The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolution of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

In the record of their banns, they were: Andries Teller, j.m. Van N. Albania, en Sophia Van Courtlandt, j.d. Van N. Jorck. Andries Teller was a merchant, trader, Ensign in the Militia in 1669, Magistrate 1673, 1675-80. His family moved to New York, where he was a Lieutenant in the New York Militia (1700?).

In his will, he wrote: 3d day of September, 1702. I, Andrew Teller, of New York, merchant, being weak and sick." I leave to my only son, Andrew Teller, all my estate, real and personal, but if he die under age, then to my brother Oliver Teller, and my sister Margaret Teller. If they both die, then to the children of Oliver Stephens, and William Teller, Sr., deceased. Makes his mother Sophia Teller, widow, and Jacobus Van Cortlandt and Brant Schuyler, executors. Witnesses, Jeremias Westerhout, Cornelius Kierstede, William Huddleston. Proved before John Bridges, November 9, 1702.

In her will, she wrote: I, Sophia Teller, widow of Andries Teller, late of New York, and executrix of his will, Being aged and infirm, but thanks be to God, of sound memory, for the future peace and quiet of the children of my son, Oloff Teller, and my grandchild, Andries Teller, the only representative of my eldest son, Andries Teller, deceased, do make this my last will and Testament. Whereas my husband by his will, dated May 18, 1700, did give to his eldest son, Andries, then in full life, but soon after deceased, the sum of £25, and also all that lot of land with appurtenances, lying over against the house we did then live in, next to the house and ground of Robert Livingston, on the Condition that I was to enjoy the use of 1/2 of the same.

And it so happened by the pleasure of Almighty God that my eldest son, Andries Teller, died in 1702, and my daughter Margaret died unmarried, so that there remains only Andries, the son of Andries, our eldest son, and Oloff, our youngest son, to share the estate. And whereas my father, Oloff Stephense Van Cortlandt, in his life, by his deed, dated April 22, 1672, did make over to my late husband, and myself, his daughter Sophia, a certain house and lot of ground, in New York, to the north of the Wall or strand, having to the west the lot and ground of Charles Bridges, to the north, that of Jolyn Verghen, and to the east a certain narrow lane, and to the south the afore mentioned Wall, being 24 feet wide, and 54 feet 8 inches long, Dutch wood measure. And whereas the said Oloff Stephense Van Cortlandt, on the 4th day of January, 1681, did purchase a certain house or tenement, to the northward of said house and ground, from Josyntie Verghen, situate between the house and lot of Charles Bridges and the aforesaid certain narrow lane; which he did likewise give unto the said Andries and Sophia. And whereas my son Andries, nor his son Andries, have had the said legacy of ≈i25, I hereby bequeath, that after my funeral charges and just debts are paid, that my grandson, Andries Teller, shall have the said sum. And whereas my son, Oloff Teller, hath lately departed this life, leaving behind him several children. And as I have taken into consideration, that the house and other erections built upon the lot over against the house and lot that my deceased son lately lived in, and was devised to my eldest son, Andries, were built by the estate of my son Andries. And the lot of land whereon the house I now live in, fronting Duke street, with the other house and ground adjoining backward and fronting Dock street; and the tenement that was purchased from Verghen, are of much less value, than the lot on the south side of the Strand. And it being considered that the houses and lots on the north side of the Strand, was the proper estate of my husband and me, and are of much greater value, than the bare lot of ground on the south side of the strand, adjoining to the house and ground of Robert Livingston, lately deceased. And as it may prove troublesome for my grandchild, Andries Teller, and the children of my son Oloff, to hold any real estate, as tenants in common, I hereby devise and bequeath to the children of my son Oloff, all that lot of land between Duke street and Dock street with all the houses. And I leave to my grandson, Andries Teller, all that my 1/3 of a certain lot of land, formerly purchased by Mr. Oloff Stephense Van Cortlandt from Peter Stoutenburgh and Jan Vinge, executors of Rachel Van Tienhoven, lying at a place sometime without the City Gate, on the west side of the highway, and on the south side of the land of Jan Vinge, containing in breadth at the highway or east side, 18 rods and 7/10 of a rod, and on the west the like measure. To him the said Andries Teller, and his heirs and assigns. The said lot of land is to be valued by indifferent men, and if one half of the sum it shall be valued at, do amount to the sum of ≈i200, then the devise shall be deemed a sufficient equivalent to the devise of the lot between Duke street and Dock street, left to the children of my son Oloff. But if the value do not amount to ≈i200, the difference is to be made up by the children of my son Oloff. All the rest of my estate is to be sold, and I leave 1/2 to my grandson Andries, and the other half to the children of my son Oloff. And I reccomend to them to maintain the love, peace, and kindness to one another, as they will expect the blessing of Almighty God. I make my grandson Andries, and my friend, Frederick Van Cortlandt, and Mr. Stephen Bayard, executors. Dated September 20, 1728. Witnesses, G.

Du Bois, Coenradt Ten Eyck, Abraham Santford. Proved, October 1, 1729. [NOTE.--Sophia Teller, daughter of Oloff Stevense Van Cortlandt, was born May 31, 1651, and married Andriese Teller, May 6, 1671. The house and lot where they lived is now No. 85 Pearl Street, extending through to Stone Street. The house where Mrs. Teller died is now No. 52 Stone Street, being the rear part of the lot above mentioned. The house and lot left to the grandson, Andries Teller, is directly opposite the above, and is now No. 88 Pearl Street. This was a water lot granted to Andries Teller, in 1687. Andries Teller (the grandson) married Catharine, daughter of Evert Vandewater. They had one child, Catharine, who married Lawrence Lawrence, son of Samuel Lawrence. The name of Oloff Teller was Anglicized into Oliver. He married Cornelia De Peyster, October 10, 1712. They had children, Johannes, Oliver, Isaac, Andries, Maria, Sophia, Margaret, and Cornelia. The lot of land on which Andries Teller and his wife lived, was owned by Oloff Stevense Van Cortlandt as early as 1662. This descended to her, as part of her father's estate. The house and lot bought of Verghens, is probably No. 79 Pearl Street. The lot on "the west side of the highway," is on Broadway. As there is no deed for it recorded to Oloff Stevense Van Cortlandt, the will supplies a missing link. In 1733 Cortlandt Street was opened through the middle of the lot, and the heirs of Andries Teller had the south side. Gualtherus Dubois, one of the witnesses, was minister of the Dutch Church, 1699-1751, and the will appears to be in his handwriting.--W. S. P.]

In his will, he wrote: I, Andrew Teller, of New York, merchant, being in good health. "I leave to my daughter Catharine, begotten by my first wife, all her mother's wearing apparell, and her gold chain and her necklace of pearl, and a large Dutch Bible." I leave to the children of my uncle Oliver Teller, deceased, all my woollen wearing apparell, and my gun and sword. I leave to my wife Mary, my negroes "Dego" and "Hannah," and 1/3 of all my books, and the other 2/3 to my daughter Catharine, "and to such other children as I shall beget." I leave to my wife 1/3 of my plate, and 2/3 to my daughter. The shop goods and merchandise are to be sold, and same division made. My two houses and lots, one in Dock street, and the other behind the same fronting the Dock of the east river, are to be sold. One of them is now in tenure of Abraham Van Wyck, and the other in tenure of Cornelius Sandford. I leave to my wife my two other houses for life and then to my daughter. I make my brother-in-law, David Provoost, son of William Provoost, and Stephen Bayard, Jacob Goelet, Jr., and Abraham Van Wyck, executors. Dated February 15, 1730. Witnesses, Simeon Soumain, Alexander Mills, Jacob Bergen, Dirck Van Alen. William Cosby, Esq., Captain-General and Governor. To all, etc. Know ye that at New York, on the 30 day of August, 1732, the will of Andrew Teller was proved. [Note.--The house on Dock street, and the one on the "Dock," are now No. 88 Pearl street, and the lot in the rear on Water street. The other two houses were directly opposite, on the north side of Pearl street, with the rear on Stone street. The daughter Catharine came of age about 1750. She married Lawrence Lawrence, September 20, 1750.--W. S. P.]

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Isaac Teller, farmer, of Rumbouts precinct, Dutchess County, being sick, but of perfect mind and memory. My funeral charges to be first paid, then all my debts by my executors out of my personal estate. I leave æ300 good money in gold and silver, one horse, saddle and bridle, two milk cows, and one negro wench named Dine, unto my wife Sarah; payable out of my personal estate. If this be insufficient, then after sale of personal estate sufficient to be raised out of my real estate to pay the legacy. Likewise unto her, one feather bed, bedding, bedstead and furniture complete. Unto my loving son Jacobus, £100. The legacy to my wife is in lieu of dower. The remainder of my real and personal estate unto Oliver, Deborah, and Mary Teller, Isaac Depeyster Teller and Jacobus Teller, equally alike. Should either of said children die a minor, his or her portion to be shared equally by the surviving heirs. Should my daughters marry, and have no issue, and die, if the legacies be not paid, then her legacy is to be divided equally among the surviving heirs. My son Jacobus's legacy to be put to interest. Unto my loving wife, one good riding chair, to be bought by my executors. I make my loving friends and Oliver Teller, Martin Wiltsie, Peter M. DeBois, and Jeremiah Cooper, executors. Dated September 5, 1783, and in the eighth year of our Independence. Witnesses, Mary De Peyster; Jeremiah Cooper, of Dutchess County, physician; Martin Wiltse. Proved, October 14, 1783.

In their marriage record they were: Jacob Teller, j.m. Van N. Albanien, en Christina Wessels, j.d. Van N. Yorke, d'Eerste woonende tot N. Albanien, en de tweede alhier.

He was a merchant and in 1684 was the master of the sloop *Hopewell*, running from NYC to Esopus. In 1686 he was living in Whitehall Street in NYC.

Jacob Teller, en syn huysvr. Christina Wessels, were listed in the 1686 Dominie Selyns list of members of the NYC Ref Ch. They were living on Beurs Straet, ["Exchange Place"] (Whitehall Street). Listed before them was Margarietje Pieters, h. v. **Frederick Arentzen [Blom]**. Listed after them were: Jacob de Key, en syn huysvr. Hillegond Theunis; Sara Bedlo, h. v. Claes Borger; Pieter de Riemer, en syn huysvr. Susanna de Foreest; Isaac de Riemer.<sup>1</sup>

In his will, he wrote: I, Jacob Teller, being sickly abed, but of good and perfect memory, considering the mortality of all men, have, with due deliberation, made my last will." Leaves all estate to his wife Christina and child Anna Margaret. "Which estate shall be accounted as movables, any law or statute to the contrary notwithstanding," and to be disposed of by my executors. All to remain in possession of his wife till his child is of age or marries. I appoint, as tutors and guardians of my child, my beloved brother, Wm. Teller, Jr., and my father-in-law, [should be brother-in-laws as Richard and Isaac were married to Christina's sisters Maria and Aeltje] Richard Ashfield, and Isaac De Reiner. Makes his wife executor. "In testimony, etc., I have set my hand in New York, this 17 day of August, 1696." Witnesses, Leendert Huygens De Kleyn, Thomas Lewis, Robert Walters. Benjamin Fletcher, Governor, etc. To all, etc. Know ye that at New York the 27 day of April, 1697, the last will of Jacob Teller, annexed, was proved, and Letters of Administration granted to his wife Christina.

In her will, she wrote: I, Christian Wessells, widow of Jacob Teller, late of this city, mariner, being sick in body." Whereas my dear and well beloved husband, Jacob Teller, hath by his will dated August 7, 1696, of which I was appointed executrix, been pleased to dispose of his estate in the following manner, viz., that all the estate should be equally divided between myself and our daughter, Anna Margaret Teller. I dispose of my part as followeth. I give to Mr. Jellis Provost of this city one mourning suit of cloth. I give the rest of my estate to my daughter, Anna Margaret Teller. My executors are to sell all personal property excepting wearing apparall and gold and silver plate, and to pay the money to my daughter when of age or when she is married. If my daughter should die, then the estate is to go to my relations, namely: To my brother, Gerardus Wessells, to my sister, Gertruyd Wessells, widow of (???) Munster, my sister, Mariah Wessells, wife of Richard Ashfield, and to my sister, Aeltie Wessells, wife of Isaac De Reimer. Makes Mr. Samuel Staats, chirurgon, and Mr. Leonard Lewis, executors, "and they are to put my daughter to board with Mr. Geestie Dethys, or at my brother De Reimer's, and she is to be instructed in such arts, sciences, or tongues convenient for her, as can be learned in this Province." Dated September 17, 1698. Page 276.-- Richard, Earl of Bellomont, Governor, etc. To all, etc. Know ye that at New York this (???) day of (???) 1698, the last will of Christiana Teller was proved, and Leonard Lewis and Samuel Staats were confirmed as executors.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Jacobus Teller, of the Manor of Cortlandt, in Westchester County, Esquire, being now of sound mind. I leave to my eldest son, John, "my Gun, or Fowling piece, which now remaineth with me," and £5 when he comes of age. I leave to my wife Maritie the income of all my estate while she remains my widow, with power to sell as much real estate as may be necessary for the maintenance of my younger children. After her death, or marriage, I leave all estate to my 4 sons and 4 daughters, viz. John, Pierre, Tobias, James, Rachel, Syntie, Margaret, and Mary. I make my wife Maritie, James Vanbleek, and Pierre Van Cortlandt, executors. December 5, 1760. Witnesses, Cornelius Chatterton, John Teller, William Tyse. Proved in New York, September 14, 1761.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, John Teller, of Teller's Neck, in the Manor of Cortlandt, in Westchester County, yeoman, being in bodily health. After all debts are paid, I leave to my son, William Teller, £5. "I having already given him a trade and put him in a way of business, which I hope by his Industry and good management will with the Blessing of Almighty God, enable him to live comfortably and with good credit and Report." In case of his death the £5 are to be paid to his heirs, who will be my heir at law. I leave to my granddaughter, Catharine Teller, daughter of my son, Peter, deceased, £15, when of age. I leave to my wife Alche the use of all my estate, real and personal, during her natural life. After her decease I leave all my estate to my children. To my sons, Isaac, John, James, Luke, and Abraham, each 1/8. To my daughter Catharine 1/8 and a negro wench whose value is to be included in her share; also 1/3 of my plate, valued at £10. To my daughter Jozina 1/8 and a negro wench, and 1/3 of my plate. To my daughter Rachel, wife of Luke Stoutenburgh, of the Nine Partners, 1/8 and a negro wench, and 1/3 of my plate. I make my sons, executors. Dated February 25, 1763. Witnesses, Isaac Vermilye, Isaac Vermilye, Jr., Thomas Allen, schoolmaster. Proved, February 16, 1767. Confirmed by Governor Cadwallader Colden, January 11, 1775.

In Switzerland William was an author of Religious works. His father, Romanus Teller, was a clergyman of great distinction in Holland. William Teller became a refugee in Holland, during the Thirty Years War.

He came to Albany in 1639 where he was appointed wachmeister by the Dutch West India Company.

William Teller was sent to Fort Orange by Gov. Kieft to serve as corporal, then Wachtmeister of the Fort. He was a trader in Albany for nearly 50 years. He was a prosperous Merchant and Fur Trader dealing extensively with the Indians and became a wealthy man for his time. While in Albany he was elected a Deacon of the Dutch Church in 1658. He is mentioned as "Honorable" in 1664, and was Justice of the Peace 1684.

William Teller made a deposition July 6, 1698 at age 78 stating he arrived in Beverwick (Albany) 1639 and lived there until 1692 when he removed to New York City; he made one short voyage to Holland.

He was one of five proprietors of Schenectady, although he never lived there. He was one of the five patentees named in the 1st patent of town in 1684.

On 18 Jul 1661, a number of dissatisfied and independent families of Beverwyck and Fort Orange, who wished to purchase land a move to Schenectady, applied to Peter Stuyvesant, the Director General, for permission to purchase of the Indians lands at Schenectady. Among those were William Teller and Andres Bradt. William Teller was the ninth proprietor named.<sup>2</sup> William's first wife, Margaret Donfan (Douchen, Dusen), was a sister of Alexander Lindsay Glen's wife. He was not only one of the original proprietors but one of the five patentees mentioned in the first patent of the town granted by Governor Dongan in 1684. On the apportionment in 1684, his allotments on the plat were No. 5. His village lot, 200 feet square was on the northwest corner of Union and Washington. He gave all his property in Schenectady to his son John in 1700, when he moved with the rest of his family to New Amsterdam. He was a man of great wealth and influence in his day. (Early History of Schenectady - Sanders)<sup>2</sup>

Document: In the name of the Lord Amen, be it known that in the year of our Lord Jesus Christ sixteen hundred and sixty-four, the 19th day of April, appeared before the Johannes La Montagne, in the service of, etc., the honorable Willem Teller, widower of the late Margariet Donckesen, who declares in the presence of witnesses, that for God's honor he has contracted a future marriage with Maria Verlet, widow of the late Paulus, Schrick, and before the consumation of the same, he the subscriber, has made up and exhibited for the seven remaining; children of Margariet Donckesen (the subscriber's late wife), the sum of three thousand five hundred carolus guilders in beaver's price, exclusive of all debts hitherto made, which he undertakes to pay, to be distributed to wit: to Anderies Teller aged 22 years, Helena Teller 19 years, Martjen? 16 years, Elizabeth Teller 5 years, being her matrimonial inheritance, and for the payment of the aforesaid sum, the subscriber offers all his estate personal and real, as a pledge and mortgage....<sup>1</sup>

In the (2) record of their banns, they were: Willem Teller, Van't Fort Orangie, Wedr. Van Margariet Dunces, en Maria Verleth, Wede. Van Paulus Schrick.

William Teller made a deposition July 6, 1698 at age 78 stating: He arrived in Beverwick (Albany) 1639 and lived there until 1692.

In his will, he wrote: Wm. Teller, Sr., New York. "Merchant." This 19th day of March, 1698. Leaves to his eldest son Andrew, £500, in consideration of his birthright or primogeniture. To son William, 20 merchantable beavers at 12 shillings each. To Anna Margartie, the daughter of my son Jacob, deceased, 20 shillings, and no more, "for good and sufficient reasons I have for soe doing." To daughter-in-law Susanah Brockholst and to my daughter Janake Schuyler, of their mother's portion, the quantity of 85 beavers at 12 shillings each. Leaves to children Andrew, Helena Rumbout, the two children of my daughter Mary Van Allen, deceased, Elizabeth Vander Pool, William, John and Janake Schyler, all the wrought silver which my present wife found at the time of her marriage. Legacies are to be paid after the death of his wife Mary, and the rest of estate to be di-

vided among the persons above named. Mentions former conveyance of a piece of land in New York, to his son Caspar, which he repudiates, and any of his children claiming under it, are to be cut off from inheritance. Makes son Andrew executor. Witnesses, Johnes Kip, Peter Rychman, Johannes Kierstede. Proved, May 23, 1701. Inventory of estate of Wm. Teller. Taken by his wife, Mary Teller, August 1, 1701. "45,537 guilders, 7 styvers, Wampum value, which being reduced to English money amounts to £1138, 8s, 8d."

In her will, Mary Teller wrote: I, Mary Teller, of the city of New York, widow and relict of William Teller, being in health of body. I direct that my executors shall take, with all convenient speed, an exact account of all such goods as shall be left in my possession, that remain of the estate of my late husband, and deliver the same to the executors of my said husband. The executors are to make an inventory of my personal property, and one half shall be put at interest for the children of my eldest daughter, Susanah Brockholst, viz. Mary, Henry, Judy, Susanah and Janechie, to be paid to them when they are of age. The other half to the children of my younger daughter, Janechie Schuyler, deceased, viz., Margareta, Philip, Mary and Casparus. I leave to my eldest daughter, Susanah Brockholst, and to her heirs and assigns, all that a certain Garden, lot, or toft of ground now in my possession, lying and being within this city, on the east side of the Broadway, to the south of the house of Peter King, and to the north of the house of William Mosse, and to the west of the New street. And as for the rest of my real estate, which consists of a house and lot of ground where I now live, situate in the Smiths street, between the houses of Thomas Noel, and the house of the widow of Hendrick Van Bursom. Together with another house and lot of ground in the Broadway, now in the tenure of Robert White on the east of the said Broadway, betwixt John Corbetts house and that of the widow of Walter Hyer. I leave one half of the same to the children of my eldest daughter, Susanah Brockholst, and the other half to the children of my younger daughter, Janechie Schuyler, and they are to remain in the hands of my executors till some of the children are of age, and then the executors shall have power to sell the same. If any of my grand children shall wish to purchase, they are to have the preference. I make my brother-in-law, Colonel Nicholas Bayard, and in case of his decease, his son, Mr. Samuel Bayard, and my son-in-law, Major Anthony Brockholst, and my son-in-law, Arent Schuyler, and in case of his decease, his brother, Captain Brandt Schuyler, my executors. Dated November, 1701. Witnesses, Jan Van Varicks, Hermanus Bensingh, William Huddleston. Proved in New York, before Dr. John Bridges, Doctor of laws, and executors confirmed, September 21, 1702.

New York, December 20, 1702. Inventory of the estate of Mary Teller, widow of William Teller, Sr. 3 casks of Dutch nails, as by invoice of Mr. Abraham Hardenbrook, 830 lbs., at 6d., £20, 15. Estate equally divided, one half to Mrs. Brockholst for the use of her children, and the other half to Mr. Francis Schuyler, for the use of his children, pursuant to the will of said deceased. Money found, £669. Total amount, £1,275 York Currency. Nicholas Bayard, Anthony Brockholst. Memorandum, that on December 20, 1704, an account was received by Captain Bond from Abraham Hardenbrook, merchant at Amsterdam, whereby he charges himself debtor to the estate of Mary Teller for the net produce of a bundle of Peltry, and 21 Elk skins. In Holland money, 218 Guilders 9 Stuyvers. Sworn to by Major Anthony Brockholst, before Thomas Wenham, September 8, 1705.

William Teller, with his parents, moved to Schenectady, where he was engaged with his father in the fur trade. He later returned to Albany, and was a merchant of that place. After his marriage, he removed to New York City.<sup>1</sup>

In the NYC Ref Ch record of their banns and marriage they were: Willem Teller de Jonge, j.m. Van N. Albanien, en Rachel Kierstede, j.d. Van N. Yorke, beyde wonende alhier.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, William Teller, of New York, Gentleman, being in sound and perfect memory. It is my will that after my decease, the whole of my estate, real and personal, shall remain in the possession of my wife Rachel Kierstede alias Teller while she remains unmarried. And she shall bring up the children till of age or married, and then to give them such portion as she shall think fit. And after her death to my children. My eldest son William is to have I5 in lieu of any pretence of his being heir at law. Legacies to sons John and Jacobus, and to three daughters (not named). I make my wife executor, and my beloved cousins, Jacobus Kip and Stephen Richards, trustees. Dated June 25, 1710. Witnesses, William Eigt Andries Marschall, Isaac Kip, Abraham Van Vlecq. Proved, May 4, 1711.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, William Teller, of the South Precinct of Dutchess County, yeoman, being weak in body. All debts are to be paid in some convenient time. I leave to my eldest son, William Teller, my gun, sword and cane, "above the rest of my children, on account of and for his birth right, and in lieu of all other pretensions on that account." I leave to my wife Mary the use of all estate during her widowhood. After her death or marriage, I leave all the estate to my eleven children, viz., William, Jeremiah, Rachel, wife of John Linn, Anne, Mary, wife of Jacobus Buys, John, Jacobus, Margaret, Gualterus, Sarah, and Isaac, including all that my executors may recover out of the several lots, tracts, and parcels of land for merly belonging to my grand mother, Sarah Roeloffse, otherwise called Sarah Stoothoff, widow of Hans Kierstede, situate in New York or elsewhere, as also a certain piece of land situate in the Out ward of New York, near Freshwater, "or Pott house," granted to my father, William Teller, and Company, and all such other lands I may have a right to in any place. My executors have power to sell lands at discretion. If my son William shall establish any claim as heir at law of said Sarah Roeloffse to land at Freshwater pond, then his legacies, except the gun, sword, and cane, are to be void. I make my wife and sons, and my son in law, John Buys, executors. Dated July 21, 1753. Witnesses, Henry Terboss, Cornelius Osborn, James G. Livingston. Proved in Court of Common Pleas in Dutchess County, before Matthew Du Bois, Judge, and Peter Ten Broeck and Nicholas De Lavergne, Justices, May 16, 1759. [NOTE.--The land in New York, near Freshwater, is on the east side of Broadway north of Chambers street. The original south line included Chambers street and a small strip of City Hall park.--W. S. P.]
