The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

The names Haring, Harinck, Harinkie, Hark, Harke, Harkje, Harko, Harkolien, Hare that are patronimical names. In Groningen used Haarko, in Friesland Harich, but also Harinck, Haring, Harke, Haro, Harre, Hearing, Hjerre and a lot more. Also you can have feminal names as Harcolina, Harriaantje, Harkje, Heerkolina, Heerodina, Heredina and so on. This names are short Germanic names such as Har-, Her-, Heer with the meaning of Army or a German Lord. In Holland you could find Heer, Here, Heerkijn, Heertgen, at the end of the 16th century the name Harke became Hercules. In my genealogy you can find "Haring Janzn. van Lang Weeren" [Haring the son of Jan from the location Lang Weeren], probably a welborn person [gentle-farmer] from his marriage with Semmetje Broers they get a daughter Tietje Haarings, in the region nearby Hoorn.

He lived in NYC and the Island of Curacao (Netherlands Antilles), He was a shipwright.¹

Benjamin owned land in Curacao and in Aruba in the Dutch Antilles. In 1634 the Dutch seized Curacao from Spain. In 1639 West India Company Director first requests import of slaves to Curaçao. Curacao was the center of the Dutch West Indian Company slave trade, from then until later slave revolts. In 1732 West India Company grants private merchants the right to participate in the slave trade. In 1751 first slave uprising. In 1789 Curaçao's slave population peaks at 12,804.

In the (2) marriage record, they were: "12 Mar 1734 Benjamin Hern, widower of Neeltje van Scheuyn, born New York, and Wendelina van Gorcum, late wife of Pieter Suwerts, born Curacao. Witnesses: Harman Thijsen and Elizabeth Arentsz, wife of Pieter van Gorcum. Married 30 Mar 1734."³ Wijndelina van Gorcum, young daughter, born Curacao, m. 6 Sep 1722 (banns 15 Aug 1722) Caracao, Pieter Stiberis, jonge man, born in Maagdenburg [Germany], at the moment serving for the West Indian Company. Witnesses were Frans Charje and Elizabeth A.--nts, wife of Pieter van Gorcum, all living here.⁴

Frans Cownhoven, of Greenwich, in the Out Ward of New York, joiner, in his will dated 15 Aug 1745, mentioned his son-in-law, John Fred and his wife Martha. He made "my son-in-law, John Fred, and his wife Martha, and Peter Messier and Simon Johnson, executors. Witnesses, Abraham Lefferts, Abraham Van Wyck, Abraham Lynsen. Proved, February 20, 1748/9.

Martha, widow of Capt. John Fred, mentioned in her 12 July 1756 will, her brother, Benjamin Herring, his wife Wyndlyna, and their 5 children, including John Fred Herring, (the other children mentioned but not named).

Simon Johnson, in his will written in 1770, mentioned his late cousin, Benjamin Herring, of the Island of Curacao, deceased, and his five children.

The April 1818 New Rochelle, Westchester Co., NY Town Meeting was held at the house of James Herrings; the 6 April 1819, 4 April 1820, 3 April 1821, 1 Jan 1822, 2 April 1822, 1 April 1823, 5 April 1825, 4 April 1826 New Rochelle Town Meetings were held at the house of James Herring [Herrings].¹

In his will (White Plains M:58) (abstract), dated 18 June 1827, he wrote: I, James Herring of the Town of New Rochelle, Westchester Co., NY, mentioned wife Mary; son James Herring, Jr. Appoints wife and son executors. Signed James Herring. Witnesses by Joseph Anderson Jr., William G. Mead, Horace S. Martin. Proved 17 Aug 1829.²

James Herring was a NYC brewer who moved to New Rochelle and opened a hotel which his son had purchased in 1818. He conducted this hotel until 1827, except for a short interval in 1824.²

He was a well-known painter of horses. John Frederick Herring, senior, was the most celebrated sporting painter of his age. The Herrings were an English family of painters, of Dutch descent. J(ohn) F(rederick) Herring (b Surrey, 1795; d Meopham, Kent, 23 Sept 1865) was the most prolific and financially successful member of the family. His brother, Benjamin Herring (b Surrey, 1806; d 1830), had a brief career largely devoted to producing passable imitations of the work of several early 19th-century sporting painters.¹

He lived at various locations during his life, including: # Blackfriars Road 1814 Camberwell, Surrey, England; 88 Newgate Street 1814; from Sep 1814 to 1830 Doncaster, Yorkshire, England; Six-Mile-Bottom, nr Newmarket from 1830 to 1833; 31 Park Street, Camberwell from 1833 to 1840; Paris, France 1840/41; 9 Cottage Green, Camberwell from 1840 to 1853; Meopham Park, Tonbridge, Kent from March 1853 to 1865; London 1853; Essex house provided by W. T. Copeland 1840 Leyton, Essex, England.

The will of John Frederick Herring was dated 17 June 1856 and probated 13 Nov 1865 Meopham Park, Tonbridge, Kent, England.²

Harmen van der Biest; Willem Herring; registered in Curacao, november 3, 1781.!
