The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

Archibald Kennedy was Receiver General of the Province of New York.

In his will, he wrote: "...I, Archibald Kennedy, being in good health. When it shall please God to call me, I do willingly leave to my wife the whole fortune and estate, real and personal, which she brought me on our marriage or since, in as good plight and condition as when it came to me," during her life, and which she is to accept in full discharge of my obligations to her. I also leave to her 1/2 of my negroes and stock and utensils of husbandry, with the whole of that farm at Pavonia, which I received from David Daniels, with the buildings. To hold the said farm and negroes and stocks until my daughter Katharine is of age. And this for the education and bringing up of my son Thomas and daughter Katharine. I also leave to my wife the use of plate and furniture and chaise, boats, and canoes, with power to bequeath them to my children. I leave to my son Thomas all my books and apparell and my little negro "Sampe." I leave to my daughter Katharine "the apparell and everything else

that did belong to the person of her mother." As to my other farm at Pavonia, and all the rest of my lands and residue of estate, my executors are to sell the same and divide the proceeds among my children. I give power to my executors to set a value upon the 500 acres of land in Evans Patent, which I purchased and had granted in the name of my son, James Kennedy, and I direct them to deliver to him so much of my estate, as with the value of the said land will make 1/5 of the residue of my estate. I also direct my executors to put a value on the 500 acres in Evans Patent, which I purchased and had granted to me in the name of my son, Robert Kennedy; and to deliver to him so much of my estate as with the said value will make 1/5 of my estate. My executors are to pay to my sons, Archibald and Thomas, each 1/5 of my estate when they are 21, and 1/5 to my daughter Katharine. I direct my executors to sell 1/2 of my negroes and stock and the farm at Pavonia which I recovered from David Daniels, and if my wife desires to purchase it she is to have the refusal. I make my wife and John Walter and James Alexander, Esq., executors. Dated (???) --, 1738. Witnesses, Charles Oncile, Abraham Marschalk, Walter Jones. Codicil.--I devise my two houses in Broadway, near the Fort, which I have lately purchased of the widow of Peter Bayard, and in one of which I now live, and in the other the Custom House is kept, with the lots, to my dear wife for life, and then to my daughter Katharine, but if she dies then to my sons, Archibald and Thomas. Dated March 13, 1745. Witnesses, James Alexander, Mary Alexander, Philip Van Brugh Livingston. Signed, sealed, and published and declared to be the last will and testament of the testator. In presence of us, June 28, 1753. George Harrison. Codicil.--Confirms the above will. My sons, James and Robert, being dead, I leave their shares to my other children. The value of the 500 acres of land mentioned in my will, is to be part of the share of my son Archibald. Bedloe's Island I give to my son Archibald, with all the appurtenances and buildings, during his life, with remainder to Robert Ellison and heirs during my son's life to prevent contingent remainders, and after his death to his eldest son. December 10, 1749. Witnesses, John Jones, Christopher Heysham, Robert Ellison. Proved, December 16, 1763. (Mary Kennedy was then the surviving executor).

[NOTE.--Archibald Kennedy was Receiver General and Collector of Customs in New York, and one of the prominent men of his day, and for many years was member of Council. This position he resigned a few months before his death "on account of age and other employments." He died after a few days illness June 14, 1763, aged about 78. His dwelling house was No. 3 Broadway. This belonged to Arent Schuyler, and descended to his daughter Eve, who married Peter Bayard. They sold it to Archibald Kennedy in June, 1745. He married Mary Schuyler, widow of Arent Schuyler, and she survived him about a year. The house and lot was left to his daughter, Katharine Kennedy, who married Dr. Jonathan Mallet. He and his children, Thomas, Anne, and Catharine, went to England, and they sold the house and lot to John Watts in 1792. The lot was 40 feet wide, and on it there were two houses, in one of which Archibald Kennedy kept the Custom House. The lot No. 1 Broadway was in early times owned by Colonel William Smith, of St. George's Manor, Long Island. He left it to his daughter Martha, wife of Colonel Caleb Heathcote. She sold it to Charles Sleigh, who conveyed it to Colonel Abraham De Peyster, and he sold it August 26, 1756, to Archibald Kennedy, Jr., who was afterward Earl of Cassilis. Upon this was erected the Kennedy mansion, one of the finest houses in the city, a view of which may be found in all histories of New York. His sons, John and Robert Kennedy, of Teignmouth, England, sold it to Nathaniel Prime December 13, 1810, for \$35,000.--W. S. P.]

In her will, she wrote: I, Mary Kennedy, of New York, widow of Hon. Archibald Kennedy, Esq., being sick and weak. Whereas, by an antenuptial agreement with my late husband, I am authorized to dispose of £1,000. I leave the same to my son-in-law (stepson), Captain Archibald Kennedy, on condition that he manumits and makes free my old and faithful negro woman called "Juba," and pay £100 for her support. And this being done, I leave him all my remaining estate and make him executor. Dated April 9, 1764. Witnesses, Lambert Moore, Charles Williams, Alexander Colden. Proved, May 23, 1764.

[NOTE.--Mary Kennedy was widow of Arent Schuyler, and was the second wife of Hon. Archibald Kennedy.--W. S. P.]

Archibald Kennedy left America as a young man and as a youth joined the Royal Navy, receiving a commission as captain 4 April 1757. In Dec 1763 he was in command of the *londe*, but is best known as the captain of the *Coventry* and was distinguished for gallantry. He eventually moved to Scotland, where he succeeded his grandfather as 11th Earl of Cassilis in Scotland, where he lived until his death, 29 Dec 1794.¹

"Daughter Ann, wife of Archibald Kennedy Esqr." was mentioned in the will of her father, John Watts, late of the Colony of New York but now of Jermyn Street, St. James, dated 3 July 1789, probated 12 Sep 1789.

On 7 May 1803 (recorded 4 Dec 1803, Bergen Co. R:168) Robert Kennedy Esq. and Jane, his wife, of the City of New York, conveyed to William Halsey of New Ark in the County of Essex, Attorney and Counsellor at Law, for \$50,000, [no acreage amount given] a farm tract known as "Kennedy's Farm" in New Barbadoes Neck in the Township of New Barbadoes, beginning S corner of the bridge across the Passaic River at Town of New Ark. Mentioned are Fox Island; William Sandford's Salt Meadow; Passaic River; Brick Dock; meadow lately belonging to Isaac Gouverneur; line of Jacob Ogden, Cornelius Tuers and others; the Park; corner Peter Sandford's land; land lately conveyed by parties of the first part to Thomas Ward, Nathan Squire, Ezekiel Ball, Junior, and the said William Halsey and by them to one Benjamin Williams. Excepting parcels conveyed 10 March 1801. Signed by Robt Kennedy, Jane Kennedy. Witnessed by Abr Macomb, James Hedden.²

On 7 May 1803 (recorded 4 Dec 1803, Bergen Co. R:177) Robert Kennedy Esq. and Jane his wife, of the City of New York, conveyed to William Halsey of New Ark, County of Essex, for \$5,000, 346 acres more or less, being a tract of salt meadow in the County of Bergen on the Hackensack River between the lower Bridge and New Ark Bay. Beginning at or near the mouth of a small brook on the W side of said River, Punkies Kill, Excepting 46-30/100 conveyd to [blank] Post, George Vreelandt, and Jacob Vreelandt of Bergen Neck. Signed by Robt. Kennedy, Jane Kennedy. Witnessed by Abr. Macomb, James Hedden.²

On 19 November 1803 (recorded 3 August 1805, Bergen Co. V:228) William Halsey and Julia, his wife, of New Ark in the County of Essex, conveyed to David Hunt of Paulus Hook, for \$3,500, 11-40/100 acres being several parcels of the farm lately belonging to Robert Kennedy, Esquire, commonly known as Kennedy's Farm; mentioned lots conveyed by Robert Kennedy, Esquire: lot no. 18 Moses T. Crane; Nicholas Cruger; John G. Warren of the City of New York, now belonging to Capt. Pell; lot no. 8 to Mathias Day and John Hawthorn of New Ark, but now belonging to Cornelius Tuers; Passaic River; lot no. 10 to Johnson Tuttle of the City of New York; lot 71 to Samuel Griffin, Esquire; lot 74 to one Hoyt of the City of New York. Except lot 78 conveyed to Alexander McComb of New York...[deed goes on with more detail and descriptions]. Signed William Halsey, Julia Halsey. Witnessed by Moses Hedden, James Hedden.²

On 2 January 1804 (recorded 12 Jan 1804, Bergen Co. R:270) William Halsey and Julia his wife of New Ark in the County of Essex, conveyed to Nathan Squire of South Orange, for \$5,000., a tract of 46-30/100 acres more or less commonly called Salt Meadow which Robert Kennedy and Jane, his wife, conveyed to said William Halsey by "deed dated sometime in the months of April or May last past," lying in the County of Bergen between the Hackensack River and Punk Creek [elsewhere "Punkie's Kill"]. Refers to survey made of said meadow in 1767. Mentions south side of Old Ferry Road causeway extending from Punk Creek to Hackensack River excepting tracts conveyed by Riobert Kennedy and Jane, his wife, through deeds to three persons, two by name of Vreelandt, one by name of Post, inhabitants of Bergen Point. Signed by William Halsey, Julia Halsey. Witnessed by Moses Hedden, James Hedden.²
