

-- STOLS, STULTS --

The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolution of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

Geertruy Andriesz/Driesz came in June 1642, with her husband, Harry/Hendrick Albertsz, a baker from London (he was aged 29 in June 1643) on the ship *den Houthuryn*. Geertruy was from Doesburg in the province of Gelderland. Geertruy;s 21-year-old brother, Hendrick Andries/Driesz came with them.

Jacob Jans Stol took over as ferrymaster (after the death of Harry/Hendrick Albertse, ferrymaster, about April 1650) at the Rensselaerswyck colony.

Kit Davids applied for a patent of land at the Esopus in September 1656, and Kit sold part of the land to Jacob Jansen Stol. Jacob and Geertruy, his wife, must have moved to Esopus about this time, and then Jacob died in 1659. Kit Davids sold 6 morgans of his Esopus land to Evert Pels on 27 March 1667.

29 Jan 1661 -- In a suit before the Court of New Amsterdam, Geertruyt Andriessen, widow of Jacob Jansen Stol deceased, pltf. against Geertje Hendricks, late widow of Andries Hoppe decd., deft., in which pltf demands from deft. payment of four hundred guilders balance of purchase of land and houses passed between their late husbands....Court ordered deft to pay the pltf.<sup>1</sup>

Jacob Stolts, with 100 acres, 3 horses, 3 horned cattle was listed in the 1778 Franklin Township Rateables.

Jacob Stolts, householder, was listed in the Dec 1780 Franklin Township Rateables.

Jacob Stubbs [Stulls] was listed in the 1793 Franklin Township Rateables, preceded by Peter Debard [DeBaun? Tebow?], Jacob Valentine, Charles Degraw, and followed by John McCall, Peter Demarest, and Charles Strills [Stulls].<sup>1</sup>

It was possibly this Jacob and Anne Stoltz, of Franklin Township, Bergen County, NJ, who on 1 Jan 1800 sold to Lodwick Megheler [Michler?], of the same place, 15 acres for £100.<sup>1</sup>

Jacob may have been a witness to this transaction: On 3 March 1804 (recorded 12 March 1804, Bergen Co. R:390) James Thew of the Township of Franklin, and Sarah, his wife, conveyed to Harmanus Van Zile of same place, for \$1500, two tracts: (1) 216-38/100 strict measure being 7 equal twelfth parts of One undivided Moiety or equal half part of tract of land in Bergen County being part of tract of land called the Ramapock Patent and known in a map thereof by Farm or Lot No. 172, beginning SW corner John Verway's tract of Saddle River; conveyed to said James Thew by Henry Van Wert and Hannah, his wife, 18 Oct 1798. (2) 230 acres and a quantity of land granted to contain 23-85/100 acres, and also equal half of 5 equal 24th parts of said Lot No. 172. Signed by James Thew, Sara Thew. Witnessed by Abrm. Westervelt, Jacob Stoltz.<sup>2</sup>

On 2 April 1806 (recorded 12 April 1806, Bergen Co. X:296) John Paulhamons of the Township of Franklin, conveyed to Jacob Stoltz, for \$100, bedstead and bedding, tea cettle, shoemaker's bench and one dozen Lasts, etc. [other household goods]. Signed by John Polhamons. Witnessed by Anne Westervelt, Abrm. Westervelt.<sup>2</sup>

Phebe Stults, 54, was listed as head of the household in the 1850 Federal Census, living in New Barbadoes Township (probably Midland Park-Ridgewood vicinity), Bergen County, NJ. Living with her were: Theodore Stults, 16, harness maker; Peter Stults, 21, coach maker; and Mary Jane Stults, 13.

He owned, abt. 1720, a wampum factory, the remains of which were discovered in 1916 in the vicinity of Waldwick-Midland Park, just beyond the southwestern limits of Allendale.<sup>2</sup>

A collection of wampum "was found after the excavation of the remains of a wampum factory in 1916 by Carl F. Schondorf. This wampum factory stood on the estate of Peter Meyer on Goffle Hill, Hawthorne, north of Paterson. This was a eight-acre farm. The wampum site on the farm lies about fifty feet this side of the Passaic boundary line and about three hundred yards west of Goffle Road on elevated ground. The wampum factory was operated by a Dutch family, ..." A letter sent to Mr. Johannes Stoltz, dated 1768, Long Island, read: "I am sending you today 17 Wampum clamshells by -- there is a long blank here -- "They are picked shells. Your obedient servant (signed) C. Ackerson.....John Hopper of Ramsey, when he was 93, remembered the Stoltz family when he was a boy. He said his father bought the Stoltz farm and occupied it. He said he remembered, when a boy of nine, his father ploughing along a stone wall and, after a rain shower, he went out and picked up thirty-five wampum beads.<sup>1</sup>

During an archaeological dig in 1916 near the Wyckoff-Passaic County border, the site of a wampum factory was located near present-day Goffle Road and Ravine Ave. The 18th-century "factory" prepared certain shells indigenous to this part of the Atlantic seaboard for use by Native Americans and early colonists. Hundreds of years ago, the North American Indian tribes used wampum like money, as a medium or exchange for goods. Wampum, polished shell beads, were also worn as decoration and insignia of rank and dignity. Strung on hempen strings or woven into belts, wampum beads were traded by the number of beads that could be sold for a price of 5 British shillings. Belts were also used to document transactions between tribes or to commemorate important public events. They would also serve as symbolic representations of messages or treaties between tribes or councils. The same beads often served myriad purposes, including as articles given to the French and British in commendation of treaties and agreements. Unstrung beads were often used in trade.<sup>3</sup>

But how was the site of this factory located in 1916? Triggered by the discovery of a letter dated 1768 to the factory's owner, Johannes Stolz, the search for the site led to an area previously called Godwinsville, which was north of Paterson and Hawthorne, but south of Wortendyke. Diggers worked in an area 25 feet in diameter and about 2 feet deep, uncovering what appeared to be a shell-heap, or the dumps of the factory sweepings. The hut that served as the wampum factory was assumed to have had a log floor, and the sweepings were probably forced through the crevices in the logs. Over a wagonload of clamshells and between 5,000 and 6,000 wampum beads were excavated at the site. Although other wampum factories existed in this area, this one is said to be the only one of its kind located on the Atlantic seaboard. Quite possibly one of the largest and oldest wampum manufacturing site in New Jersey, it is speculated that the products of this factory were sold to Indian traders passing through this area on their way west. It was first owned and operated by a Dutch family headed by Johannes Stolz from about 1720 to 1770, but continued to operate well into the 19th century. The wampum made at the Goffle site by the Stolz family was traded at the more famous John Jacob Astor Trading Post, located in what is now Park Ridge, which was known in those days for wampum-making in New Jersey.<sup>3</sup>
