The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolution of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

Adriaen Lane lived at New Utrecht, N. Y., Middletown, N. J., and then Readington, N. J. He seems to have resided at one period at Gravesend, L. I., but was of New Utrecht in 1693, and also in 1698, when he was enrolled on the census list as having in his family himself, wife, two children and one slave. In 1700 he conveyed land at New Utrecht to his brother Gysbrecht, then stating he was of Middletown, so that he probably removed to Monmouth Co., in 1699. On June 20, 1701, "Adrian Leane" purchased land at Middletown on "Marvill Hill" bounded by Swimming River and Hogneck creek, of Peter Tilton, a carpenter, but then he is stated to be of New Utrecht. (Trenton Deeds, Book H. p. 41). On Nov. 20, 1704, he made a quit-claim conveyance (no wife joining) of land at Middletown to Adriaen Brown (Trenton Deeds, Book A A A, p. 98).

Adriaen could have remained but a few years in Monmouth, for by 1711 he went to the vicinity of Readington, Hunterdon Co., near the borders of Somerset. He was the first Lane to go to this part of New Jersey, thus antedating those who went to Bedminster in Somerset by a third of a century. Adriaen, at Readington, founded the large line of Lanes of that vicinity.

On Oct. 9, 1711, he purchased of John and Catherine Van Horn, of New York City, for £150, 450 acres of land near Holland's brook, Readington, then Amwell twsp., (through which ran the division between East and West Jersey). On Dec. 12, 1715, he sold to Andreas Emmons, of Long Island, 300 acres of this tract, as appears by a deed of partition of May 26, 1755 (unrecorded), reciting the fact, between Andreas Emmons' sons, John and James Emmons, showing they equally divided this land, which descended to them from their father.

The 450 acre deed to Adriaen is referred to in a subsequent deed given by him and his wife "Yannietie" to Joseph Stout, Apr. 8, 1719, by which he seems to have sold off the balance, then said to be 155 acres. (Trenton Deeds, Book B 2, p. 367). To this deed his name was signed, "Adriaen Lane."

On Dec. 6, 1718, according to a statement published by the late Rev. Henry P. Thompson, who may have seen a deed not on record, he purchased land, probably adjoining the first purchase and this must have been where he finally located. This must have been bought of Thomas Stevenson and consisted of perhaps 450 acres. On Oct. 14, 1731, he sold 153 acres of this second purchase to Garret Van Sicklen, and in the deed it is stated to be land "which Adriaen purchased of Thomas Stevenson, late of Pennsylvania." (Trenton Deeds, Book D D, pp. 220, 245). Garret Van Sicklen may have been his brother-in-law. As his second wife did not join in this deed it is presumed she was then deceased.

In 1724 he was an executor of the will of Henry Traphagen. (Trenton Wills, Book A, p. 290). On Apr. 12, 1738, when it was proposed to build a new Dutch church at present Readington village (the church, being known as that of North Branch, was previously located near the head of the Raritan river, on lands occupied by the late John Vosseller in his life time) Adriaen (again no wife joining) conveyed 147 rods of land to the church wardens "John Vanskel [Van Sickle] and Nicholas Wick-off," for that purpose. The church was therein called "The Dutch Church of Rarington." (Trenton Deeds, Book O, p. 177).

He received his father's plantation, probably on the latter's death, extending from the Readington ch. southward, and probably resided on it until toward the close of his life, when, for some reason, he went to Shrewsbury, where his cousin, Cornelius had lived. By his will (which seems not to have been recorded), of Jan., 1785, he devised his farm at Readington to his sons, Aaron and Gilbert.

In his will, he wrote: ...22 June 1770, I, Daniel Lane, of the Manor of Cortlandt, in Westchester County. "First I order £8 to be paid out of my movables towards paying the back rent of my farm, which I have leased from Col. Henry Beekman." I leave to my eldest son, Hyatt Lane, a part of my said farm, "Beginning at the northeast corner of said farm, and running south by the farm of Robert Gawlerd, 20 chains; then west parallel with the north line, to a brook by my house, which the road goes over. Then south 10 rods, then west to the first brook, west of my barn, then north 10 rods, then west to the land of William Oakley, then north to the north line of my farm, and then east to beginning." And my sons, Nathaniel and Stephen, are to have liberty to pass along the cart road, which we now use. My wife Mary and my son Stephen are to have the use of the two east rooms in my house. I leave to my son Stephen a part of my farm next south of the above, and he is to allow my son Nathaniel the use of the orchard. All the rest of my said farm I leave to my son Nathaniel, except 12 acres to my son Joseph where his house stands, bounded west by the road, and south by the farm of John Lyons. I leave to my wife Mary a horse, cow, 2 sheep, and a bed. I leave to my son Hyatt £25 which belongs to him, and which is in a bond from Robert Gawlerd. All the rest of my movable estate is to be sold. I leave to my wife 1/3 of the money, and 2/3 to my sons, Daniel, Joseph, Nathaniel, and Stephen, and my daughter Mary, wife of John Secord. I make Joseph Lane, of Duchesse County, and my son Hyatt, executors. Witnesses, Cornight Briggs, Ebenezer White, Joseph Strang, merchant. Proved, March 8, 1775.

Guisbert came to New Netherland with his father and siblings on the ship "*Rosetree*" in 1663. Guisbert was obviously named for his maternal grandfather.

Geysbrecht Thyssen (who became known both as Geisbert, and also as Gilbert Lane), from Liege, Belgium, emigrated with his father in 1663. He was a member of the New Utrecht Dutch ch. in 1677 and a deacon in 1683.

He was living at New Utrecht in 1698, when his name appears on the census roll as "Gysbert Tysse," with himself, wife and seven children ("Doc. Hist. of N. Y." Vol. 3, p. 88); evidently his two older sons were then living away from home. In 1706 he was assessed there for eighty-three acres of land, purchased in 1700 of his half-brother, Adriaen. On Apr. 23, 1709, he purchased of Rev. Alexander Innes, of Middletown, 460 acres of land in Middletown twsp., in Monmouth Co., NJ, for £5 10. It is described in the deed as bounded by Swimming River, Robert Morris, Daniel Applegate and Hop River. (Trenton Deeds, Book I., p. 387). This he made his homestead, for he removed to Monmouth co. in that year. On Feb. 5, 1710, he purchased 200 acres in the adjoining township of Shrewsbury, of Tobias Hansen, of Dover, N. H., for £50, (Monmouth Deeds, Book D. p. 138). This tract he conveyed to his "loving son, Cornelius," June 5, 1711. Geisbert was then nearly sixty years of age, and Cornelius, who probably married that year was twenty-six. The second son, Matthias, did not marry until the next year; and three years later, May 20, 1715, Geisbert conveyed the homestead of 460 acres to his son, Matthias; consideration £500. (Monmouth Deeds, Book E., p. 344). Of Geisbert's eldest son, Adriaens, who was probably living in 1727, when his father died.

In the same year that he removed to Monmouth the "Reformed Congregation of Freehold and Middletown," was organized in what is the present village of Marlborough, and "Gisbert Laen and Jannetie Lammense" are recorded as two of the organizing members, along with members of the Van Deventer, Wykoff, van Doorn, Schenck, Cowenhoven, etc., families.

Geisbert lived twelve years after conveying his homestead to Matthias. The draftsman of his will, evidently an English lawyer, used the name "Gilbert Lane," the English equivalent for Gysbrecht, and for Geisbert, but it took another century for the Dutch to go out of use. Geisbert's signature to his will was by mark. This will, dated Nov. 7, 1720, was probated May 17, 1727. (Trenton Wills, Book B., p. 66). In it he names his sons "Adriaens, Cornelius, Matthias and Joseph who is blind," and his daughters, "Moika Langstreet, Catherine D'Hart, Mary van Sicklah and Jane," and "grandchildren born of my daughter, Williamea Hendrickson, deceased, wife of William Hendrickson, deceased." The three sons first named were executors. His



real estate was directed to be sold and the money divided into eight parts, to be equally given to eight of his nine children; the other child, Joseph, being blind, was to have a fund set apart out of the estate for his support.

Geisbert's wife, Jannetje, must have lived thereafter with her son, Matthias, as on June 16, 1732, etc., he gave bonds to his co-executors to contribute £8 yearly for the support of his mother, "Jane Lane." (Monmouth Deeds, Book H., pp. 67, 107).

Hendrick Thys Lanen Van Pelt emigrated with his father to this country on the ship, *Rosetree*, in March 1663.

In the (1) marriage record, they were: Betrothed the 14th Sept. Hendrick Matthijsz, young man from Buurmalsen in Gelderland, residing at N. Utrecht, with Annetje Tilemans, widow of Dirk Hattem, born at Fort Margriete in Brazil, residing at the Yellow Hook under Brooklyn; witnesses, bride's father, Tileman Jacobz; with certificate from bridegroom's father. Married at N. Utrecht, the 28th September by Dom. Schaatz.

His name was on the Assessment Lists of Brooklyn in 1676 and 1683, and he took the oath of allegiance there in 1687 as having been in this country "21 years."

In the Flatbush Ref Ch record of their (2) banns, they were: Betrothed the 25 April 1690 Henderick Tijsen Lanen, widower of Annetje Tielemans, with Marijtie Bennet, widow of Johannes Christiaense; both residing at the Yellow Hook under Brooklyn.

Hendrick Thyse Lane died intestate, leaving children under age. Guisbert Thyse Lane and John Van Dyck, the brother and brother in law of said Hendrick Thyse Lane, were appointed administrators, January 25, 1693/4.

The will of Henry Lane, of Paramus, Bergen county, merchant, dated December 27, 1762, was proved January 29, 1763, so that it was probably a death-bed will. The testator devises to his wife, Elizabeth, one-third of his real estate (not described) in "Bargin" county and in New York, and all his silver-plate; one-third of said real estate to his son, William Henry Lane, and one-third to his daughter, Geesie Lena. He leaves a legacy to his wife's mother, Geesie Lena Rousby. Executors—his wife and William Rousby, of New York, merchant. The West Jersey Society gave a power of attorney, dated May 7, 1752, to Henry Lane and Lewis Johnston, which was revoked August 5, 1761. In the meantime Henry Lane had executed two conveyances as agent and attorney of the Society. One of them recites that Thomas Lane, one of the Committee of the West Jersey Society, was eldest son of John Lane, who was eldest son of Sir Thomas Lane, Knight, and Alderman of London. The executrix advertised, February 28, 1763, "four valuable plantations (pleasantly situated) in Salem county, and a dwelling house and lot in New York." She also advertised for sale certain tracts upon Ancocus brook, in Bergen county, which elicited a warning from the East Jersey Proprietors, who claimed the title to be still in them.

In the 1640 record of their marriage, they were: "Mattijs Pelt, soldier under Captain De Swart, and Maryken Gijberts, young daughter of Buermalsen."<sup>1</sup>

Mattys Janszen Laenen Van Pelt emigrated with his brother Teunis, and their families in March 1663 on *The Rose Tree*. They were born in the village of Overpelt in what was then the Prince Bishopric of Liege but is now in the province of Limburg, Belgium. He sailed on *The Rose Tree* with his wife and four children aged respectively 17, 15, 13 and 11 years of age. She died on the passage over so that, when he arrived at New Amsterdam, he was a widower.

Immediately after his arrival he settled in New Utrecht, Long Island, where his name appears on the assessment rolls of 1675 and 1676. Matthys Janszen Laenen Van Pelt lived in New Utrecht, Long Island from 1664 to 1675, when he settled in Gravesend, L.I., where he lived until his death. Matthys signed his name "Thys Jansen van Pelt," not using the "Laenen" at all, but this simply followed custom. The "van Pelt" was not used by any of his children. His children began to take the surname **Lane**.

In September, 1687, when the oath of allegiance was administered on Long Island to all adult males, two of Matthys' sons took the oath and were described as "natives," i. e., born there: hence we know that Jan and Jacob were children by his second wife. They are entered on the lists as follows: "Jan Thyssen Laenen, native; Jacob Thyssen Laenen, native." At the same time Matthys' brother, Teunis, was put down as: "Theunis Janse van Pelt Laenen; 24 yrs." In the latter case it will be noticed that "Laenen" is placed last, and "van Pelt" before it, although contrary to Teunis' signature. Matthys, himself, was not living in 1687 and hence his name does not appear.

His widow, Adriantje Hendricks m. (2) 20 May 1683 **Cornelius Wynhard**, who had emigrated (in 1657) from Groningen, Holland. She was Wynhard's second wife.

The executors sold the land on 5 April 1722 to Isaac Van Nuiss of "Rarreton" in East Jersey. The land was 100 acres and included the house and barns, etc. They got 387 pounds 10 shillings for it. The land was in "Springfeild in Jamaica". It was where Tice Lanne had lived and died.
