

-- PAINE, PAYNE --

The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

He was known as John Paine of Wading River.

In his will, he wrote: In the name of God, Amen. I, John Paine, of Southold, in Suffolk County, Gent., being weak and sick. I leave to my daughter-in-law, Mary Paine, one room in my house, and one-third of the live stock, and the use of the land and meadows which I leave to my two grandsons, John and Moses Paine, so long as she remains my son's widow. I leave to my grandson, John Paine, all my homestead and buildings, except one acre of land in the north side of my orchard, on the south side of the highway, adjoining to the land of Benjamin Emmans, which said acre I leave to my grandson Moses. I also leave to my grandson, John Paine, 2/3 of all my meadow on the north side of the main creek. I leave to my grandson, Moses Paine, 1/3 of said meadow, and 3 lots of land joining on the east side of the land of William Dickenson, Bounded west by James Leynter; also 1/2 of a lot joining the land of Samuel Mapes on the west and James Lupton on the east. I leave to my grandson, Benjamin Paine, 2 lots at a place called Half Way Hollow, adjoining the land of Samuel Mapes on the east and Samuel Emmans on the west, and all my meadow south of the main creek. I leave to my daughter, Elizabeth Robinson, a bed and furniture. To my grandson, John Paine, a warming pan and his father's gun. To each of my grandsons, John and Moses, a bed and bedding, and my old gun and my loom and tackling, but it is to remain where it is until they come of age. I leave to my three grandsons, John, Moses, and Benjamin, all my farming utensils and carpenter tools. I leave all my cattle and all my pewter to my daughters Elizabeth and Mary and my grandsons. "I order my half bushel to be kept where it is." To my grandsons, all my wearing apparell. "My wood land is to stay just as it is, without being cut, except just enough for firewood." When my grandson Moses is of age all things are to be divided as soon as possible. I make Benjamin Emmans, Jr., and Abraham Dickenson, executors. Dated January 14, 1762. Witnesses, Ezra Reeve, Mehetabel Tuthill. Proved, April 29, 1762.

(C. 171) He receipted for the claims of his father, Jonathan, Capt. Stephen Topping, Charles Topping, David Topping, and other Refugees. (C. 171-174) He served in Col. Smith's Regt. (G. 31); and possibly in Willett's Levies (G. 62), the 1st Orange (G. 72), and in Conn. (G. 96) He lived at Hog Neck (now North Haven), near Sag Harbor.

Census of 1776: Males--above 16 years, 2; under 16, 2. Females--above 16, 3; under 16, 4. (A. 54) He was b. in 1737; d. in 1813. His son, John, Jr., b. June 8, 1758; m. Dec. 20, 1783, Patience, dau. of Isaac 1 Van Scoy; d. June 17, 1815. (Miss Addie Sayre) His children were: Charles Watson, Mercy, Clara, Lucretia, John, Silas, Betsey, Phebe and Timothy. (Hedges' "East Hampton," p. 342) Charles Watson, b. Apr. 15, 1788; m. Mary Crowell of Chatham, Cape Cod, Mass.--[thus confirming the origin in the Eastham branch]; d. Jan. 14, 1861. Charles Watson, 2d, m. Maria Hildreth, and had: Charles Watson, 3d; and Maria L'Hommedieu, m. Joseph Fahys--both now living at Sag Harbor. Mrs. Fahys owns the old homestead of John Paine.

He moved from Southold to Middletown, in 1776, with his father Alsop. In Sept., 1776, one passenger and cattle were brought from Sag Harbor to Stonington by Capt. Amos Pendleton. (C. 213) In Nov., 1776, he assisted his father to remove. (C. 118) In 1777, he was in Saybrook. (A. 43)

Two of the name signed the Association, in 1775. (H. 10, 12)

There is, in the possession of his descendants, the "Qualification of John Paine, son of Alsop, for the office of Coroner, in the County of Suffolk, State of New York," dated Feb. 11, 1784, and signed by Gov. George Clinton.

(C. 98) In Oct. and Dec., 1776, with seven passengers, he was brought over by Capts. Thomas Robinson, David Sayre, James Wiggins and Benjamin King Jr. His claim was receipted for by his son John. (C. 172) He may have served in the 3d Line. (G. 46) He lived at Hog Neck (now North Haven), near Sag Harbor.

Census of 1776: Males--above 50 years, 1; above 16, 2; under 16, 2. Females--above 16. 5. (A. 54)

He moved from Sag Harbor to Stonington, with 5 passengers, in Sept., 1776, by Capt. Amos Pendleton (C. 213); and, in Sept., or Oct., 1776, with hogs, by Capt. Ephraim Pendleton. (C. 214) He signed the Association, in 1775. (H. 10)

He served in Col. Smith's Regt. (G. 7, 31) As he was only 28 at that time, it is probable that he was one of the two Peters in the Census of 1776, each of whom was under 50 years old; and beside his wife, had two sons and a dau., all under 16 years old.

A leaf, probably from a Family Bible, says that "Thomas Payne and katheren harsasant, daughter of Thomas harsasant of Cransford, were married at Cooklie, July 20, 1578." His son, Thomas Payne, b. Dec. 11, 1586, "Married Elizabeth on the 22nd nouember; Anno 1610." Thomas 1 and Elizabeth, with their children, Mary 2, Thomas 2 and John 2, sailed from Yarmouth, Eng., on or soon after May 10, 1637, in his own vessel, the "Mary Anne"; and arrived in Salem, Mass., in Aug., 1637.

He petitioned, Aug. 28, 1637, for a small parcel of land, next his house, which was granted to him. He d. in Salem, probably late in 1639, leaving a will dated April 10, 1638, which was proved in Salem in 1644. According to an English book, "Perlustrations in Yarmouth," Thomas Payne was a Puritan; bought the "Mary Anne" for the emigration of his family; and brought with him some reatives, friends, and other Puritans.

The "Eastham branch" descends from Thomas 1, the emigrant to Eastham, Cape Cod, Mass. Thomas 1 had a son, Elisha 2, of Barnstable, Mass., and Canterbury, Conn.

Widow Elizabeth Payne moved to Southold with her sons, Peter 2 and John 2, as early as 1657 (See Whitaker's "Southold," p. 47)
