

-- STOCKHOLM --

The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

On 4 April 1803 (recorded 12 Sep 1803, Bergen Co. R:8), Joseph Cough of the Township of Saddle River to Henry Larue of same, 22 acres more or less, lying in Township of Saddle River, bounded N by land of David Cough; E by Mary Cough; S by Doct John Garritson; W by widow Stockholm and Charles Debaun. Signed Joseph Cough (his mark). Witnessed by John Devoe, Alexander James.¹

On 8 May 1804 (recorded 13 June 1804, Bergen Co. S:349) Anna Garritson of the Township of Saddle River, conveyed to her son, Henry J. Garritson (son of Dr. John Garritson), for love and affection and 5 shillings, 72 acres more or less being the homestead lot where I now dwell in the Township of Saddle River at Slotterdam. Bounded W by Passaic River; N by the Widow Stockholm, Henry Larue and Widow Kough; E by land late of Michael Gillam, deceased, and Henry Larue; S by Jacob Tourse, Samuel Tourse, Isaac Ackerman, and Harmanus H. Van Bussum. Signed Ann Garritse. Witnessed by John A. Post, Alexander James.¹

Andries Stockholm, Margrietje Wilson, syn h.v., witnessed the baptism 4 Oct 1749 NYC Ref Ch, of Neeltje, dau. of Aaron Stockholm & Hilletje Van Alst.

In his will, he wrote: ...February 10, 1762. I, Andries Stockholm, of Bushwyck, in Kings County, yeoman, being in good health. All debts to be paid. I leave to my wife Margaritie, "in whom I am well pleased," 1/3 of all the grain raised on the farm, and 1/3 of the orchard, and the use of the best room in my house, with the leanto. And she is to have two cows in pasture, and the best bed and furniture, "and firewood ready at the door," and as much household goods as she has occasion for. After her death or marriage I leave the grain and orchard to my son Andries. I leave to my eldest son, Aaron, £125 for his birthright. I leave to the children of my daughter Jannettie £125. To my daughter Lena, wife of Jacob Casow, £125. To my daughter Margaritie £125. To my daughters, Neeltie and Maria, each £125, and the same to my daughter Catrina. The rest of my movable estate I leave to all my children. I leave to my son Andries the best wagon, one pleasure sled and one wood sled, "and the mill to clean grain with," and all the bees. I leave to my son Andries all my farm, house, wood land and meadows, in Bushwick and Newtown, and he is to pay to each of my daughters £100. I make my sons, Aaron and Andries, and my friend, Philip Nagel, Jr., executors. Witnesses, Gabriel Duryee, Jacob Duryee, Abraham Schenck. Proved, April 13, 1773.

In his will, he wrote: ...October 27, 1727. I, Arent Stockholm, of Bushwyck, in Kings County, cordwainer, being in good health. I leave to my wife all my estate, real and personal, for life. To my son, Andrew Stockholm, 1/8 of my estate, and £10, for his birth right. All the rest of estate to my wife and children, Andrew, Magdalen, Mary, Catrina, Hannah, Alida, and John. Witnesses, Abraham Cock, Dirck Spragg, H. Benett. Proved, April 1, 1736, and there being no executor, Letters of administration are granted to the widow, Lena Stockholm. [NOTE.--The son, Andrew Stockholm, was in later years the owner of extensive tanneries at the corner of Pearl and Cross (now Park) streets, in New York, then a low, marshy region.--W. S. P.]

In their marriage record, they were: Dirck Andrieszen, j.m. Van Boswyck, en Femmetje Lorck, j.d. Van N. Yorck, beide wonende op Boswyck.

Very little has been found on Dirck Andriessen and Femmetje Lock, and they may have removed to the Raritan area of New Jersey area along with his cousins.¹

- **Andries Dircksz Andriessen**, bp. 21 Sep 1701 Brooklyn Ref Ch. There is evidence of an Andries Andriessen in Somerset and Hunterdon Counties, New Jersey, who appears to be closely tied to the Schomp family who also removed there. An Andries Andriessen witnessed the will of Peter Schomp on 28 March 1760 in Readington.¹
- (poss) **Dirck Dircksz Andriessen**, b. about 1705; d. intestate before 12 June 1758; may have married **Hannah** (surname unknown). This couple appears in the records of the Readington Reformed Church in Hunterdon County, New Jersey, and baptized 7 children between 1738 and 1751. The names of the children (Femmetje, the eldest, Samuel, Maria, Barent, Nicholas, Elizabeth, and Annatje) suggest a strong connection to this family. "Derrick Anderson" died intestate before 12 June 1758, when Letters of Administration were granted to his widow. His inventory was made 13 June 1758, and one of the appraisers was Andries Andriessen.¹
