The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

Jan Aertsen arrived in New Amsterdam on 12/23/1660 aboard the ship De Trouw. He was listed as unaccompanied. He was known as "Jan of the Ferry" (Brooklyn). He lived at the Ferry, Brooklyn.

Jan's first marriage was contracted in the 1660's to an unnamed woman which produced a son, John, born therefore between 1661 when Jan arrived and 1672 when he married Ariaentje (Bleijck). This son John married Ida Suydam (1678-), daughter of Hendrick Suydam and Ida Jacobs. (no marriage record to this woman or baptismal record for the son John has been found. But...Jan does name him in his will.) From the will: "eldest son John, to whom £50 is to be paid in 6 years by the sons of his second marriage, Aert, Mattewis (sic) and David...." These 3 boys were the issue of Ariaentje. This paragraph (Margery's writings) goes on to say that the son John, called himself John Harrison. He moved to Raritan, NJ and with Ida, had a son named Ouke Harrison bpt. 22 Nov. 1724.

8 Aug 1692 -- at a meeting of the NYC Common Council -- That Whereas the Citty hath lett to ffarme the fferry to John Arsen for Seuerall yeares to come and the Said Arsen hath applyed himself to the Mayor and Comonalty of this Citty complaining of Derrick Janzen Cornelius Seabrook and others that they make a dayly practice of bringing other passengers and Corn from Long Island to this Citty greatly to the prejudice of the Said ffarmer. Ordered that no person besides the fferryman shall bring any passengers or Corne or any other produce of the Island from any place between the red hooke and the Wall about but shall forfeit for euvery such offence the Sume of twenty Shillings one halfe to the Vse of the fferry man and the other to such officer of this Citty or others that shall informe of the breach of this order.⁴

In Jan and Feb 1695, John Aerson and his wife Elizabeth, of Brooklyn, were involved in a series of deeds and mortgages for property apparently inherited from Cornelis de Potter.

In his will dated 11 Aug 1707 and proved 6 June 1709 he wrote: John Aerson. In the name of God, Amen, the 11 August, 1707, I, John Aerson, of the Ferry, in the township of Brookland in Kings County, on the Island of Nassau, being of good and perfect memory, I leave to my wife Elizabeth, the house where I now live at the Ferry, and all my garden, and one half of my orchard, and a horse to ride, at her pleasure, during her life. And she is to have two cows to be kept with fodder and pasture, winter and summer, and my farm at the Ferry, with firewood and bread corn, and liberty to keep fowls, and £10 yearly, and a negro girl. I leave to my children, Aert, Matthew, and David, after my wife's decease, all my houses, lands and tenements lying and being at the Ferry in the township of Brookland, bounded south by the lot of Adriaen Hoogland, formerly George Jacobs, north by the river, east by a creek, adjoining to John Reportes land, and west by the highway leading from Brookland to the Ferry. Containing about 200 acres of land and meadow. And also all my lands in the county of Somerset in New Jersey. I leave to my youngest son John, £50. I leave to my daughter Helena, after my wife's decease, all that my house and garden spot at the Ferry, wherein my son David now lives. I leave all goods and chattels to my sons, Aert, Matthew, and David. I leave all my negroes to my said sons, and two of the old negroes, Sambo and his wife Mary, are to stay on the farm, and are not to be sold, and they are to have every Saturday afternoon to work for themselves. I make my sons, Aert, Matthew, and David, executors. Witnesses, Henry Filkin, John Evertse, Josias Crego. Proved before Thomas Wenham, June 8, 1706. (should be 6 Jun 1709).

Bounded NW by Passaic River and land of widow Harrison; SW by lands of said widow Harrison; SE by lands of said John Ennis; NE by lands late of Joseph Kingsland and Teunis Brown. Signed by Joseph Harrison, Phebe Harrison. Witnessed by Rufus Harrison, William Pelham Wood.¹
