

-- MOTT --

The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

Adam Mott was the ancestor of the Long Island family of that name, came from Essex, Eng., and is probably the Adam who emigrated in the ship "Bevis" in 1638, then aged 19 years, and by profession a taylor. As a possible relative of the Motts of New England, he may have followed them there and perhaps was in Rhode Island where the Indian wars not suiting his fancy, he returned to New Amsterdam where under Gov. Kieft's administration lands were granted to many of the New England immigrants.

In 1644 and 1645 he was a witness in the Shepens and Burgomasters Court in New Amsterdam. (See trans. of Dutch Mss. Vol. II., pp. 236-270; Vol. III., pp. 24-265, Albany, N. Y.)

On 23 Aug., 1646, Gov. Kieft granted him a patent for 25 morgans of land (50 acres) on the west side of Mespatches Kills (now Newtown Creek, L. I.), opposite the plantation of Richard Brundel. (Doc. Rel. to Col. Hist., N. Y., Vol. XIV., p. 66.) This grant of land he soon conveyed to one Wm. Golding, but continued to reside in New Amsterdam where he was engaged in trading, and also as an agent for Richard Smith, as late as 1651. (See Trans. Dutch Mss., Albany, N. Y.)

In the (1) marriage record, they were: Adam Maet, j. m. Uyt Graefschap Esseck, en Jenne Hulet, j.d. Uyt 't Graefschap Buckingham.

April 22, 1665, he was commissioned by Gov. Richard Nicolls as Lieut. of the Hempstead Militia. (Liber. 2, p. 26, Conveyances, Sec'y of State's Office, Albany.)

Lieut. Adam Mott, and his neighbor Henry Disbrowe, and Cornelius Mott of Hempstead were engaged in the growing of tobacco, and between 1660 and 1670 each one had during that time tobacco houses on Mad Nans Neck. (B, p. 19, Wills, N. Y. City; Hemp. Records, B, p. 156.) The translations of the Dutch Mss., Albany, N. Y., show him as engaged in some enterprise in the South River (now the Delaware). This was in 1651, and he was in all probability then buying tobacco which at that period was sold in large quantities by the Long Island traders to the neighboring Dutch plantations. Adam Mott was then living in New Amsterdam, and occupied with Randel Hunt a house owned by Richard Smith, Jr., son of Richard of Conn. (See Trans. Dutch Mss., part 3, p. 265, N. Y. State Library.) He was commissioned by Gov. Rich'd Nicolls as Lieutenant of the Hempstead Militia on 22 April, 1665. The commission is recorded in Liber., 2, folio 26 of Deeds in Sec'y of State Office, Albany, and also name John Symons (Seaman) as Capt., and John Rushmore as Ensign.

The old homestead on Mad Nans Neck, where he finally settled and died, and which later became the home of his son William, was purchased on 28 Jan., 1670, of Henry Disbrowe (120 acres, cons. £61). This was formerly laid out to Capt. John Seaman, who conveyed it to Thos. Seabrooke, 29 Aug., 1669, and from him it passed to Disbrowe (original deeds in possession of Mott family).

In 1656, he removed to town of Hempstead, L. I., and settled in the village of that name, where he was probably living when chosen townsman on 17 March, 1657. Feb. 4, 1663, he was one of the commissioners who signed the agreement between John Scott, president of the English towns of Long Island, and Gov. Stuyvesant to provide for the free intercourse between the inhabitants under the Dutch and the English. (Doc. Rel. to Col. Hist., N. Y., Vol. XIV., p. 544.) April 22, 1665, he was commissioned by Gov. Richard Nicolls as Lieut. of the Hempstead Militia. (Liber. 2, p. 26, Conveyances, Sec'y of State's Office, Albany.)

On 23 April, 1669, John Richbell conveyed to John Ryder of N. Y. City, certain lands in Mamaroneck for the support of his present wife Anne, after his decease, etc. It recites that his marriage with her had long since been solomenized. (Liber., 4, p. 1, Deeds, Office of Sec'y of State, Albany.)

In his will, he wrote: March 12, 1681/2, I, Adam Mott, being aged 60 or thereabouts, now very sicke, do now declare this to be my last will and testament." He leaves to his eldest son, Adam, 50 acres of land that is yet to be taken up, and 5 shillings in money. Leaves to son James 2 cows and a Hollow lying by the Harbor path. To his daughter Grace 4 great pewter platters and those Hollows lying between the Great Run and Tanders Hook, those two hollows which lyeth upon ye left hand of said path, going to ye Towne, from Madnan's Neck. And 3 Hollows, one lying and next to the other side of the Great Run. Leaves to his son John, my lot of meadow at Whale Neck and my Hollow by the Harbor path. To son Joseph, 100 acres of land, where he shall see good, to take up for his use, and a Hollow which lyeth by the west Hollow in the Sandy Hollow, which is a great Hollow. To son Gersham, 5 cows. To son Henry, 3 cows and 2 heifers. Leaves to his wife Elizabeth, and the children I have by her, my house and lot upon Madnans Neck and all the rest of the estate not above mentioned, only my house and orchard and out houses in Hempstead, the main Hollow in particular, I do give to my youngest son Adam. But if my wife see cause to marry, then the estate which I have given to her and her children shall be divided into four parts. She is to have one part and the rest to the children. As to the four Proprietor rights which I have in the town of Hempstead, my wife is to have her choice of two, and the rest is to go to my four eldest sons. Dated March 22, 1681/2. Witnesses, Joseph Sutton, Sr., Wm. Peatte, Joseph Sutton, Jr.

Inventory of estate of Adam Mott, taken by Jonathan Smith, Sr., and Jonathan Smith, Jr., Hempstead, (???) 5, 1690. Total amount, £182. Jacob Leisler, Esq., Lieutenant-Governor, Commander in Chief, etc. To all to whom these presents shall come, know ye that at the Court of Sessions in Queens Co., held April 8, the will of Adam Mott was proved. The same is confirmed and Letters of Administration are granted to his widow Elizabeth Mott, May 12, 1690.

On Sept. 25, 1691, Adam Mott (the oldest son) was also appointed administrator on the estate, his petition reciting that his father had died intestate. (See Calendar Hist. Mass., part II., p. 217; Liber. 3 & 4, p. 285, N. Y. City.) Then on p. 292, Letters of Administration were granted to Elizabeth Mott, widow, and Adam Mott, eldest son of Adam Mott of Hempstead, reciting "that since Adam Mott appeared for administration and same was granted him, the said Elizabeth has produced a codicil of the same, and the witnesses being present, etc., etc., do grant to said Adam and Elizabeth administration, and any grant for-

merly made to said Adam to the contrary notwithstanding," dated at Fort Wm. Henry, 30 Oct., 1691 Then on p. 294 is recorded the codicil (so called) which in all respects is same as the one recorded on p. 129, and was again proved before Richard Ingolsby, 30 Oct., 1691.

His widow, Elizabeth m. (3) 1691 **Robert Hubbs** of Mad Nans Neck.

Much controversy arose between Elizabeth Hubbs and her "son-in-law Adam Mott, Jr.," as she calls him, concerning her late husband's will, but on 5 Nov., 1691, an agreement was entered into which recites that "the will of her deceased husband Adam Mott shall stand good, etc., etc., in all particulars hereinafter mentioned, etc., etc." This was signed by Elizabeth Hubbs, and her son Richbell Mott (Mott Family Mss.). This agreement gave Adam Mott, "the elder" son, lands on Mad Nans Neck not bequeathed him under the will, which he conveyed on 12 April, 1694, to "the children his deceased father had by his last wife Elizabeth being six in number." (Queens Co. Conveyances, Liber., B. p. 114.) On 28 June, 1696, Mary Anna Mott, one of the six children named ("then being of full age"), released her rights under the will to her brothers Richbell, William, Charles and Adam "the younger." On 29 Oct., 1703, Elizabeth, another of the six children, and her husband John Okeson, released their rights to same children for £82.

In 1707, April 2, a final agreement was made between the four brothers by which Adam, "the younger," William and Richbell received lands on Great Neck, and Charles land on Cow Neck and Rockaway, each one settling on their respective lands excepting Adam, "the younger," who settled on Cow Neck. The latter in 1715 conveyed his land on Great Neck to his brother William, whose descendants retained the same until 1870, when the old homestead of seven generations passed into the hands of Wm. R. Grace.

In March 1674, "Adam Mott, junior" was a seaman on the ketch *Hopewell* from New York to Virginia.

He settled in Rockaway, L. I. In 1719, he conveyed land there to John Mott, by deed recorded in Hempstead Rec., Liber. 3, p. 130, at Jamaica, in which he names his wife Mary. On Dec. 9, 1683, he was chosen Town Assessor (Hemp. Rec., 1898, Vol. I., p. 419).

His family appears in the 1698 census of Hempstead: Mr. Adam Mott; Mrs. Mary Mott; An Mott; Mary Mott; Adam Mott, jr.; Nicholas Stillwell.

They were Quakers. He settled at Cow Neck.

In his will, he wrote: of Hempstead, in Queens County, being weak of body." My negro man is to be sold, and the money used to help pay debts, and also what grain and swine I have to spare more than is wanting for support of family. I leave to my sons Adam and Stephen, all my houses and land on Low Neck, and throughout the whole limits and Patent of Hempstead. I leave to my daughter Elizabeth 1/2 of cattle, sheep, and swine, when she is 18, also my great table and chest and bed. My executors are to let out the land that was formerly Stephen Johnson's, that lyeth on the north side of Richard Thorne's land, Also the north 1/2 of the 28 acres of land that lyeth further west, until my son Stephen comes of age. And my sons are to pay to my daughter Elizabeth, £50, when they are 25 years of age. I leave to my wife Phebe all other movable estate, and she is to give my sons, "each a young mare fit to ride," when they are 17 years old, and £15 when they are 21. Mentions "my brother Richbell's children," "my brother William Mott's children," "my brother Charles Mott's children." I direct that my children "are to have Good School learning, that is, English fit for Country business." I make my wife Phebe and Richard Mott and William Mott, Jr., and John Willis, all of Hempstead, executors. Dated September 3, 1738. Witnesses, Richard Thorne, Jr., Amos Dodge, Thomas Pearsall, James Powell. Proved, February 28, 1739.

He received a deed from his father 15 June 1713 for land at Rockaway.

He was living on Staten Island by 1725. He was a Member of Assembly from Richmond Co., 1737/1739. County Clerk of Richmond Co., 1728-1738.

On 11 Feb 1747 Peter Galloway and his wife Elizabeth conveyed by deed to Adam Mott of the county of Richmond in the Colony of New York, for £350, several parcels of land in Dover Hundred, lying upon Dover Creek and Dover River, with their houses, barns, etc., Richbell Mott being one of the witnesses. On the same day, the same grantors conveyed to the same graantees 180 acres of land "called Willinbrook" in Little Creek Hundred in the same county. On 22 Feb 1748 (acknowledgment under date of 11 March 1748), Adam Mott of Kint Co. [Delaware] conveyed to his "son Richbell Mott" of the same place the Dover lands bought of Galloway the year before.¹

On 7 Feb 1749 letters of administration were issued to "Richbel Mott, son of Adam Mott, dec'd" said Adam having lately died intestate.¹

She left a will, calling herself of Richmond Co., 30 Jan., 1777, prob. 2 April, 1778, naming children Richard Mott, Elizabeth Mott, Ann Mott, and Mary Mott; and gr. dau. Elizabeth, the dau. of my dau. Elisabeth Seaman; gr. son Richard Seaman and John Micheau, both of Richmond Co., executors.

Apparently a separation had occurred from his wife, for when her father Richard Seaman "of Herricks in the bounds of Hempstead" wrote his will on 15 5th month 1751, he gave to her the use of the house he had "bought from Searing, with certain personal effects, "all these she is to have during the time she doth or shall live separate from her husband Richbell Mott, or if he should die, then to her use during her widowhood." and in a codicil dated 17 April 1752 revoking this bequest adds "she shall have the use of the new house I am building...so long as she lives separate from her husband." Richbell Mott died leaving four children: Sara, now the wife of Matthew

Manlove; Richard Mott; Seaman Mott; and Elizabeth, the wife pf Solomon Seamans.¹

In 1701 he and his brothers Richbell and William had land laid out to them in Hempstead. 1721 deed to his son Gershom. 1726 deed to his son Charles, Jr. 1738 deed to his son Adam. He had land at Kakiat (New Hempstead), Orange Co., NY.

In his will, he wrote: I, Charles Mott, of Hempstead, in Queens County, yeoman, being weak in body." I leave to my son, Amos Mott, the farm and homestall where I now dwell, lying near Hempstead Harbor; and he is to pay to my wife £4 a year; I also leave to him 1/2 of my right of undivided lands in Hempstead, and a negro boy. I leave to my son, Adam Mott, the other half of my undivided lands in Hempstead. In 1679, then a prisoner in N. Y., he petitioned to be forgiven for selling liquor to the Indians (Col. Hist. Mss., p. 77), and in April of that year he was given a home lot in the town of Hempstead.

On July 14, 1690, then calling himself of Mamaroneck, he conveyed to his brother Joseph of Hempstead, land at Rockaway, which the latter sold in 1692 to his brother Adam (Hemp. Rec., 1898, Vol. I., p. 54). He appears to have left Long Island about this time and settled in Mamaroneck, where he was captain of a company of militia, and on 10 Feb., 1690, was commissioned as Justice (Col. Hist. Mss., p. 194).

There is on file in Albany a marriage license dated 5 Sept., 1670, whereby James Mott is licensed to marry "Mary Redman, daughter-in-law of John Richbell." (See under Lieut. Adam Mott)

He was cited in letter to Geo. Clark, Secy., as having d. intestate at Mamaroneck, West. Co. in 1707. (N. Y. Col. Mss., Vol. LII., p. 41.) His second wife, Elizabeth, administered upon his estate on 27 Nov., 1707.

In his will, he wrote: April 25, 1750, I, John Mott, of the town of Hempstead, yeoman, being sick. I leave to my wife Rebecca one bed and furniture, which she may choose, and a chest, 2 pewter plates, a bason, 6 spoons, 1 iron pot, 1 trowel, a pair of tongs, 1 cedar pail, hooped with iron, 4 plates, a stone jug and a table. I leave to my son Samuel two steers, and to my son Jacob my carpenter tools, and 1/2 of my Surveyor's Compass and Chain. I leave to my daughter Sarah, wife of Benjamin Hulse, a bed with Dimity curtains. To my daughter Martha, wife of Daniel Carman, 1 iron pot and a side saddle. "I leave to my son Jehu 1/2 of my hand saw, and 1/3 of my three quarter augur, and 1/2 of my inch augur, and my best pitch fork, and 1/3 of my ox cart." To my daughter, Rebecca Mott, a feather bed. I leave to my son Jehu 1/2 of my Surveyor's Compass and chain. I leave to my three daughters ≈15 each. To my daughter Phebe, wife of Daniel Wright, ≈15 and a cow. To my son Micaiah, part of my tools, and a black riding horse, and also leave to him all my housen, barn, and orchards, and land where I now live, lying between the land given to my sons Jehu and my son Jacob, bounded east by Thomas Wiggins, west by Jonas Flower and Eldred Lucas. And he shall maintain my wife Rebecca. I also leave to him 1/3 of my land and meadow at Rockaway. I leave to my sons, Jacob, Jehu, and Micaiah, all my right in the undivided lands in Hempstead. "But before I conclude this will. I reserve a certain piece of land in that part given to my son Micaiah, 2 rods square, lying at the south west corner of an orchard called the Cheese orchard, where my son John Mott was buried; To remain for a burying place for me and my children and grand children for ever, and not to be sold." I make my sons Jacob and Jehu executors. Witnesses, Thomas Wiggins, Thomas Wiggins, Jr., Elizabeth Wiggins. Proved, April 20, 1751.

Joseph Mott first settled at Hempstead, NY as a farmer and lived on Cow Neck. He inherited money and land in 1736 from his father, Joseph, and by 1738 he had interests in lands in Dutchess Co., NY. Joseph Mott remained in Hempstead until after 1759, but by the April 1761 deed he is called "of Crumb Elbow Precenict."¹

Dutchess Co. Deeds (rec. Poughkeepsie, Liber 2, 72) -- 3 Oct 1738. William Antill, atty. of London, and others, to Mordecai Lester and Joseph Mott of Hempstead, for £1600, one full and equal ninth part of land on Hudson's River, bounded on w. by river, between the creek called by the Indians Aquaking, and by the Christians the Fish Creek, S. by land of Myndert Harmanse and Compnay, and extending to the province of Connecticut.¹

Which said farm is situate in Lot No. 3, on Hudson river, in the Great 9 Partners, and is to extend from said river east into the woods until it contains 300 acres. And one equal half of the remainder of said lot I leave to my son Joseph and his wife during their lives, and then one-half to his son Joseph, and the other half to the rest of his children. The other half of said Lot I give to my son Samuel. And the 300 acres first mentioned, I give to my son Richard, but my wife is to have the use of the farm till my son is of age. But if she shall contract matrimony she shall deliver up the farm to my executors. If she remains a widow she is to have 1/3 of said farm. I leave to my son Jacob all my right in a certain lot in the Last Division of Great Nine Partners, joining the land of Daniel Carpenter. One half of said lot belongs to Benjamin L(???)tr (page torn) (Lester?), and the other half to me. I make my brother, Jacob Mott, of Queens County, Long Island, and my trusty friend, Lawrence Maston (Marston?), executors. And they are to pay to my son Joseph £10 and to my wife £200, and all the rest of my estate to my four daughters, Martha, wife of James Valentine; Jane, wife of Timothy Smith; Elizabeth, wife of Samuel Smith, and Jemima, wife of John Cannon. "And I do declare this to be my one Voluntary Will without the perswasions of any parsons whatsoever." August 28, 1762. Witnesses, Johan George Rimpp, Tobias Stoutenbergh, merchant, Catharine Stoutenbergh. Proved, February 16, 1765, before Bartholomew Crannell.

In his will, he wrote: September 22, 1734. I, Richbell Mott, of Hempstead, in Queens County, being in great weakness of body. After the payment of debts and funeral charges, I leave all my personal estate to my wife, Elizabeth Mott (except two negro slaves, "Tom" and "Hagar," and my Irish servant boy "David" and 1/2 my crop of wheat, and what is left to my son Edmund). And she is to have the use of all my farm or plantation on Great Neck, and £20 a year during her widowhood. I leave to my son Edmund, 5 shillings. To my son Richard a crop of winter wheat, on condition that he assist his mother. "The Irish servant boy, David, is to have at the end of his term, a good homespun suit of apparell, besides his every day clothes, and a narrow axe." "And I would have my son Richard instruct him as far as he can in his learning." my son Richard is to have the negro slaves, on condition of his giving security for the payment of £ 8 to my wife. Before the first of May next, my wife is to move off the home farm on Madnans Neck, and the executors are to sell the same with all the appurtenances. Out of the

proceeds, my wife is to have £20 per annum. My son Richard is to have £50, my daughter Elizabeth, £100, my daughter Mary, £ 90, my daughter Ann, £ 50, my daughter Jemima, £ 60, my daughter Keziah, £110, and my daughter Deborah, £140. All the rest of my estate to my four grandsons, Richbell, son of Adam Mott, of Staten Island; Richbell, son of Edmund Mott, of Cow Neck, and Richard and Joseph, sons of Joseph Mott, of Cow Neck. I appoint my sons-in-law, Jonathan Townsend, Esq., of Oyster Bay, Josiah Mott, of Cow Neck, and my friend, Jacob Smith, of Hempstead, executors. Witnesses, Johannes Montfort, William Burch. Proved, December 3, 1734.

In her will, she wrote: March 7, 1737. I, Elizabeth Mott, of Hempstead, in Queens County, widow of Richbell Mott, of Hempstead, being sick and weak. I leave to my son Edmond my wheat and a 3 year old heifer, which is at Great Neck. I leave to the heirs of my daughter Margaret. To my son Edmond, all my wearing apparell except a cloak, "and a pair of thread stockings, being men's stockings." To my grand-daughter Phebe, daughter of Stephen Wood. To my daughter, Jemima Wood, a crape gown, and a cotton and wool petticoat. "I leave to Stephen Wood what is due to me for keeping for one year and a half, an old negro wench." To my daughter, Deborah Mott, the rest of my wearing apparell, and a piece of new home spun cloth. To my daughter Keziah, a pewter tankard. To my daughter Deborah, some pewter basons. To my grand-son, Daniel Kissam, a pair of gold sleeve buttons, also a pair to my cousin Phebe, daughter of Richard Thorne. To my cousin, Mary Pudney, widow, all my flax. To my grand-daughter, Mary Tredwell, my warming pan. To my grand-daughter Elizabeth, daughter of Adam Mott, "all my tea tackling." All the rest to my children, Edmond, Richard, Elizabeth, Ann, Mary, Jemima, Keziah, and Deborah. I make my loving kinsman, Richard Thorne, executor. Witnesses, Phebe Mott, Susanah Dodge, William Burch. Proved, April 16, 1739.

The widow Elizabeth left a will, prob. 16 April, 1739. naming besides the above children, gr. son Danl. Kissam, gr. daug. Mary Tredwell, Elizabeth Mott and Phebe Wood, and cousin Phebe Thorne, dau. of Richard. Executor, Richard Thorne.

Apparently a separation had occurred from his wife, for when her father Richard Seaman "of Herricks in the bounds of Hempstead" wrote his will on 15 5th month 1751, he gave to her the use of the house he had "bought from Searing, with certain personal effects, "all these she is to have during the time she doth or shall live separate from her husband Richbell Mott, ort if he should die, then to her use during her widowhood." and in a codicil dated 17 April 1752 revoking this bequest adds "she shall have the use of the new house I am building...so long as she lives separate from her husband." Richbell Mott died leaviung four children: Sara, now the wife of Matthew Manlove; Richard Mott; Seaman Mott; and Elizabeth, the wife of Solomon Seamans.¹

In his will, he wrote: December 21, 1736. I, Samuel Mott, of Hempstead, in Queen's County, being very sick. I leave to my wife Martha £100, and use of my house and barn, which I bought of Richard Carman, and all my land adjoining, bounded west by Jacob Smith, north by John Smith and the land of Serions (Searings), east by highway that leads from the plains to Cow Neck and land of Richard and Thomas Willis, and south as far as my land extends; Also the use of 30 acres of woodland below Searings, joining to my brother Joseph Mott, And my meadow near Rockaway. She is to have the use of said lands "for the bringing up of my children, which I would have well done, with learning suitable for them."
