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The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

If she remarries, then I give to my daughter, Mary Pinhorne, one half of all gold, silver, jewels, plate and household goods. And all that remains unsold after my wife's decease. If my daughter, Mary Pinhorne, should die without issue, then all my estate is to go to my two nephews, Lancaster and Richard Symes, sons of my brother-in-law, Lancaster Symes, of New York. I leave to my son, George Ingoldsby, 5 shillings, in full of all demands as heir at law. I make my wife sole executor. Signed and sealed at Stillwater, in the county of Albany, August 31, 1714. Witnesses, Peter Van Bruh, Margaret Schuyler, Ernst Bancker. Proved before Robert Livingston, Judge of Common Pleas, and confirmed by Peter Schuyler, President of Council, October 8, 1719.

He came to Allendale by 1887. He bought the former Quackenbush house at 700 Franklin Turnpike and much surrounding acreage.

He served in the National Guard in the Civil War 1865-1867. His occupation listed in the 1900 Federal Census is Secretary; in the 1905 State Census he is listed as a clerk. He worked for the Wing Piano Company in New York at one time. In 1889 he was vice president of the Lyceum and a Trustee of the Orvil Co-operative Building and Loan Association. In the spring of 1891 he was elected a Justice of the Peace in Orvil Township and he was appointed a Bergen County justice of the peace in May 1892. He had a sister, Mrs. Tillie Hamel, who lived with him until he died. He was a first cousin of Henry Bergh, who founded the SPCA.

They were listed in the 1880 Federal Census, New York, Rockland Co., Ramapo, District 58, p. 5, enumerated 5 June

1880, Dwelling 40, Family 44 (all b. NY; all their parents b. NY except as noted)-- Ivers, Alfred E., 30, Clerk for S.S. Line (Inman); [Ivers], Adalaide, 26, Wife, Keeping House; [Ivers], Bessie, 3, Daughter; [Ivers], Adeline, 7/12, b. Nov 1879, Daughter; McEwan, Emma F., 34, Sister, Widow, No Occupation; [McEwan], Alexander R., 10, Nephew, At school, his father b. Scotland; Ackerman, Matilda, 30, Sister, married, No Occupation; Ivers, Mary F., 25, Sister, Single, No Occupation.

Alfred E. and Adeline G. Ivers were listed in the 1885 New Jersey State Census, living in Midland Township, Bergen County, NJ. Listed with them were: Bessie F., Adeline G., Sarah. Also listed with them was Annie Colibush.

On 1 Mar 1902 the property at 647 Franklin Turnpike, Allendale (or a portion of it) was conveyed om Charles F. Hawkins to Edna Haring and Mabel Haring. Another portion was conveyed 15 June 1911 from Adaline G. Ivers and Alfred E. Ivers to Edna Haring and Mabel Haring.

On 19 Jan 1922 (Hackensack 1182: 589; 168 West Crescent Avenue, later the "Carriage House" restaurant) Charles H. Ivers and Luella B., his wife, of the Borough of Allendale; George W. Ivers and Theresa, his wife, of the Borough of Allendale; and Adeline G. Bramhall and Anderson B. Bramhall, her husband, of the Borough of Allendale, conveyed to Adeline G. Ivers, widow, of the Borough of Allendale, for \$1, being parts of lots 2 and 3 as laid now on a map of the property of Adeline G. Ivers (April 1895 by Richard Wanamaker, C.E.). Being also same property conveyed by Alfred E. Ivers and Adeline G. Ivers, his wife, to Matilda Hame by deed dated 4 Dec 1908 (Hackensack 712: 459). Said Charles H. Ivers, George W. Ivers and Adeline G. Bramhall are three of the five heirs of Alfred E. Ivers. This property apparently included 168 West Crescent Avenue, today (in 1993) a restaurant, LCs Woodhouse.

On 27 Mar 1923 Adaline G. Ivers conveyed to Albert R. Winans a plot 160.1 x 200.6 on Franklin Turnpike.

On 27 Mar 1923 Adaline G. Ivers conveyed to Luella B. Ivers a lot beginning 70 feet from the northerly line of F. L. Drummond, 52 x 375 on Franklin Turnpike.

Ivers was living in the port town of Stratford, Connecticut, in the 1760s as Thomas and Hannah Ivers appear in the records of Christ Church (Anglican), there as parents of Anna and Thomas, baptized in 1761 and 1763, respectively. He was resident in New York City after the British evacuation. Thomas Ivers, or someone of that name, was also active in New York City in the years before the Revolution. In 1766 this Thomas Ivers purchased an existing rope-walk and expanded it to a distance of some thousand feet between Crown Point Street (Water St.) and Grand Street.¹⁹²⁹ After the revolution the Thomas Ivers who is the subject of this piece was also a rope maker. Thomas Ivers is listed as a member of the Committee of 100 formed 1 May 1775, a body which contained many radicals and which briefly served as the rebel government of the city until the establishment of the Provincial Congress on 22 May 1775.¹⁹³⁰ It is likely that the Thomas Ivers of Stratford and of pre- and post-revolutionary New York are the same person, someone with interests in the shipping trade and in both ports connected by the East River and Long Island Sound. Ivers's prominent position in New York City after the British Evacuation suggests a reward for revolutionary credentials developed early in the fight for independence.¹
