The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

Benjamin Heuileind and Abigaile, his wife, were listed in the 1698 List of inhabitants of . Listed living with them were Adam, Benjamin, John, Abigale, and Bethia. Two families after him were John Heuiland & Sarah, his wife, and John.<sup>1</sup>

March 26, 1694. Benjamin Haviland bought of William Beanes sometimes called Bengs, his "brother-in-law" 6 gates of fence and all the land on Cow Neck. Witnessed by James Clement, Sr. and Jr. Sworn to before Thomas Hicks, Sept. 17, 1694.

From the Hempstead records: William Beans bought land of Joseph Bettels, April 1, 1692, the same as above and called Benjamin Haviland, brother-in-law. William calls himself of Flushing and in the first transaction his name is first spelled Beanes, possibly Beans and later Bengs. There seems to have been considerable difficulty deciphering this name from the original records and the census of 1698 spells it Benger and mentions besides William, the wife Elizabeth with sons, John, Jacob and daughter Elizabeth, thus adding another spelling. Perhaps the name is now Banks or perhaps Banker or Bunker.

The above land which Benjamin Haviland purchased of William Bengs, he sold to Thomas Banks, Nov. 17, 1694; wit-

nessed by Charles Hicks and William Bengs.

March 8, 1697/8. Benjamin Haviland and John Esmond both of Flushing purchased of William Hedges for 20 pounds, land, lying on ye Littel Neck Hill, fronting westerly by ye highway, rearing easterly upon Lot 27, northerly upon Lot 13 and southerly upon lot 16. Proved April 23, 1697 before Thomas Hicks, Justice of the Peace. Entered by James Clement.

In 1701 he is mentioned in the Journal of John Bowne as having done one and one half day's work mowing.

In 1711 a list of provisions owned by each family was taken and Benjamin Haviland is mentioned.

March 3, 1705, in the Friends' records he desires a certificate for William Beanes and the same year he is mentioned as being upon a committee to wait on Henry Franklin.

Dec. 4, 1711. Benjamin Haviland and wife Abigail sell to Theodorus Van Wyck of Mad Nan's Neck, 60 acres for 130 pounds "above said at ye little Neck and near of ye bay, bounded and limoted as follows, beginning at ye meadow at ye head of ye bay, running thence along ye land of Jacob Haviland, ye road and land of Benjamin Haviland, Jr. eastwardly by ye land of Johannis Van Wick northwardly by ye land of Johannis Van Wyck and land of Col. Hicks and westwardly by ye cove and meadow of Jacob Haviland and meadow of Samuel Thorne and ye meadow of John Esmond." Signed Benjamin Haviland (His mark) and by Abigail Haviland. Witnessed by Nicolas Haight and Wm. Bloodgood. May 1, 1712 there appeared before William Bloodgood, Esq. one of her Majesties Justices of the Peace for Queens Co., Benjamin Haviland and Abigail his wife and swore to the above sale. Entered Nov. 2, 1712.

Dec. 27, 1711, just twenty-three days after he sold out in Flushing he purchased of John Yates for 160 pounds, 400 acres in Rye, Westchester Co., N. Y. Recorded Sept. 1, 1718. The original deed yet exists and is owned (1894) by John Haviland of Plainfield, N. J., who says that Benjamin in 1724 built the first frame house in Purchase, N. Y., all others previous to that time being of logs. This house was burned during the Revolution. It stood at the top of the hill on the Old Purchase road above the house of Charles and Phebe Carpenter. (June 14, 1700, Caleb Heathcote sold a two story frame house, shingled and with a brick chimney to Joseph Haviland, which was located in Westchester.)

Benjamin Haviland bought 27 Dec 1711, 200 acres in Rye (Harrison's Purchase) for £160. He became a Friend in Flushing as early as 1701, and was a Minister in that Society.

In a document from Liber F, p. 1, Land Records of Westchester Co., NY: 10 May 1724, Benjamin Heveland of Rye, yeoman, to son Adam Haveland of ye same place, yeoman, land in Harrison Purchase in Rye bordered on the west by the Mararoneck river.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Benjamin Haviland, of the town of Oyster Bay, in Queens County, yeoman, being this 8 day of June, 1751, weak in body. I leave to my wife Jane the choice of beds and bed furniture, and 6 dishes, 3 platters, 6 plates, 3 iron pots, a brass kettle, 1 horse, 2 cows, 10 sheep and 2 good swine, and all provisions of meat and bread corn for one year; and then all my lands and the rest of my movable estate to be sold and turned into money by my executors. Of the proceeds, my wife is to have the use of 1/3, and the other 2/3 to be put at use for my children. And my executors are to bring up my children and to give them learning according to their circumstances. I leave to my eldest son Benjamin £10, when of age, and the rest to my children, John, Luke, Joseph, and Jane. I leave to my wife her riding saddle, and I make her and my brother, Luke Haviland, of Great Neck, in the town of Hempstead, and John Bergen, my cousin, of Jamaica, executors. Witnesses, John Cheshire, Jane Cornelius, Samuel Willis. Codicil, July 29, 1751. Confirms the above will and leaves to his wife £10. The executors are to sue all trespassers on the estate and to defend suits. Witnesses, Theodorus Colyer, John Cheshire, Samuel Willis. Proved, August 21, 1751.

The will of Jane, signed by her mark, dated Oct. 16, 1780, and proven Jan. 21, 1781, mentions as follows: grand-daughter Sarah Smith, a black cloak; Jean Smith, grand-daughter, silver shoe buckles; son-in-law Silvanus Smith; daughters of son Joseph, Jane, Jerusha, Jemima, Phebe and Hannah; leaves son Joseph, her gold sleeve buttons; son John.

In a document from Liber E, p. 328, Land Records of Westchester Co., NY: 18 March 1730, Benjamin Haviland, an infant under 21, is admitted by Thomas Haviland of Westchester, blacksmith, his Guardian, in our Court of Common Pleas.

In his will, dated May 21, 1759 and proved Jan 14, 1761, he wrote: In the name of God, Amen, May 21, 1759. I, Benjamin Haviland, of the town of Rye, in Westchester County, yeoman, "being indisposed and not well in body." All debts and charges for settling my estate to be paid out of my movable estate. I leave to my wife Charlotte the use of all lands and tenements in Rye, during the time she remains my widow, or until my youngest son John is of age, for her support, and the bringing up of my children. I also leave her my best bed, and bedstead, and £30. I leave to my sons, Benjamin, Roger, and Daniel, all my part of the Lot in the Oblong No. 16, being 450 acres, he my right more or less. I leave to my four other sons, Thomas, Solomon, Isaac, and John, all my lands and tenements in Rye, the same to be sold by my executors when my youngest son is of age, and the proceeds divided among them. I leave to my eldest son Benjamin one brown mare, in full bar to his claim as eldest son or heir. I leave to my eldest daughter (not named) £50, and to my other three daughters, Sophia, Charlotte, and Sarah, each £30, when they are of age or married. To my son Roger one bay mare. I make my wife, and my brother Solomon Haviland, and my brother-in-law Thomas Parker, executors. Witnesses, James Haviland, Ebenezer Haviland, John Carhart. Proved, January 1, 1761. [NOTE.--The Lot No. 16 in the Oblong is in the town of Southeast, in Putnam County, and is well known as "Haviland Hollow." The old Quaker meeting-house built by the sons is yet standing about half a mile south of the Hollow, but no "Friends" now remain to hold meetings in it. Many of the descendants of this family are now in Greene County, New York. See Pelletreau's History of Putnam County.--W. S. P.]

First intentions of marriage at Purchase Monthly Meeting 12 of 12 mo., 1776; second intentions 9 of 1 mo., 1777; m. at Mamaroneck 16 of 1 mo., 1777. He parents, Benjamin and Abigail (Stevenson) Cornell were of Scarsdale, Benjamin Cornell being deceased at time of marriage.

One Benjamin Haviland of Purchase Monthly Meeting, on 12 of 9 mo., 1776, "sent a paper to this meeting condemning his past misconduct in being concerned in a horse race and bearing arms." From Purchase Monthly Meeting, under date of March 14, 1782: "Benjamin Haviland has so far given way to passion and a wrong spirit in a difference with one of his neighbors as to kick him whereby he was much hurt, for which he hath been laboureth with and waited upon from time to time by this meeting without the desired effect and he is hereby disowned."

On June 3, 1784, recorded June 26, 1784, Benjamin and wife Anne sell John Haviland, in Harrison's Purchase, land left him by his father John, deceased, being one-quarter part of 219 acres.

Oct. 11, 1792, the minutes of the Purchase Monthly Meeting have the following: "Anne Haviland, wife of Benjamin removed some time past with two sons Samuel and William (who with their mother are members of this meeting) to settle with her husband are gone so far north as to be at least one hundred and fifty miles from Saratoga the nearest Monthly Meeting to them."

Some of the descendants of Benjamin say he settled in Danville, Vt., in 1815.

He bought of his father, 4 Sep 1724, 130 acres in Harrison's Purchase, for £80. He removed to the town of Westchester about 1729. His will mentions "watch and seal with Coat of Arms" to wife Phebe until son Ebenezer comes of age of 21 years.

In his will, he wrote: In the name of God, Amen I Ebenezer Haviland of the borough town of Westchester, Esquire, being much indisposed in body but of sound mind memory and understanding thanks be to God therefor do make my last will and testament in manner and form following; but first I commend my soul unto the hands of God that gave it and my body to the earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my executors hereinafter named and as touching my worldly estate I do dispose thereof as follows-- First I will that my executors do in some short time after my decease take a true inventory of all my movable estate. Second if I should leave any barrels of pork and gammons at the time of my decease I order my executors to sell the same as soon as possible and to pay off several creditors to whom I am indebted for pork bought of them. I also order my negro man Tony to be sold with all convenient speed and turned into money by my said executors and in the Spring following this date or sooner if my executors think fit I order them to sell and dispose of all and singular my other moveable estate (at Vendue or otherwise) except the best bed and furniture which I have in the house, my oldest black ball face mare, all my poultry geese and ducks, the apparel belonging to my wife and children, the provisions in the house, one half dozen milch cows (my watch and seal with coat-of-arms), the apparel I will, each shall have it that has it and my wife to dispose of mine as she pleases and the bed and the mare which I excepted I give to my wife Phebe and I will she shall have the use of my watch, seal and coat of arms until my son Ebenezer comes to the age of 21 years and then to give it to him. I also give unto my said wife the half dozen cows I excepted for her own use to assist her to provide for herself and family. 3rd I hereby empower and authorize my executors or the survivor or survivors of them or such of them as shall take upon themselves the execution of my will in some convenient time after my decease to sell and dispose at Vendue or otherwise as they shall think best all the land which I bought of Underhill Barnes lying joining to Israel Honeywell, Esq. and the parsonage of Westchester (except the swamp of timber) (which I order by executors to reserve out of the sale to be measured off by them so as to include the chiefest part or all of the wood) and to make and execute good deeds in the law to the purchaser or purchasers thereof in like manner I order them to sell my lot of salt meadow which I bought of Stephen Williams, joining to John Williams meadow, Moses Mullines and the Great Creek in fee simple. I order them to sell all my rights and interests which I have in old Mr. Phillip's Upper Patent with the consent of the landlord. 5th All the moneys which shall arise by virtue of the sale of my said moveable estate and my said real estate above ordered to be sold and my improvements in Mr. Phillip's Upper Patent I order to be applied as follows: First, I order all my just debts and funeral charges to be paid and the remainder I order my executors to put at interest and the yearly interest which they shall actually receive I order them to pay to my wife Phebe for the use of herself and the bringing up my children so long and until my youngest daughter Elizabeth attains to the age of 18 years or marries which may first happen (if my wife shall continue my widow so long) 6th when my said daughter Elizabeth shall attain to the age of 18 years or marry which may first happen, then I order my executors to divide the said moneys so put out at interest as above directed or the bonds on which the same is then due equally amongst my said wife Phebe and daughters, Mary, Abigail, Hannah and Elizabeth share and share alike. 7th If my daughter Elizabeth shall happen to die before she attains to the age of 18 years unmarried, then I order the distribution of the said moneys to be made when my daughter Hannah shall be of the age of 21 years or married which may first happen, equally amongst my wife Phebe and daughters Mary, Abigail and Hannah, share and share alike and in case either of my said daughters Mary or Abigail or Hannah shall die before such distribution leaving lawful issue at the time of said distribution should be made before in this and in the 6th paragraph expressed, then I order her or their lawful issue to have the share of its or their deceased mother. 8th If my wife should intermarry or die before the time should come in the 2 last paragraph limited for the distribution of the above monies then I order my executors to apply the interest thereof until such time shall come towards the use and maintenance of all my children and then divide the money as above directed, but my will is that my wife shall have the liberty and I do hereby give her full power to dispose of her share (be it what it will) to whom she pleases by will or otherwise although she may not live to take her share herself. 9th. I give further unto my said wife Phebe the privilege of taking anything in the house at the appraised value before sale is made of my moveable estate paying that value. 10th All the rest of my real estate whatsoever and wheresoever not herein before ordered to be sold I give bequeath and devise the same as houses lands, tenements, even hereditaments unto and amongst my three sons Ebenezer, Thomas and Benjamin and to their heirs and assigns forever and if either of my three sons shall happen to die before the age of 21 years then I give the whole to those that shall attain to that age and to their heirs and assigns forever subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter expressed. 11th My will further is that my said loving wife Phebe shall have and enjoy the use of the whole of my said real estate in the last paragraph devised to my said three sons so long and until my youngest son Benjamin shall attain to the age of 21 years if she shall live so long and remain my widow, the better to enable her to maintain herself and my children and in case my youngest son Benjamin should attain to that age or at the time he would have attained to that age, if he should die before that time (had he lived) my said wife being then alive and remaining my widow, I give unto her the privilege to have the best room in my house, half my garden and the milk of two cows and one third part of the profits of my orchard by my dwelling house to hold to her so long as she remains my widow and no longer and I do hereby charge my sons that they see these privileges fulfilled to my said wife. 12th I order my executors to take care that my son Ebenezer be kept to school and learnt Arithmetick, Navigation and Surveying and Lattin sufficient to qualify him for a doctor and I would have him put out either to a doctor or a merchant and I order the expenses of learning Lattin and putting of him out to be borne out of the estate hereby given him. 13th My will is and it is to be understood that the swamp I reserved in the third paragraph is to be measured so as to extend eastward so far as the fence running by the highway leaving next to Israel Honeywell's orchard about 8 rods for passage to the other land. My will is that my executors keep my other two sons to school and give them good learning suitable for a merchant. Lastly I nominate and appoint my loving wife Phebe, my brother Thomas Haviland, and my brother-in-law Richard

I order my just debts, funeral charges and the charges of settling my estate by paid by my executors in some convenient time after my decease Item, I will and order that my two sons William Haviland and Samuel Haviland shall have the use and benefits and the improving of all my lands, meadows and tenements whatsoever unto me belonging in Rye be the same more or less for the support of my wife Sarah Haviland (to whom I order notwithstanding to have the liberty of living in my now dwelling house so long as she remains my widow) and for the bringing up my children until my youngest son Joseph Haviland shall be twenty-one years of age. Item, I give, will and bequeath all my lands, meadows houses and improvements thereon unto my five sons, William, Samuel, John, Benjamin and Joseph Haviland to be divided equally among them when my youngest son Joseph Haviland shall be twenty-one years old in quantity and quality and after such division that my said sons William and Samuel, John, Benjamin and Joseph shall have and hold their several shares to them their heirs and assigns in severalty forever and I further order that what is hereby given to my five daughters Sarah, Charity, Margaret, Mary, and Elizabeth shall remain in the possession of my two sons, William and Samuel for ye further support and bringing up my children until my said five daughters severally come of age or be married and then to be paid and delivered them. Item, I give unto my oldest son William Haviland, the sum of ten pounds over and above what is herein already given him out of my moveable estate and paid him by other executors in full barr to his claim as eldest son or heir to my estate. Item, I give unto my eldest daughter Abigail Haviland to be paid and delivered her by my other executors out of my moveable estate the sum of sixty pounds current money of New York, also my negro boy called Abraham, one Horse and one Mare, side saddle and bridle which she, said Abigail now claims, and is called hers, absolutely to be at her own use and disposal forever. I give and order that my wife Sarah Haviland shall have to her use

and disposal the one third part of my moveable estate after my just debts funeral charges and the charges of settling my estate what hereby is given to my eldest daughter Abigail and the ten pounds given to my eldest son William, is deducted and set off by my said executors. Item, I order and it is my will that after my debts, funeral charges and charges of settling my estate what is hereby given my daughter Abigail, son William and wife Sarah, the residue and remainder of my moveable estate be the same more or less shall be equally divided and shared among and between my five daughters, Sarah, Charity, Margaret, Mary and Elizabeth Haviland, that is, each of them to have one full fifth part of their use absolutely to be paid to my said daughters as they severally come of age or be married and in case any of my said five daughters should happen to dye before they be of age, marry or have issue, then I order the deceased daughter or daughters' part or share coming to her or them shall be equally divided among the surviving daughters of them five and not otherways to be disposed of, but to be to the use of them surviving of the five daughters. His will is dated March 9, 1775, and proven May 17, 1789, and he was 69 years of age at death. His first wife was named Elizabeth, and is buried in Purchase Cemetery; d. 1759, aged 39 years. A clause in his will disinherits any child who is insolent to his or her mother.
- **Charity Haviland**, born 1737; died 4 March 1823 at Sawpit (Port Chester), N.Y.; married **Gilbert Brundage**, born abt. 173-?- , son of Absalom Brundage and Mary Brown. They lived at Rye and had one child who died young.
- **Margaret Haviland**, born 1 January 1741 (or 1 Oct 1740); died about 1800 at home of her brother John; married (1) 1755 **John Smith**, of Bedford, who ran Smith's Tavern, and who may have been a Quaker from Purchase, N.Y.; married (2) (marriage bond 26 May 1769) **James Nairne**. She m. first in 1755, against the advice of her friends, one John Smith. He took her to the Oblong, where they buried one child; then over the Hudson River, where they buried another, and finally to the West Indies, where they buried several. Then he d., leaving her in delicate health, with scanty means and a delicate child, John Smith, with whom she returned and was taken into the family homestead. (The above is from a family manuscript, the issue is from the notes of F. H.) Issue (Smith): +238 John; 239 William, b. 18 of 3 mo., 1761. Margaret had license to marry second, May 26, 1769, James Nairne, a mariner, of Westchester Co., who owned a farm between Purchase and Portchester. He had a son John. James d. on Long Island, and the son d. at sea, and the property fell to Margaret and her son, John Smith. After her son's marriage she again returned to the homestead and d. there.
- **Mary Haviland**, married **William Miller**, son of Samuel Miller & Phoebe Lyon; Known as Judge Miller.
- **Elizabeth Haviland**, married **Thomas Carpenter**, son of Thomas Carpenter. They lived at Harrison, N.Y. and had children: **Sarah Carpenter**, married 12 October 1767, Thomas Vail, Jr.; **Mary Carpenter**; **Thomas Carpenter**, lived at Rye, N.Y.; **John Carpenter**, lived at Oyster Bay, N.Y.; **Charity Carpenter**; **Joseph Carpenter** (prob.), married Mary Clapp. Elizabeth was an infant at the time of her father's death, in 1747. She died 1819; m. Thomas, son of Stephen Carpenter, b. in 1747, and d. at Harrison in 1817. During the Revolution Thomas Carpenter was quartermaster under Gen. Thomas. At the Battle of White Plains, at a skirmish near Harrisons, the British surrounded a house which sheltered a party of Americans, including Gen. Thomas and Thomas Carpenter. All were taken prisoners excepting Thomas Carpenter, who was left for dead, but by careful nursing he finally recovered, and for his bravery was made captain and then general. (No Revolutionary record names him as general. J. C. F.)

For their marriage license, John's surety was John Haviland, farmer, of Westchester Co., N. Y., and Phebe's surety was Nathaniel McCall, schoolmaster, of New York.

During the Revolution the Skinners came to the home of John Haviland in the middle of the night and demanded something to eat of his wife Phebe. She set out what she had with the usual steel knives and forks, but the Skinners produced sterling silverware and proceeded to set the table with the proceeds of their raids elsewhere. They afterwards visited a neighbor on Hogpen Ridge and demanded to eat, but were told they had nothing, but that John Haviland had a fine lot of turkeys. The Skinners pretended to go to John Haviland's, but only went out to a tree where they had seen some turkeys, and caught and plucked one and brought it in to be cooked, and the family joined, thinking they were eating the turkey of their neighbor. Next day the Skinners informed John Haviland what kind neighbors he had and about the joke they played on them.

The British marauders were called "Cowboys," and the American marauders "Skinners." Three of the latter were playing cards in the woods when Major John Andre, the spy, rode by. They rushed out to 'skin' him, and in searching him found papers proving they had captured a man of importance, so took him to headquarters and were lauded as patriots. Thirty years afterwards, when one of them came to New York City and was awarded the freedom of the city, John Haviland met him and invited him home to dinner; but when they arrived at the house his mother met them at the door and said: 'No, that man does not enter my house. He is nothing but a common thief.'

A cherry highboy, made by John Haviland, is now owned by Mrs. Aaron Field of Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, N. Y. It was made for his daughter Jane when she lived in Pine Cottage, where all her children were born.

After the battle of White Plains, Oct. 28, 1776, Gen. George Washington sent for John Haviland, who was a man of wealth and importance in those parts, and said his soldiers had not been paid for some time and were getting discouraged, and asked if it was not possible to raise some cash among the rich Quakers to help the cause along. He replied he would see what he could do, and by active canvassing he succeeded in raising twenty-five hundred dollars, which he took to Gen. Washington at North Castle, N. Y.

Gen. Schuyler was quartered at John Haviland's at one time, and sent an orderly for Phebe's teakettle, and she sent back word that when she was through with it he could have it and not before. He moved his quarters before long.

On June 13, 1805, Aaron Field and wife Jane, of Greenwich, Conn., sold John Haviland of Harrison town one-quarter interest in two hundred acres and upwards, left by John Haviland, deceased, their late father to be equally divided between his four children, Jane, Sarah, William and John.

On Aug. 1, 1806, William Haviland and wife Anne of Harrison town release their interest to John Haviland of same place in 105 and 3/4 acres, being the easternmost part of the farm belonging to John Haviland, deceased, the consideration being of releasing unto them his interest in 120 acres, being the westernmost part of the farm given them by their father, John Haviland, deceased, bounded on the north by Thomas Burling and Joseph Carpenter land; on the east by Blind Brook; on the south by Thomas Carpenter's land and John Carpenter's land, and on the west by William Haviland's land aforesaid.

In his will, he wrote: In the Name of God, Amen the 24th day of February in the year of our Lord 1790/1 I John Haviland of the Town of Harrison in the County of Westchester and State of New York, being of sound mind and memory praised by God therefore and calling to mind that it is appointed for all men once to die do make this my last will and testament. Imprimis, I will and recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it, my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in a Christian and decent burial at the discretion of my executors and as touching such worldly goods as it has pleased God to bless me with I will and bequeath in manner following: First I order all my just debts and funeral charges to be paid out of my moveable estate. Item, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife and faithful partner, Phebe Haviland, all my household furniture to be at her disposal and I also give to my beloved wife Phebe Haviland, the use of all my estate, real and personal so long as she remains my widow, she paying to my two sons William Haviland and John Haviland the sum of 100 pounds each when they severally arrive at the age of twenty-one years and if she should neglect or refuse to pay the two several sums at their arriving to the age of 21 years as above then it is my will and I hereby order my executors to raise the said two several sums out of such part of my estate as they find convenient and to pay it to my two sons in manner as above and at my wife's death or in case she should marry it is my will and I hereby order that all the residue of my estate both real and personal be divided by my executors in such manner as they shall find convenient by sale or otherwise into six equal parts or shares and give to my two sons William and John Haviland each two shares or equal sixth parts and to my two daughters Jane Field and Sarah Cromwell one share each or equal sixth part all which shares or parts of my estate I give to my four children to them, their heirs and assigns for ever, viz; to William his heirs and assigns 2/6, to John, his heirs and assigns, 2/6, to Jane Field her heirs and assigns, 1/6 and to Sarah Cromwell her heirs and assigns, 1/6. Lastly I hereby nominate and appoint my beloved wife Phebe Haviland, her brother Joseph Carpenter and my two sons William and John Haviland to be executors of this my last will and testament and I hereby disallow, annul and revoke all other and former wills etc. John Haviland Witnesses: Elizabeth Travis, her mark, William Miller Proved March 20, 1804. An Inventory of his extensive estate was made.

Joseph Haverland was living in Flushing, 29 Sep 1675 (listed just before John Felde).<sup>1</sup>

He was listed in the 1698 Census of the Town of Westchester: Joseph Heaviland, wife mary, children Joseph, william, hannah, Charety, nathan, and febe.

Dec. 28, 1688, the Town of Hempstead, L. I., granted him the privilege of setting up a grist mill in Rockaway Swamp and to have 6 acres of land upon the following conditions:-- To make and set up complete a good grist mill within one year and a day after the date above, and to grind the town corn for the twelfth part thereof and if the said mill at any time shall be incapable to grind one year and a day then the said stream and land is to return to the town again and so long as the above said conditions are performed, the said stream and land to be and remain to said Joseph Haviland, his heirs and assigns. By order, Joseph Pettit, Clerk, 1688.

In 1685 he signed with William Haviland the confirmation of the Patent of Flushing.

(Book A. 267, Queens Co.) James Hard, formerly of Flushing, now living in ye town and County of New Lundum of Col. of Conn. for 30 pounds to John Esmond of Flushing, a certain parcell of land lying at or neare Matta Garrisons bay in ye bounds of Flushing. Ye said land lying in several parcells as follows.....as also 8 acres of land more bought of Joseph Haviland as appeared by his bill of sale lying at ye head of ye bay aforesaid March 11, 1694/5.

Nov. 27, 1697, Joseph Haviland, calling himself, late of Cornbury within the limits and bounds of Flushing, sells for 200 pounds to Thomas Hicks, Sr., his house and barn and orchard situate lying and being in said Cornbury, to the south by Cornelius Barnes, to the west by the Highway, to the north by said Thomas Hicks, Sr. southerly by Benjamin Haviland Witness, Edward Collier. Signed, Joseph Haviland and Mary his wife (Her mark). May 1, 1699. There appeared Joseph Haviland and Mary his wife before Mr. William Willett, Esq. alderman of the Town and Corporation of Westchester and acknowledged the above deed. Entered the 15th of Aug. 1700 per Andrew Gibb, Clerk.

Jan. 10, 1697, old reckoning, really, 1698, one month and thirteen days after selling out in Flushing, he bought of John Winter, 30 acres in West Chester for fifty pounds, on the east side of the Bronx River, formerly owned by Winter's father who bought it of William Davenport.

In Vol. 34 of the N. Y. Gen. Record it is claimed that Joseph moved to West Chester in 1695, before he sold his home in Cornbury. However, even after the proof that he had really moved to the "main shore," he still retained his ownership in the above grist mill for we find in the Journal of John Bowne, the following items: April 29, 1693. Joseph Haviland, Dr. to a spinning wheel. 1700. Joseph Haviland ground 69 and 1/2 bushels. 1701. Joseph Haviland paid in full for grinding. 1700. Joseph Haviland ground 30 bushels.

From N. Y. Col. Mss., Vol. 39, page 303, Joseph Haviland is mentioned as of Westchester County, under date of Nov. 5, 1694, as interested in a controversy about some money. Unfortunately Howell says the manuscript is so torn that his age is destroyed. The ages of the other men range from thirty to fifty-six.

Oct. 1, 1694. Joseph Haviland witnessed the will of Thomas Hunt of Grove Farm, Westchester.

April 16, 1697. Joseph Haviland witnesses the will of Gabriel Leggett of West Farms.

June 6, 1698. Joseph Haviland of Westchester, purchased 2 and 1/2 acres of land there for 38 pounds, from Joseph Palmer and his wife Sarah, adjoining land of John Ferris, Sr.

Among the notes of the late Frederick Haviland, I find the following:-- "Joseph Haviland removed to the Town of Westchester and was living there in 1695 having leased a grist and saw mill belonging to William Richardson. The executors of the latter sold the same with the land and appurtenances July 25, 1695 for 510 pounds to two merchants of the City of N. Y., Evert Byvanck and Johannes Hogelandt. Joseph Haviland signed as a witness this deed which describes the property as follows: all that a certain Mullin or Milles being a Grise Mill and a Saw Mill in West Chester and two negro men called Jack and Dick with 6 oxen and the immunities, tooles, yoakes, chaines, wheels, carts, carriages, geares and implements, the same now belonging or with which the same is now occupied used and enjoyed by Joseph Haviland now resident and Leasee of the premises before granted also 20 acres of Upland conditionally given by town of West Chester for the use, benefit and encouragement of the said Mill or Mills.

April 13, 1700. At a meeting of the Trustees of the Town of West Chester it was stated that articles of agreement had been made and concluded between John Pell and heirs of Thomas Pell on the one part about a certain tract of land granted by Patent of Gov. Nicolls and Justice John Hunt and Joseph Haviland, gentlemen, appointed by the Trustees of the Town on the other part.

June 14, 1700. Col. Caleb Heathcote deeds to Joseph Haviland, both of Westchester, for a valuable consideration, "all that my house two story high, shingled and with a brick chimney lying and being by my Mills." Recorded Nov. 7, 1700.

Oct. 25, 1700. Joseph Haviland buys of Jacobus Decay of New York, one negro wench.

Aug. 16, 1701. At a Town Meeting Joseph Haviland was made an assistant or Common Council Man. He was also Trustee of the Town from Oct. 15, 1698, and was present at a meeting held the 14th of Sep. 1700, where it was "voted and agreed upon that all that shall cart timber and stuff for the meeting house shall have six shillings per diem; and that Joseph Haviland and John Hunt shall agree with a carpenter for the timber work etc."

Jan. 1701 and 1702. Joseph Haviland was Vestryman and on Sunday, Dec. 6, 1702, he with others, certified that the Rev. John Bartow after his induction did in the Parish Church of West Chester read morning and evening service, etc., and the record of this document is in Latin and English in the Surrogate's Office of N. Y. City. He was also Vestryman in 1702 and 3.

Nov. 29, 1706. Joseph Haviland and wife Mary sell for 200 pounds to Henry Langley, house and lot with orchard, 2 and 1/2 acres, bounded south by John Ferris, Sr., also 9 acres on Throgg's Neck on the Bridge Hill; also 24 acres on the east side of the Bronx River above Evert Byvanck's Mills; also 6 acres of salt meadow on the east side of Bronx River.

June 27, 1711. Joseph Haviland says: "I, Joseph Haviland of Shrewsbury, N. J. Monmouth Co. do hereby release and confirm unto Richard Ward of West Chester Co. N. Y. millwright, all that house and home lot lying and being in West Chester by

Col. Caleb Heathcote's Mills which house and lot I sold to Henry Langley." This proves conclusively that the Joseph of Westchester and the Joseph of New Jersey were the one and same man.

In the Office of the Sec'y of State one finds Letters of Adm. granted to Gabriel Still and John Eaton, principal creditors of chattels of Joseph Haviland late of Shrewsbury, N. J., dated Aug. 31, 1724.

Samuel was a member of the Third and Fourth Provincial Congress; elected from Westchester Co., N. Y., His will is dated Nov. 13, 1776, at Harrison, N. Y., and was probated Oct. 21, 1779, leaving all to wife Rachel, making her and his brother-in-law, William Miller, executors.

The will of Rachel is dated at Flushing, N. Y., Dec. 31, 1809, and probated Feb. 20, 1817, mentioning the children of Willett Leaycraft as Elizabeth Willett Leaycraft, Amelia Ann Leaycraft and Viner Leaycraft. As she had one child when she m. Samuel Haviland, doubtless he is the above Willett Leaycraft.

For their marriage license, his surety was Samuel Haviland, and hers Jasper Drake. It is said he d. quite young. After his death his widow and the two children, with her colored woman, "Sib," and her four sons, Jack, Tobe, Mose and Cull, remained in the family homestead with the helpless mother of William until after the two daughters were m. While all the children were together (the brothers and sisters of William) and the helpless mother living, their home was burned by the carelessness of Sib. This happened in the latter part of the summer, but by employing many workmen their new house was so far advanced that they moved into it before winter. It is the one now (1894) occupied by Warren Leland in Purchase
