The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

In his will, he wrote: 16 January, 1721/2. I, Anthony Ludlam, of the town of Southampton in Suffolk County, "being natural in health of body." I leave to my wife, Rebecca Ludlam, £50, according to bonds drawn before our marriage. Whereas my daughter, Patience Shaw, has already received of me the sum of £50 as her portion, I leave to her my negro boy called Cesar. I leave to my son, Samuel Ludlam, all my buildings, lands, meadows, and Commonages in Southampton and elsewhere, Also my negro boy called "Cofe;" Also one red bedstead and furniture and one horse, two oxen, two cows, ten sheep, and cart and plough and plough irons, and my wearing apparel, and my cane, gun, and sword. If he die without issue, then they are to be divided among my four daughters, Patience, Phebe, Sarah, and Temperance. If my son Samuel shall marry a wife and die leaving his widow with a daughter or daughters and no sons, then his widow shall have what estate she brought with her to him, and also £20, and his daughters are to have an equal division with my daughters. Whereas my daughter, Phebe Haines, has received from me £50, I also give her my negro boy "Firns." And as my daughter, Sarah Baker, has received £50, I also give her my negro boy Peter. I give my daughter, Temperance, £53, and a negro boy "Stephen," when she is eighteen. All the rest of my personal property to my 5 children. I appoint my friend, Jonah Rogers, and Thomas Reeves my brother in law, and James Haines and John Mitchell the overseers of my will. Witnesses, Jacob Wood, John Cook, Elias Cook. Proved, April 29, 1724. [Note.--Anthony Ludlam was son of Anthony, and grand son of William Ludlam, who was the first of the name in Southampton. These families all lived in Bridge Hampton, and their descendants are still there.--W. S. P.]

In his will, he wrote: "...I, Charles Ludlam, of Hog Island, in Oyster Bay, in Queens County, being this 18 of September, 1768, in a poor state of health." My executors are to pay all debts. I leave to my wife Mary one bed and furniture, and the same to my sons, Joseph and William, and to my daughter Deborah. My executors are to sell all real and personal estate, and after paying debts, I leave 1/3 of the rest to my son Joseph, and the remainder to my wife Mary, and my daughter Deborah, and my son William when he is 22 years old. I make my friend, Thomas Smith, of Hog Island, and Thomas Cock, of Mill Neck, and my wife, executors. Witnesses, Charles Zeke, Henry Ludlam, Daniel Dodge. Proved, January 5, 1769.

In his will, he wrote: I, Henry Ludlam, of Jamaica, in Queens County, yeoman, being sick. I leave to my wife Damaris, the use of 1/3 of all buildings and my two orchards and meadow land, and all my cleared lands, with liberty of getting fencing stuff out of my wood land, and her firewood. And she is to have 1/3 of all debts due me, and two cows and my best horse, and my riding chaise, and 1/3 of all my meat and grain. I leave to my two sisters, Ruth Smith, of Jamaica, widow, and Hannah, wife of Joshua Carpenter, of the same place, the other 2/3 of all lands and estate, during their lives, and then to William and Thomas Smith, sons of my sister, Ruth Smith, and to her grandsons, John and Ludlam Smith, and to the 6 daughters of my sister, Hannah Carpenter, Ruth, Hannah, Judith, Rachel, Milicent, and Sarah. And the said John Smith shall give to his brother, Howell Smith, and to his two sisters, Millicent and Hannah Smith, each £10. I make my cousin, William Ludlam, and my brother-in-law, Joshua Carpenter, executors. Dated May 27, 1752. Witnesses, Obadiah Mills, Thomas Reed, S. Clowes.

Proved, October 25, 1752.

In her will, she wrote: ...I Damaris Ludlam, of Jamaica, in Queens County, widow, being sick. I leave to my sister, Elizabeth Smith, and my cousins [nieces], Mary McNish, wife of Mr. George McNish, Sarah Van Dyke, and Ruth Scott, daughters of my sister Jemima all my apparell. I leave to my cousin, Isaac Mills, of Jamaica, £20; To my sister, Elizabeth Smith, £10; and to my cousin, Mary McNish £8; and to her daughter, Ruth McNish, £6; To Samuel Knap, son of my sister Jemima, £6; To my cousins, Ruth Smith and Abigail Mott, daughters of my sister Ruth, deceased, £3 each. All the rest of my estate to be sold by my executors, and after paying all expenses, I leave the remainder to all the legatees above mentioned, except Ruth Smith and Abigail Mott. I make Thomas Bayles and Daniel Bayles, both of Jamaica, executors. Dated May 26, 1767. Witnesses, Males Lewis, John Smith, Robert Hinchman. Proved, June 5, 1767.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Isaac Ludlam, of Goshen, in Orange County, being weak in body. My executors are to sell enough movables to pay debts, to the best advantage. I leave to my wife Catharine 1/3 of all my movable estate, and a negro woman, and the use of my house, barn, and home lot, so long as she remains my widow. I leave to my son Isaac the remainder of my two Home Lots in Goshen, No. 17 and 18, and 40 acres in my South East Division Lots, to be taken off the north west end, adjoining the land of my son-in-law, Samuel Denton, and running across my lot to the land of Daniel Everitt, and he shall allow my son John a road, where the old road now is, to the public highway at the rear of the Home Lots. I leave to my son John the remainder of the said lots, with the improvements. I leave to my son Benjamin the whole of my Home Lot that I now live on. Also 100 acres at the west end of my East Division Lot, No. 18, with my dwelling-house and barn. I leave to my said three sons all my undivided lands in the Patent of Wawayanda. To my son Benjamin my oxen and cart. To my daughter Elizabeth £50, and the privilege to live in my house, and also pasture and firewood. I leave the rest of my movables to my daughters Sarah and Elizabeth. The remainder of my East Division Lot, that adjoins William Jackson, is to be sold. I make my son Isaac, and my son-in-law, Samuel Denton, executors. Dated October 20, 1766. Witnesses, Daniel Everitt, John Yale, Jr., John Gerow. Proved, August 1, 1767.

William Ludlam, with his wife Clemence, came from Matlock, Derbyshire, England, to Boston, MA in 1640 and removed to Southampton, Long Island [NY], about 1653. He built an extensive flour mill on a small stream nearby, now called Water Mill. He had seven children.

In his will, dated 27 April 1665, proved 2 Nov 1667 (Liber 1, page 1, New York Co.), William Ludlam, of Southampton, mentions son Anthony; son Joseph; daus. Grace, Frances and Mary; “eldest child of my son William”; “my son Henry’s child”; “ay daughter Grace’s child”; and “the eldest child of my daughter Frances.” Named son Henry executor. Witnesses, John Howell, John Cooper.

In her will, she wrote: (Will: Abstracts of Wills of the Office, New York, Vol.IX 1777-1783 Liber 32 page 204) Dated 18 Feb.1775 Proved 10 Mar.1777 -- ...I Patience Ludlum, of Jamaica, in Queens County, widow, being in good health. All debts to be paid. I leave to my granddaughter, Patience Ludlum, daughter of my son William Ludlum, £5. To my granddaughter Mary Ludlum, daughter of my son Daniel Ludlum, £5. To my granddaughter, Patience Ludlum, daughter of my son Nicholas, £5. To my great granddaughter, Patience Smith, daughter of my grandson, Ludlum Smith, L5. All these to be paid when of age. I leave to my son Daniel Ludlum, 20 shillings current money of New York for and towards bying him a large Bible. And to my son Nicholas, 20 shillings for the same purpose. I leave my son Nicholas, £20. To my daughter Judith £20. To my granddaughter, Patience Ludlum, my black silk cloak, best pair of gloves, and a white apron. All the rest of my wearing apparell to my three daughters, Mary wife of Amos Denton, Elizabeth, wife of Daniel Everett, and Judith, and to my granddaughter, Patience, wife of Andrew Oakley. All the rest to my three daughters. I make my son in-law Daniel Everett, and my cousin, Moses Higby, executors. Dated Feb.18,1775. Witnesses, William Ludlum Jr. Robert Hinchman, Proved Mar,10,1777.
