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The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

Laid out for Mr. John Williams a Certen Island heretofore belonging to Mr. William Tom situated lying and being on ye West side of Delaware River & about seven Myles below ye Towne of New Castle in ye byte of ye said River ye said Island being in Length 200 perchess & in breath 40 perchess and Containing in Acres 60 & also for ye said Williams Laid out at ye back of ye said Island a peace of new Land begening at a Corner marked wt oake standing upon a point & by ye edge of a Marsh (57) & by a Creeke Commonly called Mr. Toms Creeke which Devides this Land from Mr. Peter Alrichs Land & runing into ye Woods a Longe ye said Creeke North West & by West 282 perchess to a Corner marked black oake standing by ye highway which Leads to apogenimy & Maryland then South with a Line of marked Trees to a Corner marked hicory 340 perchess, then West and by North to a Corner marked wt oake standing at the side of a banke and by a small branch of ye Read Lyon Creeke 170 perchess then from ye said marked oake a Longe ye



said Branch South West & by West 26 perches then a Longe ye Swamp of Read Lyon Creeke East and by South 294 perches to a Corner marked wt. oak standing upon a Point by a Marsh side at ye backe of Island then from ye Oak North East & by East to ye first mentioned marked oake 460 perches laid out boath Island & Woodland for 507 1/2 Acres of Dry Land & 50 Acres of Marsh or fly being laid out ye 6 Day of March 1679-80. [[surveyed]] by Ed Cantwell.<sup>4</sup>

According to Liz Johnson, The stream "Toms Run" was named after Mr William Tom, who was one of the soldiers with the English conquering force of 1664, and later became part of the governing body of New Castle.<sup>3</sup>

In 1692, they lived at New Castle, Delaware. He had a plantation at Hamburg, below the town of New Castle. According to Liz Johnson, this may have been called "Hamburg" because John Williams Neering married a daughter of Nicolas de Meyer (merchant and 9th mayor of New York city), who was from Hamburg originally.<sup>3</sup>

William A. Newell was Governor of New Jersey, 1857-1859 (residing at Allentown, Monmouth Co., NJ) and later (by 1882) Governor of Washington Territory.

William Augustus Newell (September 5, 1817 – August 8, 1901), was an American physician and politician, who was a three-term member of the United States House of Representatives, served as a Republican as the 18th Governor of New Jersey, and as the 11th Governor of the Washington Territory from 1880-1884. He is probably best known for, and was most proud of, the Newell Act, which created the United States Life-Saving Service (a Federal agency that grew out of private and local humanitarian efforts to save the lives of shipwrecked mariners and passengers; which ultimately merged with the Rev-



enue Cutter Service to form the United States Coast Guard in 1915).<sup>2</sup>

Bryan Newton became a soldier and officer, and began service for the West India Company about 1626. He served as a civil and military officer with Gov. Stuyvesant at Curacao before coming to New Netherland. On 18 July 1646 he was commissioned to travel to New Netherland as an officer under Stuyvesant. Their fleet of four ships left the Texel on Christmas Day 1646, and arrived 11 May 1747 at New Amsterdam. He served on Stuyvesant's Council beginning 1647.

On 27 April 1651 he was granted a lot at New Amsterdam

Both Brian Newton and Thomas Newton were early landholders at Newtown, L.I., NY.

When on 5 Feb 1665, English Governor Nicoll issued patents for land at Jamaica, Capt. Newton was named as one of the patentees.

In 1680, he and his wife, Alice, made arrangements with George Wolsey, Jr., to care for them in their old age.

An original settler in Fairfield, he was one of the five farmers at Green's Farms [Westport], 1648. A man of substance and influence, he was charged in 1652 with being the father of the Widow Elizabeth Johnson's child, which as he was a married man was then a capital offense under the laws of Conn. Colony. Through the connivance of friends, he was delivered from jail while awaiting trial and sought refuge under the Dutch government. He settled in Newtown, L. I., where also he was prominent, and d. before May 1683.

His farm at Maximus, Green's Farms, or Bankside, as variously known, came into possession of Robert Beacham, from whom it descended to the progeny of Joseph Lockwood.

Thomas Newton owned and had the management of a vessel, and did business both up the Connecticut river and down at Manhattan with the Dutch. He proved an uncomfortable citizen, always in litigation with his neighbors, and in 1656 was a resident of Middleborough. He may have been a kinsman of Capt. Brian Newton, who was an English officer for many years in the service of the Dutch, himself also a citizen of Middleborough.

On 9 April 1687, according to Letters of Denizations and Acts of Naturalizations for Aliens in England and Ireland, Elias Nezereau, Magdalen, his wife, and Elias and Jane, their children, were naturalized.<sup>2</sup>

Among the fugitives from La Rochelle who came to Massachusetts, was Elie Nezereau, who was born in La Rochelle [1639]: died in New York, March 28, 1719, aged eighty years.--(Inscription upon his tombstone, in Trinity Church-yard, New York.) He was naturalized in England, March 20, 1686, and came over in the ship Robert, with pasteur Peiret, in October, 1687. He was made freeman of New York, December 5, 1687. He was engaged in trade with the West Indies, and (made his will) in Kingston, Jamaica, in March, 1709, leaving by will fifty pounds to the Elders of the French Reformed Protestant congregation in New York, for the use of the poor. A former will mentioned his nephews James, Martin and Lewis, his cousin Elias Nezereau, and his deceased niece, Jane Barbauld, of London. ("The Huguenot Emigration to America" Vol. I, - Baird)

In his will, he wrote: In the name of God, Amen. Be it known and manifest to all People that I, Elias Nezereau, of the Island of Jamaica, but now of the city of New York, merchant. I do hereby confirm my will made in the Island of Jamaica, dated August 26, 1707, Thomas French Finch and William Higgins being two of the witnesses, and which I have put in the hands of Daniel Gautier, of said Island, merchant. And as a codicil I leave to my kinsman, Francis Vincent, of New York, sail maker, my large canoe and its appurtenances. I leave to John Barbarie and Paul Droilett, my friends, £50, for the benefit of the Poor of the French Congregation in New York. I leave to Samuel Daniel Nezereau, Ezekiel, and Sarah Susannah David, children of Jean David, Sr., £10. To Anne David, daughter of Jean David, vintner, £10. Mentions Jean David son of Jean David. Codicil. In the name of God, Amen. I, Elias Nezreau, late of the Island of Jamaica, but now of New York, merchant, being at present very sick. I confirm my will made in Jamaica, August 21, 1707, and left in the hands of Daniel Gaultier. I leave to my kinsman, Francis Vincent, of New York, my large canoe. To John Barbarie and Paul Droillet, £50 for the Poor of the French congregation of New York. To Ann David, daughter of Jane David, widow, £10. To Daniel, Ezekiel and Susanah David, children of Jane David, £10. And whereas I am security for Jean David, Jr., son of John David, to Daniel Roberts, for £40, my executors are to see the same discharged. I leave to Daniel Maynard of N.Y., tailor, £10. I make Benjamin Faneuil, of New York, merchant, to be executor of this present addition to my former will. Dated March 28, 1709. Witnesses, Abraham Jumeau Jonneau, John Poland Rolland, Abraham Gouverneur. Proved before Lord Lovelace, April 6, 1709.

themselves."

*The Ramsey Journal*, 14 Dec 1900, reporting on her death said, "After living here many years, she was persuaded by her sister to go on to Minnesota to live and left about October 1st. Her death occurred soon after arriving there."

To my dear brother and sister, William and Catharine Tenant, of Freehold, New Jersey, the interest on £100. To my friend Ismaiah, wife of George Burnet, of New York, £20. To my friend Susannah, wife of Elias Burger, of Staten Island, the interest of £20. To my friends, Hester and Elinor Gambold, £20. To Margaret, wife of Hugh Campbell, £20. To my friends, Augustus and Mary Spangenberg, of Bethlehem, Pa., a negro boy, and all the rest of my personal estate. I also make my friends, Charles Brockem, of Philadelphia, Henry Antes, of Bethlehem, and Jacques Cortelyou, son of Peter Cortelyou, of the westernmost part of Long Island, executors. They lived in New Rochelle, where in 1705 his father "Andrew Noddin" sold to his son "Andrew Nodin, Junr.," several acres of land, for which he paid £110. The next year the son was chosen Overseer of Roads; in 1711, one of the Assessors; and in the same year he sold to Anne Swere, for the sum of one hundred and seven pounds, "a certain home lott of land bounded northerly by Boston Road, southerly joining to ye land of Peter Bertaine's, westerly by Alexander Affears [Allaire's?], and easterly by Elias Bourepcans, containing by estimation 18 acres; also another great lott of land bounded westerly by Zachariah Angevine (his brother-in-law), easterly by ye Land of Col. Gabrielle Mininele, northerly by Zachariah Angevine, and southerly to ye Land of Louis Guion, containing thirty one acres"--and with it "a ffresh and salt meadows."

In his will, he wrote: February 13, 1761. I, Andrew Nodine, of Yonkers, in the County of Westchester, yeoman, being in health. I leave to my wife Susannah the use of all lands and tenements during her life, and all movable estate at her disposal. After the death of my wife, and in three months after her decease, all my lands and tenements are to be put up at Public vendue and sold to the highest bidder. From the proceeds my sons, Andries and Peter, are each to have one third, and one third to my two daughters and my two granddaughters, viz., my daughter Juda, wife of Cornelius Jacobs, and Elizabeth, wife of Israel Pinkney, "my two granddaughters to have their mother's share." The share of my daughter, Elizabeth Pinkney, is to be paid to her, and not to her husband. I leave to each of my executors £5 for their trouble. I make my son, Peter Nodine, and my son-in-law, Cornelius Jacobs, executors. (Signed) "Andries Naudain." Witnesses, William Betts, Gerardus Vermilyea. (No Probate.)

In her will, dated 19 Jan 1762, proved 30 Nov 1762, Susana Nodine, Yonkers, leaves property to daughters Judea Jacobs and Elizabeth Pinkney. "To my grandson Lewis son of my daughter Judea, my gun." "To son Peter my oyster rake." mentioned "My grand daughter Elizabeth daughter of my son Peter Nodine. Witnesses Evert Bussing, Wm. Betts.

His obituaries, in the *Connt. Gazette* on 28 April 1802, and the *American Mercury* on 15 April 1802, noted his great age: New Milford, April 12, 1802.--"On Friday, the 9th inst., died in this Town Mr. Andrew Nodine, the period of whose life has been an extraordinary instance of longevity in these parts. He was one hundred and two years, wanting but 12 days. The place of his nativity was New Rochelle, in the State of New York; was born in the place 1700 [1708], April 10, old-stile, which was

the last year of the 17 century and the last of the reign of 2965 William III, of England; so that he has seen one whole century and a part of two others. He was of French extraction both by Father and Mother." "His Father, of the same name, was a native of Rochelle, a City and port Town in the former Province and Territory of Annis in France, was born in 1666. He died about 40 years ago [1762], aged 95 years; he had a brother who lived to the age of 105 years, 5 months, and 5 days. "Mr. Nodine (son) lived great part of his days in the State of New York, but a number of years the latter part of his life in the Town of Stratford, Connt., and for many years had the superintendency of the Ferry between the village of Oronoque, so called, and Old Milford. He had seven children, three sons and four daughters. Two sons and three daughters are still living. For several years past he has resided at New Milford with one of his daughters."

Elie Naud (Neau) became a seaman at the age of 12; at 18 he went to Haiti, then a French colony where many Huguenots of this province lived, and there he became religiously enlightened. Driven out from the island by the Revocation, he went to Boston where he remained 6 years. Elie Naud was brought back to France and given a life sentence in the galleys as a Huguenot. In Marseilles, he was chained to the galley "VILLE MADAME" and then to the "MAGNANINE." He was imprisoned in solitary confinement in the Chateau d'If, a prison-fortress made famous since Alexandre Dumas' novel *Le Comte de Monte-Cristo*. There he was thrown into a widowless, doorless hole. From a hole in the ceiling, scanty food was thrown down to him. The floor was filled with refuse and alive with rats. During 22 months he had no change of clothing. Finally, his clothes rotted away on his body. All he would have to do to be freed was to conform to the king's religion. He was released after 5 years of sufferings, when the treaty of Ryswick was signed (1698). In his prison, Elie Naud composed poems, some of which were later published. He finally returned to America, where he found his little daughter Suzanne had been baptized on 6 Nov

1692 in the NYC French Ch.<sup>1</sup>

Gabriel Le Boiteux gave Elie Naud (Neau) the command of his ship *La Belle Marquise*, which was captured at sea by a French privateer in 1692.<sup>1</sup>

Elie Naud was an elder in the NYC French Ch in 1704, and probably before. He had sympathy for the slaves, for he himself had suffered more than any of them, and he began missionary work among them, as a Catechist of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, while still an elder in the NYC French Ch. In 1705 he conformed to the Church of England in America. He established a small chapel (the first rescue work in New York) in the upper floor of his own dwelling. There the negro and Indian slaves assembled, and also children of poor whites who were not wanted in the churches because they were not properly clothed. It was a "ragged school," -- the first in America, and the beginning of Trinity School.<sup>1</sup>

In his will, he wrote: I, Elias Neau, of New York, merchant, being sick. I give and bequeath to the Parish Church and Corporation of the Church of England, called Trinity Church, the sum of œ20. I leave to the Poor of the French Church, being Refugees, residing in the city of New York, œ20. I leave to Rev. Mr. Daniel Bondet, the present minister at New Rochelle, and to Rev. Lewis Row, minister of the French Congregation in New York, to each £10. To Rev. Mr. Thomas Poyer, minister at Jamaica, on Nassau Island, and to Rev. Mr. Jenny, Chaplain to the Forces at Fort George, in New York, to each £5. To the wife of Mr. Paul Droillet, and to Catharine Jandine, widow, each œ3. To Andrew Ecert and Daniel Mercherow, both of Staten Island, and to Mary Magon, widow, and to Catharine Jandine, the ballance due to me from them. To Mr. David Ayrault, of Rhode Island, merchant, £40. To the children of my sister Susanah, wife of John Girote, of Boston, £300. To the children of my sister Rachel, wife of John Petell, of Boston, £300. To Rachel, daughter of my sister, Susanah Girote, and to Susanah, daughter of my sister, Rachel Petell, each £30, and to her son Elias Girote, £40. "I give the sum of £50 for and towards the printing of 152 Hymns, composed by myself; which said sum of money I desire may be deposited in the hands of Rev. Mr. Lewis Row, minister of the French Church in New York, for the better effecting, and printing said Hymns in the French Language." I leave to Rev. Mr. William Vesey, Rector of Trinity Church, £25, and to Alexander Moore, of New York, £20, for their trouble in supervising this will. I leave all the rest of my estate to my loving cousin Elias Grefeller, and Jude Robineau, and I will them executors. Dated, August 15, 1722. Witnesses, Anthony Byvanck, Elisha Bonett, William Huddleston. Proved, September 17, 1722.

Sworn to by Samuel Moore and Daniel Honan, before Thomas Lawrence, Justice, April 3, 1704. Exhibited as a true and honest Inventory by Hannah Noel, widow and executrix, April 13, 1704, before me, Cornbury.

Whereas, Thomas Noell, late of New York, died leaving behind him a will, and leaving all his estate to his wife Hannah for life, and then to his children, Noah Noell and Richard Hall, and made his wife Hannah executor, who afterward proved the same and is since deceased. And whereas it especially appears to me that it was the desire of the testator to have named Monteith Noell in his said will instead of Noah Noell, the said Monteith Noell being his only son. And whereas, the said Richard Hall, the testator's other son in the will mentioned, is since dead, Letters of administration are granted to Monteith Noell, July 15, 1710.

My eldest son, Richard, is to have £5 more than the rest. My daughters are to have the use of my house where I lately lived, now in possession of Mr. Jackson, tobacconist, until they marry, and then it is to be sold. My daughters are to have two dozen cane and leather chairs, two of my best and largest looking glasses and a small dressing glass, and my best chest of drawers, also cooking utensils, "and they are to have money to furnish them a decent suit of silk apparel." Dated May 20, 1722. Witnesses, William Gane, Nathaniel Symons, Richard Irish. Proved, April 10, 1724. [Note.--Cornelia Norwood was one of the children of Dirck Van der Cliff, and his wife Geesie, who were the owners of the farm on the north side of Maiden Lane in New York, and through which Gold street and Cliff street were laid out. If my youngest son, William, shall die before coming of age, his share shall go to the rest. All the lands that may become due to me by virtue of a certain patent, formerly granted by her late Majesty, Queen Anne, to Johanes Hardenburgh and Company, I leave to all my children, Stephen, Thomas, William, Mary, wife of Egbert de Witt, Elizabeth, wife of Martin de Lamater, Bridget, Anne, and Catharine, and all the rest of my lands improved and unimproved. And whereas the reversion of a certain lot of land now in possession of my sister, Ann Garton, is made over to me after her death, the same is left to my three sons, and they are to pay to their four sisters £65. If any of my daughters should die under the age of 18 their share is to go to the rest.
