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The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

I nominate Joseph Allicocke and William Smith, one of his Majesty's Council of New York, my executors. Dated September 22, 1779. Witnesses, Daniel Crocheron, Moses Clendenney, Benjamin Cole. Proved, March 21, 1780. Administration granted to James Lamb, of the City of New York, mariner, who intermarried with Mary a daughter and one of the residuary legatees of Charles Jandine, late of Richmond County, gentleman, deceased, whereas administration was granted to Joseph Allicocke, one of the executors whereas he has since departed this State, the estate not being fully administered, and whereas William Smith, the other executor, is likewise absent from this State, administration is hereby granted to the above. New York, July 9, 1784.

In 1760 he entered King's College (Columbia University of to-day), when a little over fourteen. After graduation in 1764, he studied law, in 1768 receiving admission to the bar. Family and ability combined to gain him a large practice.

He was a member of the second Congress, in 1775. He was a member of the committee that drew up the Declaration of Independence, and doubtless had full share in that document, although he was not among its signers, owing to the fact that it was deemed essential to the cause of liberty that he take the seat in the provincial Congress of New York, to which he was elected in April, 1776. Jay served as one of the Council of Safety in New York, and later accepted provisional appointment as Chief Justice of the State. This appointment was confirmed under the constitution, when adopted, but he was prohibited from holding any other office except that of Congressional delegate "on special occasion." Events now moved rapidly and the special occasion soon came in the secession of Vermont from New Hampshire and New York. In December, 1778, Jay was sent to Congress, and elected its president. In 1781 he was commissioned to act with Franklin, Adams, Jefferson and Laurens in negotiating peace with Great Britain. He was appointed, September 26, 1789, the first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States. He later was elected Governor of the state of New York.

In his will, he wrote: "...I, Peter Jay, late of Rye, in Westchester County, but now of Rombout Precinct, in Dutchess County, Esquire. I leave to my executors œ500, to be put at interest for my son Augustus during his life, and then to my four sons, James, Peter, John, and Frederick. I leave to my executors £1,800, to be put at interest for the support of my daughter, Eve Munro, during her life, and to my grandson, Peter Jay Munro, after my daughter's decease, and when he is 21 years old. I leave to my daughter, Anna Maricha, £1,800. All the rest of my estate real and personal I leave to my sons, James, Peter, John, and Frederick. My executors may choose men to divide my estate, but they are not instructed to do so. But it is my will that my son Peter shall have my farm at Rye at its true value. And my son John to have the choice of any one of my farms at Bedford. And that my son Frederick shall have, if he choose it, all that lot of ground and water lot late in his possession, and on which he built a storehouse, in Dock Ward, bounded north by Dock wharf, and opposite to the house late in occupation of Evert Bancker, east by Augustus and Frederick Van Cortlandt, west by John W. Vreedenbergh, and south by the river. As granted to me by the Mayor and Commonalty. I leave to all my children the house and lot in occupation of Evert Bancker, and my children are to release to my son Frederick all the privilege granted by the Mayor and Commonalty as regards water lot opposite. And whereas it is probable that my son-in-law, Rev. Harry Munro, may object, the will makes arrangements in that case. I release all my children from any indebtedness to me, but I do not release my son James from a ballance due me. My two negro women, Zilpha and Mary, in consideration of long service, are to have their choice of masters among my sons. I make my sons, James, John, and Frederick, executors." Dated January 28, 1778. "Written on two sides of six sheets of paper, sewed together." Witnesses, William Van Wyck, Theodorus Van Wyck, Jr., John Van Wyck. Codicil. The £500 and the £1,800 left to my executors are to be in Spanish Milled Dollars, at the rate of eight shillings per dollar, and I leave the said sums to my sons, John and Frederick, and my friend, Egbert Benson, on the same conditions. June 22, 1780. Witnesses, William Van Wyck, Theodorus Van Wyck, George Way. Codicil. I, Peter Jay, late of Rye, but at present of Poughkeepsie. Since making my will I have purchased the messuage and lot in Poughkeepsie where I now reside, late in occupation of John Davis. The same is to be considered part of my residuary estate. September 11, 1781. Witnesses, Egbert Benson, Augustine Lawrence, James M. Hughes. Codicil. I, Peter Jay, of Poughkeepsie, December 18, 1781. Whereas my son John is now beyond seas, I authorize the major part of my executors to divide my estate, or to sell and divide. And to the end that such division may be made in the most impartial manner, and to prevent even the suspicion of injustice to either of my devisees, no such partition or sale shall be made without the assent and approbation of George Clinton, Melancthon Smith, and Egbert Benson, Esquires, whom I appoint Trustees. I give to my son James all my family portrait paintings. I leave to my son John my negro slave "Peter." I give my slave Mary to such of my children as she shall elect to live with. Witnesses, Theodorus Bailey, student, James Kent, Anthony A. Hoffman. Proved, May 28, 1782. [NOTE.--The testator was the progenitor of a most distinguished family. The son John was in later years Governor of the State and Chief Justice of the United States. The house and lot of Peter Jay in "Dock Ward" is now No. 64 Pearl street. This was given by Jacobus Van Cortlandt, in his will, to his daughter Mary, who married Peter Jay. This was a water lot, which was extended by later grants from the city. Edward Jeffers settled on a 300 acre tract in Upper Saddle River straddling the present state line. On Monday, 21 May 1739 Charles Clinton, surveying part of the Cheescoks Patent for New York, came through present Upper Saddle River, laying out New York lots right over the already laid out lots of the Ramapo Tract. Clinton came upon Jeffers' lot, and said it contained 60 to 70 bearing apple trees and described his house as "an old rotten logg house covered with thatch."

From The Minutes of the Board of Proprietors of the Eastern Division of New Jersey from 1725 to 1744, Perth Amboy (Re: Ramapo Tract; paraphrased unless in quotes)

(Vol. II, p. 151)...23 March 1741[42 NS]...on 21 September last Mr. Alexander executed one lease to Edward Jeffers for 300 acres at Matachemack near the head of the Saddle River...

Joe Jefferson was a famous comic actor, the third generation of his family connected with the theater. After completing his education with a period of study in Europe, he returned to the United States. He was made famous by his role as Rip Van Winkle in Washington Irving's play of the same name, but he had also appeared in other plays, including *Our American Cousin* in 1858 and *Nicholas Nickleby* in 1859. The four years coinciding with the Civil War he spent in Australia, where he had gone to recover his health. In 1865 in London he played the role of Rip Van Winkle to great acclaim, and when he returned to the United States in the role, he was met with similar enthusiastic acclaim. In 1893 he was elected President of the Players Club and was recognized as the dean of American actors.

In 1869 he bought from architect William H. Ranlett the Terhune-Van Emburgh property on East Saddle River Road, in what is today Ho-Ho-Kus, just over the border from Saddle River. Ranlett had remodeled and improved the property and Jefferson added his own touches, including restocking the Saddle River and his own Meadow-Mere Lake with 50,000 bass minnows. He was a zealous trout fisherman and fished in Saddle River. He kept birds, pets, and horses at stud. He apparently outfitted one approx. 30' square room in his house as a private miniature theater. He sold the house sometime about 1895-1896.

Edward Jessup was an Englishman who came to Connecticut from England prior to 1649, at which time he was already a citizen of Stamford, Connecticut, and owned lands in that town. Stamford was then under the jurisdiction of the New Haven colony. He may still earlier have been in Fairfield, twenty-five miles nearer New Haven, the capital of the colony, having landed estate there on "Sascoe neck," which he sold in 1653 to Thomas Barlowe of Fairfield.

When, in 1652, permission was obtained of Governor Peter Stuyvesant of the Dutch colony of New Amsterdam to establish an English settlement at the west end of Long Island, Jessup joined the party, and was one of the pioneers of Middleborough (Indian name: Mespat) (later Newtown). Edward Jessup lived in Westchester about 1662, then known as the North Riding of Yorkshire, as late as 1682 Jessup also purchased real estate of Jonas Halstead (a house and land) in Jamaica, March 1, 1661, which was sold Feb. 15, 1691, by his son Edward, then of Fairfield, Conn., to John Bowne of Flushing, a Quaker.

His will was dated 6 Aug 1666, probated 14 Nov 1666 Flushing, L.I. (rec. New Amsterdam, now NYC). In his will, he wrote: I, Edward Jessup, Westchester. "Being sicke and weake," leaves to daughter Elizabeth Hunt 20 shillings, "besides what I have already given her." To daughter Hannah Jessup £35, to be paid when at age of 18. Legacies to son Edward, to grandchild Mary Hunt, to cousin Johana Burroughs, and to Derrick Garrison. Makes wife, Elizabeth, sole executrix, and leaves her all lands, houses, and goods, and "she is to bring up my two children in the fear of God." "I appoint my well beloved friends,

Richard Cornhill, Justice of the Peace, Mrs. Sarah Bridges, my brother-in-law John Burrows, and Ralph Hunt overseers of my will, and to be assistants to my executrix." Dated, August 6, 1666. Witnesses, William Gouldstone, John Richardson, Richard Horton. Proved at Flushing, November 14, 1666. "This will was proved at Sessions, by the Governor's special order." Witness to Inventory, Thomas Hunt.<sup>2</sup>

He was but three years old at his father's death, and removing thus early with his mother to Connecticut upon her second marriage to Robert Beacham (Beauchamp), he was more a citizen of the latter colony than of New York. In due time he became a freeman of the town of Fairfield, acquired property, and established a home and family in the ancient parish of Green's Farms.

About 1720 Edward removed from Green's Farms to Stamford, and lived there the rest of his life. In the absence of any definite date of removal, it may be noticed that, April 28, 1720, he purchased 125 acres in the eastern part of Stamford, and Jan. 8, 1724, he buys a right in what were called the "sequestered lands," paying £69, 3s., 9d., while in October, 1726, he calls out a committee to settle the bounds of his last purchase.

His will, as recorded in Stamford, was dated Aug. 17, 1731, proven by witnesses in Norwalk, Jan. 5, 1732-33, and probated at Stamford February 5th of the same year. His son, Joseph Jessup of Stamford, is appointed sole executor. The inventory was about £650. In his will, he mentions wife Elizabeth; son Joseph; son Jonathan; daus. Hannah & Elizabeth; son Ebenezer; daughter Deborah; daughter Sarah; daughter Abilena. Witnessed by John Waterbury, Mary Isaacs, and Thomas Fitch.

Her will is dated 15 Sept., 1747, and her son Joseph is appointed executor; inventory about £200. The witnesses were David Holly, Jonathan Hoit, Jr., and Ann. Cluxton. She mentioned son Joseph; She mentions besides her living children, a granddaughter, Elizabeth Darling, the child, without doubt, of her daughter, Abilena, the wife of John Darling, of the Greenfield Hill Parish, in Fairfield. Joseph was absent from home, it would seem, when the will was executed, and she makes provision that if he "do not live to return," what she gives him shall go to his children. This perilous journey of his was a distance of about seventy-five miles to what is now the northern part of Dutchess county, New York. He did, however, return, and attended to the duties assigned him.

The name of Elizabeth Jessup appears on the roll of membership of the First Congregational Church of Stamford, when the Rev. Noah Welles was pastor. Both her husband and herself lie buried in an ancient cemetery near Cove Pond and Noroton River, and the inscriptions on their tombstones are still legible. This part of Stamford was afterwards known as Middlesex Parish, now the town of Darien.

John Jessup was in Hartford in February, 1637, when the General Court ordered that the May following "Mr. Oldham's businesses and John Jesopp's are to be handled." Oldham was a merchant adventurer who had just been murdered at Block Island by the Indians. Jessup was in some way associated with him, and his estate was to be settled by the upper house of the Legislature, acting as a Probate Court. Before this Jessup had been in Massachusetts near Boston, as in the adjudication of a case before a court held at Newton, Dec. 5, 1637, his name appears, and he is referred to as having "removed from their jurisdiction."

Before 1641, John Jessup was a landed proprietor in Wethersfield, where his name appears on the records as John Gosope. In the same year he was one of the party of twenty who with their minister Richard Denton, organized the new town of Stamford in South-western Connecticut. In 1644, Mr. Denton, with some of his friends, removed to Hampstead on Long Island, and not far from that time John Jessup had made Southampton his permanent home. Denton was from Yorkshire and he ultimately returned there. His friends may well be supposed to have been Yorkshiresmen, and Jessup among them.

John Jessup, one of the original settlers of Southampton, NY was there in 1649 and possibly earlier.

23 Aug 1670 -- David Jochemsen, pltf. v/s Josyn Verhagen, deft. Pltf. demands from deft. fl. 59. 10 zewant for passage money to the Esopus etc., with costs. Deft. produces an offset a/c of Reyntie Pieters, pltf's partner in the yacht, by which sd. Reyntie remains still indebted in the sum of fl. 128. 6. after the above fl. 59: 10 is deducted, in pledge of which they have in hands from the aforesaid Reyntie a silver penny, which they exhibit in Court. Judgment suspended to next Court day.<sup>1</sup> 6 Sep 1670 -- David Jochemsen Plt.; v/s Josyn Verhagen, Pltf. The Court ordered that this Case should be Suspended till the plt: be returned from delowarre; and an answer is came from the Commissioners of delowarre, upon the Letter sent them Concerning the Estate of Reyntie Pieters.<sup>1</sup>

Christina inherited considerable land on Long Island in the settlement of Bushwick as well as her property on Manhattan.

In his will, written at New York. (Made in Dutch form.) Before Matthias DeVoz, Notary Public, on the 20th of July, 1682. David Jochemsen and Christian Cappoens, his wife. He leaves to her all of his estate, and makes her his sole executor. She leaves to him one half of her estate and the other half to her daughter Maria Hays, "begotten of her former husband Jacob Hay." The husband is to remain in possession of the whole till the daughter is of age. The husband is to have the household effects, and one gold chain and two gold rings. Witnesses, Nicasius De Sille, Abm Slatter. Proved, July 7, 1682, and Letters of administration granted to the widow Christians Cappoens, July 8, 1682.

Christina Cappoens, widow of David Jochemsen, made her independent will July 17, 1687. In it she wrote: I, underwritten



Christina Cappaens, late widow of David Jochemson, deceased, dwelling in the city of New York, considering the weakness of this life, and wishing to settle my things in order by distributing my temporal estate as I do by these presents." I give and bequeath in particular to my daughter Maria Hays, married to Peter Praa, first my small house with the land from the front to the rear, as far as my right extends, with the lane, except eight inches in said lane, which is to remain to my great house from the front to the rear, which shall be the parting line between my great house and lot and my small house and lot from one street to the other. Which said line (except the aforesaid eight inches), my said daughter shall and may build upon, as to her may seem meet. Provided that my said daughter Maria shall not dispose of the said small house by will or otherwise, but only to receive the rents during her life, and after her death to go to her children or their lawful heirs, and in default of such heirs, then to the next of my kindred in blood, but not to the children of Joost Adriansen, deceased. I also leave to my daughter Maria the use and income of my land and meadow and Bowery, lying at Maspeth Kills, and which is now in possession of herself and her husband, and after her death it is to go to her two children, Sara Molenaer, procured by Joost Adriansen Molenaer and Catrina Praa, procured by her present husband Peter Praa and such other children as she may leave. The said Peter Praa to have the use of the same during his life, but if he remains there after the death of his wife then he shall pay to the children for said Bowery, 10,000 guilders in wampum value. I also give to my daughter Maria my silver beaker, one gold vase, diamond ring, a silver cup and pepper box, and a silver cup with a silver cover, and three silver spoons. I leave to Sara Molenaer, daughter of my daughter Maria, my great house and lot where I now live with the kitchen behind, and also eight inches of the lane between my said great house and my small house from front to rear. My daughter Maria is to receive the rents till her daughter Sara comes of age, or shall be married. If she dies under age, then the house is to go to her sister Catrina Praa. I also leave to said Sara, a saltcellar marked with the full name of Christina Roselaers and marked with her coat-of-arms, also a silver beaker marked the same, and a silver mustard pot marked with the name of Jacob Hay. Also my Church book with silver clasps and chain, and a silver cup and six silver spoons and a silver chain, one great ear spangle with ear jewels, and my largest hoop ring, and a gold finger ring with a diamond in it, and a silver tumbler marked J. H. I leave to Catrina Praa the child of my daughter Maria, and Peter Praa, a silver beaker and six silver spoons marked J. H. All the rest of estate is left to her daughter Maria Praa, and her grand child Sara Molenaer. She makes Hon. Nicholas Bayard, mayor, and her cousin Jacob Ver Hulst and Mr. John Harperdingh executors. If my son-in-law Peter Praa opposes this will, or if he misbehave himself as to the children, he shall be debarred from all benefits. Dated June 17, 1687. Witnesses, William Bogardus, Jacob Maurits. Codicil. I, Christina Cappaens, the widow of David Jochemsen, do confirm the above will, and as Jacob Verhulst, one of the executors is departed from hence, I appoint my cousin Rip Van Dam, merchant, to be executor in his place. If my executors deem it best that my daughter's child, Sara Molenaer, should be placed elsewhere to be maintained, they are to use the rents of the great house for that purpose. Dated September 2, 1693. Witnesses, Samuel Bayard, Gerardus Duyckinck. The above will is proved before David Jamieson, Secretary, November 15, 1693, and the executors take the oath on same day. Inventory of estate of Christina Cappaens, widow of David Jochemsen. Taken by Nicholas Bayard, Jan Harperdingh and Rip Van Dam, and approved by a Court of ye Worshipful Mayor of ye said city, by the oath of Isaac De Forrest and Jacobus Van der Spiegel. "The Testator's great house and lot of ground, to the north of Duke street, next to ye house and lot of Jan Harperdingh, bequeathed to her daughter's child, Sarah Molenaer, provided ye rents be received by her mother, Maria Praa, for her use till she be of age. The Testator's little house and lot, next to ye great house, bequeathed to her daughter, Maria Praa." "The Testator's farm on Nassau Island, in Maspeth Kills, now in possession of Peter Praa" (not valued). Silver Beaker, 12 ounces, at 7s., 14, 4s.; one gold rose diamond ring, 15; one silver pepper box, 2 1/2 oz., at 7s., 17s. 6d.; one silver beaker, marked with the full name of Christina Rasselaers, 16 oz., at 7s., 15, 12; one silver salt cellar, marked with the name of Christina Rasselaers, 14 oz., 14, 10s.; one Church book with silver clasps and chain, 11, 16; one gold ear pendant, with ye ear jewels, weight 2 oz. good, at 15 per ounce, 110. This inventory shows a very long list of household goods. Total not given. The above inventory is sworn to as being correct, by the executors, January 5, 169 3/4, before Abraham De Peyster, Mayor.

[NOTE.--The real estate mentioned in the above will, was left to Christina Cappaens by her husband David Jochemsen. The "great house and lot" is now No. 61 Stone Street. Peter Praa, the son-in-law, is probably the same man known in early deeds as Peter Praa Provoost. The house and lot No. 61 Stone Street was owned by David Provost, of Morris Co., New Jersey, and his heirs sold it to Freeman Clarkson, in 1792. In 1754 the "small house and lot" was sold to Cornelius Clopper, David Provost, Mathias Ernst and Elias Des Brosses by John Van Zandt, who owned one-quarter, and Abraham Schenck, of Bushwick, who owned three-quarters, the price being 1282. They bought this for a public street, and part of the purchase money was paid by the Corporation of New York, and part by public subscription. The above purchasers conveyed it to the city February 15, 1755. It is now the narrow alley leading from Stone street to South William street, and between Nos. 61 and 63 Stone street. It is the only street in the city without an official name, but was in former days popularly known as "Jews' Alley."--W. S. P.]

Her husband was probably named Johannes, Jonas, being used to connote wife of Jon (Johannes). Official midwife of New Amsterdam, hired by the DWIC. She made her second trip to New Amsterdam on "de Eendracht" ("the Unity"), Mar 21, 1630, with her dau Anneke and son-in-law, Roeloff Janszen. She asked for an increase in her wages in papers filed in 1635. She filed a declaration on Jul 7, 1644, respecting the confession of Hellegond Joris, as to the paternity of her child. It is believed that Masterland refers to Marstrand, on the coast of Sweden. She may therefore not have been Dutch, although as a trading port, Dutch citizens lived there. Owned Lot #1, Block G, Castello Plan, ground-brief, Feb 1644, confirmed by Gov Nicolls to the heirs of Anneke Bogardus, Jul 10, 1677. Her house, built in 1633, behind that of her dau, Anneke, was probably the house which Van Twiller ordered built for her. At about the time of her death, the lot next door was owned by Juriaen Blanck. Her property was later owned by Archibald Gracie (who later owned Gracie Mansion, the home of NYC Mayors). The Battery Park Building was built on this site (#21-24 State St).

In the marriage record, they were: Jacob Joosten, j.m. of Raagh, on the Moesel, in Duyslant [prob. Graach, on the Moselle, in Germany], Precenter [for the Church] and Schoolmaster here [in Wiltwyck, now Kingston], and Arriaentjen Verschuer, of Welpe [Velp] in Gelderlant, widow of Marckes Leendersen, resid. at Fort Orange [now Albany]. Married at Fort Orange. Banns pub. Wiltwyck first, 6 Aug; second, 13 Aug, third 20 Aug.

Fort Orange Record of 29 June 1661. (Pearson:Albany County Records p370) Jacob Vande Coelen, who Pearson identifies as Jacob Joosten Van Covelens, transfers his back wages and subsistence owed by the WIC to Maerzelus Jansen [Van Bommel?]. The record shows that Jacob has earned this in the service of 'lantspasaent' [lance corporal] for the Company.<sup>2</sup>

Jacop Joosten is recorded a few times in the Kingston records as court messenger, shooteacher and church official and taxpayer. He and Ariaentjen are also mentioned in connection with house sales in Albany and Jacob Joosten worked as a schoolteacher there along with Jan Becker. Some sources give him the surname 'Van Covelens'. Someone paid for some land in Midwout in 1672 and the clerk who dealt with the sale was a Jacob Joosten. (Flatbush Deeds Liber A was the source). Adriaentje sold their house in Albany in 1671 and she was acting on behalf of her husband. "Not as a widow."<sup>1</sup>
