" by Jonathan Pearson -- an auction for a house and lot in 1657 where Cornelis was the highest bidder, buying a cow in 1664, highest bidder on a mare in 1665, house and land document of 1659 - here he signs his name "Cornelis Zeegerzoon" which is a variant of the patronymic Seegersz, house and land document of 1660 - here he signs "Cornelis Seegerzeen", Cornelise Cornelise Van Voorhoudt is a witness for a 1668 document.

In a document in *Early Records of the City and County of Albany and Colony of Rensselaerswyck*, Vol. 3, translated by Jonathan Pearson, edited by A.J.F. Van Laer, p. 166, dated 27 June 1662, the relatives of the late Seger Cornelissen van Voorhout, agree not to prosecute Andries Herbetsen Constapel for his part in the death.

He lived at or near Albany, NY. He is mentioned several times in "The Early Records of the City and County of Albany and Colony of Rensselaerswyck 1656-1675" by Jonathan Pearson -- an auction for a house and lot in 1657 where Cornelis was the highest bidder, buying a cow in 1664, highest bidder on a mare in 1665, house and land document of 1659 - here he signs his name "Cornelis Zeegerzoon" which is a variant of the patronymic Seegersz, house and land document of 1660 - here he signs "Cornelis Seegerzeen", Cornelise Cornelise Van Voorhoudt is a witness for a 1668 document.

Cornelis Segerse Van Voorhout was involved in slander charges and assault charges in 1648, 1649 and 1650. His son Cornelis was charged with fighting in 1649 and 1650 (in this one he pulled a knife); his son Claes was killed in 1658 in a tavern brawl and his son Seger was killed in 1662.²

In 1663, they made a joint will, she being then indisposed, and mentioned the following ch., all living save Claas: Cornelis, Claas, Seger, Jannetje, w. of Jacob Janse Schermerhoorn; Neeltje, w. of Hans Carelse Noorman; and Lysbeth, w. of Francis Boon.²

In the will of Cornelis Segersen van Voorhout and wife, dated 22 Nov. 1663 (or 1662). Cornelis Segersz van Voorhout, husbandman, and Brechie Jacob's daughter, his wife, dwelling in the colony of Rensselaerswyk name their children: Cornelis Cornelissz van Voorhout; Lysbet Cornelis wife of Mr. Francois Boon, Jannetie Cornelis wife of Jacob Schermerhorn; Neeltie Cornelis wife of Hans Carelssz, and the children of Claes Cornelissz van Voorhout deceased.

Cornelis, son of Cornelis Segerse, sometimes signed his name Cornelis Cornelise Van Voorhout, undoubtedly to distinguish himself from others by the name of Cornelis Cornelise. After his death, he family moved from the Albany area to New Amsterdam.

Cornelis Egmont was a witness to the will of a John Stuard of Elizabethtown, NJ in 1720 and was mentioned as having accounts due him in 1715 in connection with the inventory of the estate of John Spencer, Woodbridge, NJ.

He appears, from the existing records, to have been a contentious individual prone to drinking and fighting; his own brother Claes testified against him on one occasion. In at least one record he was called Seger Cornelissen Wip.

He died 24 June 1662 of a knife wound inflicted the day before in the tavern of Athonis Jansz in Albany, by Andries Herebertsz [Herpertsen] Constapel.
