The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

Alexander Murray was a naval officer during the American Revolution. He served as captain in the 1st Maryland Regiment, commanded several privateers, and was commissioned lieutenant in the Continental Navy 20 July 1781, returning to private life in 1785. Upon the organization of the U.S. Navy, Murray was commissioned captain 1 July 1798, and commanded Montezuma, Insurgente, and Constellation during the Quasi-War with France; Constellation against the Barbary pirates in the Mediterranean 1801-1803; and Adams in home waters in 1805. From 1808 until his death 6 October 1821, Commodore Murray was superintendent of gunboats at Philadelphia, and, from 8 July 1813, also was first commandant of the Philadelphia Navy Yard.³

It appearing by affidavit to the [illegible words] of this court, that the defendant, Jane M. Galatian resides out of this state, but is a resident of one of the United States, to wit, of the state of Michigan, on motion of John W. Brown, of counsel for the complainant, it is ordered that the said Jane M. Galatian cause her appearance to be entered and notice thereof to be served on the complainants' [illegible] within four months from the date of this order, and in case of her appearance, that she causes her answer to the complainants' bill to be [illegible] and a copy thereof to be served on the complainants' solicitor within forty days after service of a copy of said bill, and in default thereof said bill of complaint may be taken as [conferred?] by her. And it is further ordered, that within twenty days she and complainants cause this orders? be published in the [illegible] paper, and in the Newburgh Gazette, and that the said publication be continued in each of the said papers at least once in each week for eight weeks in succession, or that he cause a copy of this order to be personally served on the said Jane M. Galatian?, at least twenty days before the time above presented for her appearance. Alex Forbus, Clerk. A. B. Belknap, Solicitor. Dated August 21st, 1840.¹

After her husband's death, Jane Colden lived with her sister Margaret Colden Fell Galatian.

Humphrey may have been originally from Brereton, Cheshire, England, but lived in London (by about 1663/4) and later Oyster Bay, Long Island NY before moving to Philadelphia in the 1680s. He was a merchant and a distiller, and a land speculator. He was the first Mayor of Philadelphia.

Humphrey Morrey and William Frampton settled first in Pyster Vay, NY, where they became prominent merchants. The two of them apparently had transacted business in the Delaware Valley area and then, in 1684, decided to "establish a base of operation in the rising Quaker community" by moving to Philadelphia.

Robert Turner, in a letter to William Penn, dated at Philadelphia, 3 August, 1685, says of him: "Humphrey Murray from New York has built a large timber house with brick chimnies." In November, 1685, he was commissioned a Justice of the Peace of the Courts and City of Philadelphia and was named an Assemblyman on January 2, 1691, by the Provincial Council of Pennsylvania. In the charter of 20 March, 1691, by which Philadelphia was for the first time incorporated into a city, Murray was appointed to be mayor, so that he was the first mayor of Philadelphia, serving in that capacity until 1701. In 1693 Murray was one of the judges that became involved in the controversy with George Keith, Thomas Budd, and others, and before whom these, with William Bradford, the printer, were tried. In 1700 he was selected by Penn to be a member of his council, but he does not appear to have served after 1701.¹

He was one of the first purchasers of Cheltenham Township. His original land grant was for 250 acres (23 May 1683), but he is said to have purchased additional land and soon owned 739 acres.¹

D:49), Humphrey Murrey, yeoman, Cheltenham Township, Philadelphia, Co, PA Wife's name not given; mentioned Brother, Leonard Murrey; Cousin, John Murrey. Also mentioned Richard Buctler, John Cadwalader of Abbeton, Daniel Yously, William Hermer, Mary Kimball, Jane Laurence. Two dau-in-law.. not named. James Sykes & Sarah Hader. Richard’s father, Humphrey Murrey, was the first Mayor of Philadelphia.

Richard Morrey was a wealthy landowner with properties in NJ, PA, and NY.

There is a relationship in this family to Paul Robeson, through Richard’s mistress Cremona “Mooney” Satterthwait, whom he acknowledged in his will.

Richard inherited his father’s plantation (in Cheltenham Township, PA). He was one of the first Americans to free his slaves, and among the first to give them land for their own use. Richard is known to have had five children by his black mistress Cremona “Mooney” Satterthwait (b. about 1710; d. about 1770). In 1746 Richard Morrey executed a deed giving 198 acres to Cremona Morrey, a “negress.” After Richard died, Cremona married John Frey/Fry, a freed slave. They had two children, Joseph and Cremona, Jr. When the elder Cremona died in 1772, a deed was executed placing the Morrey property in trust. It is probable that John Frey had inherited the Morrey estate and the five Morrey children contested it. Under the deed, the property was to be held in trust by Isaac Knight, a neighbor of the Morrey family, until the death of John Frey, at which time it was to be sold and the proceeds divided among all of Cremona Sr.’s children. The deed of trust is recorded in the

Philadelphia Deed Book dated 13 Oct and 13 Nov 1788. It is particular interest because it makes a distinct reference to the "children of Richard Murrey, deceased, by his freed woman, Cremona," and lists the names of the children. The section of Cheltenham where the Morrey land was located was referred to locally as Guineatown at that time because the black slaves were from Guinea, Africa. Richard Morrey had also donated land to be used as a burial ground for his freed slaves.¹

In his will, he wrote: Morrey, Richard. City of Philadelphia. Gentleman. dated Aug. 30, 1753. probated Jan. 30, 1754. Overseers: Jenkin Jones, Dr. William Chancellor of Philadelphia. Exec: Wife Sarah and brother-in-law Jacob Beazly.

An item in *The Pennsylvania Gazette* 26 Feb 1754 --Accounts with the estate of Richard Morrey, late living near Bedminster in the Northern Liberties, dec'd, to be settled with John Baselee, exec.

Elizabeth Morrey/Morrey was not a Negro, but the daughter of Richard Morrey and Englishman and of a Delaware Indian maiden named Satterthwait.² In his will, dated 27 8th mo 1803, proved 9 4th mo. 1806 (Philadelphia Co., PA Book 1:475), Cyrus Bustill, of Northern Liberties, City of Philadelphia, Baker -- To wife Elizabeth my house and lot in Third Street. After her decease, sd. house and lot to be sold, proceeds to children Ruth, Rachel, Leah, Grace, Charles and David. Exec: Thomas W. Pryor. James Harding of Northern Liberties, cooper, affirmed.
