The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Daniel Tuthill, of Goshen, in Orange County, being in perfect health. "As for my burial I desire it may be decent without Pomp or State." I leave to my wife Susanah the use of all my estate during her widowhood. I leave to my son Daniel all that part of my lands and improvements lying on the east side of the road as it now runs through the farm. I leave the rest of my buildings and lands on the west side of the road to my son John. And Daniel shall pay to his brother Phineas £10 when of age. And John shall pay to his brother Samuel £10 when of age. I leave all the rest of my movable estate "to my children who are younger than my son John." (Names not given.) I make my wife and Joshua Brown and my son Daniel executors. Dated February 23, 1761. Witnesses, John Brewster, Samuel Smith, Selah Strong. Proved, September 28, 1761.

In the marriage record they were: Jeremias Tothill, j.m. Uyt oudt Engelt. en Janneken De Key, j.d. Van N. Yorke, beyde woonende alhier.

In her will, she wrote: I, Jane Tothill, of New York, widow, being sick. Whereas my late husband, Jeremiah Tothill, in his last will, dated May 29, 1705, left 1/2 of his goods to me and 1/2 to the children, viz., Mary, Hyla, Jeremiah, Edward and Jane, And the said Mary having since married John Reade of New York, merchant, and the said Hyla being dead, I leave to my son Jeremiah all that my messuage and tenement and lot whereon I dwell, situate on Queen street in New York, when he is of age. I leave to my son Edward all that my other messuage or house and one-half the lot, the whole to be divided into two equal parts, and formerly in possession of widow Davis, but now empty, situate in Queen street, extending from the street towards the river with the use of a gang-way 3 feet wide to the river. I leave to my daughter Jane and her heirs all my other messuage or tenement, with the other half of the lot now in the tenure of (???) Banaker, situated on Countesses Quay or Dock, and extending from said Quay or dock backwards towards Queen street, a gangway being left from the lot left to my son Edward to the river. And in regard that the premises have small improvements thereon, I leave to my daughter Jane £250, and she may sell the house and lot to my sons but not to any other person. I leave to my executors all my right in a tract of land in the county of New Castle, on the south side of Christianus river or creek, And two lots at the northeast corner of New Castle, In trust to sell the same. I leave to my son-in-law, John Reade, as a further addition to my daughter Mary's portion, £100. I also leave to my daughter Mary my gold snuff-box and a large china jar and an alabaster ring. I leave to my daughter Jane my gold chain, with a diamond locket and a ring set with pearls and a large India cabinet. I leave to my granddaughter, Mary Reade, my gold chain with fine links. I leave to my children all my wrought plate and jewels. I leave to my sister Janeway, and her daughter Agnes, a mourning suit, as my granddaughter Mary Reade shall think fit. I leave to John Broughton, son of my sister, Mary Broughton, £25 when of age. I leave to my son Jeremiah my clock. I leave to Trinity Church, £10 "for opening my husband's grave for me." All the rest of estate to be sold and proceeds to my children. I make my son-in-law John Reade, and my sons Jeremiah and Edward and daughter Jane executors. Dated June 23, 1720. Witnesses, Samuel Bayard, John Cruger, Barent Rynders, John Wileman.

Codicil, June 25, 1720. Whereas my husband Jeremiah Tothill, left to his daughters Hyla and Jane, each a lot of land in

Maiden lane, in New York, "which said lots being for a long time of little value," I have sold the same to my great advantage to Anthony Rutgers, brewer, for £100 each, "being much more than the said lots were then really worth," and have given him a bond of £500 to indemnify him against all claim. My children are to release the same when of age. Proved, December 29, 1720. [NOTE.--The house and lot left to son Jeremiah is now No. 119 Pearl street or Hanover square. The house and lot left to her son Edward is now No. 186 Pearl street, and the house and lot left to daughter Jane is the lot in the rear, now No. 144 Water street. These lots are the east part of a water lot granted by the city to Johannes Kip, September 7, 1692. He sold this lot to Jeremiah Tothill, November 27, 1697. The west part of the lot he sold to Colonel Abraham DePeyster. Jane Tothill sold her part to her brother Edward, and he sold the whole to John Searle. The lots on Maiden lane are west of Gold street and bounded west by the line of the "Shoemaker's Pasture." The price paid by Anthony Rutgers (£100 York currency) was about \$150 a lot.--W. S. P.]

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Jeremiah Tothill, of New York, merchant, being indisposed of body. This February 2, 1731, I order that my house and land in the East Ward of New York be sold by my executors to Mr. Enoch Stephenson, the present tenant, according to agreement I have made. Of the money, there is to be paid £100 to my sister Jane Gilbert, £20 to Jeremiah Tothill, son of my brother Edward, £20 to Mary, daughter of my brother Edward. The rest of the money to Thomas and Jane Gilbert, children of my sister Jane Gilbert. I leave to my brother Edward, my silver tankard, and my clothes and books. I leave to my sister, Jane Gilbert, all my rights to lands in the County of New Castle, and all my plate and household goods except the tankard. I make my brother Edward and my sister Jane executors. Witnesses, George Thomas, Thomas Marston, John Avery. Proved, March 7, 1743.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, John Tuthill, Jr., of Southold, in Suffolk County, yeoman, being weak in body. I leave to my wife Elizabeth all movable estate. My executors are to sell all that land and meadow which I purchased of John Robinson, and also 1 1/2 lots of land which I purchased of Benjamin Conkling, lying in the Second Division of Accaboge. These I order to be sold by my executors to pay debts, and if there is any over, "then to my wife to bring up my son Samuel at Collidge." I leave to my eldest son, Jonathan, 100 acres of land, lying on the west side of the land I bought of the widow Brasier, at the Highlands; Also 5 shillings. I leave to my son John, all lands and meadows lying at a place commonly called and known by the Oyster Ponds, upper and lower neck, with all buildings, except 1/3, which I give to my wife during her life; And my son John is to pay to my executors £100, and £50 to my son Jeremiah. I leave to my son Isaiah, all the lands and meadows I purchased of David Reeve, lying in Accaboge, being 1 and 1/4 lots, and he is to pay to my executors £30. I leave to my son Nathan, all land I purchased of Daniel Terry, laying in Accaboge, being 160 acres, and he is to pay £200 to my executors. I leave to my son Jeremiah, all my land I purchased of William Coleman, at the Highlands, except 60 acres, at the north end, which I give to my son Jonathan, bounded west by Jonathan Tuthill, north by the river. I leave to my son Samuel 600 acres of land, off the east side of the land I purchased of the widow Brasier, at the Highlands. I leave to my eldest daughter, Elizabeth Terry, 1/3 of the Brown lot, in the Second Division, at Accaboge. I leave to my daughter Hannah, 200 acres of land which I purchased of the widow Brasier, lying at the Highlands, adjoining to my son Jonathan. I leave to my daughter Mary Brown, 100 acres of land which I purchased of the widow Brasier, lying at the Highlands, between my son Samuel's land and my daughter Hannah's land; Also all my lands west of John Robinson's land, lying in Brookhaven. I leave to my brother James Tuthill 1/2 of a lot which I purchased of Dayton's right, in Brookhaven, south of the County road. I give 3/4 of a right in the Manor land, for the upholding of a preached Gospel, at the Wading river, for ever. I make my brother, Joshua Tuthill, and my brother, Joseph Brown, and my son John, executors. Dated June 9, 1740. Witnesses, Henry Tuthill, Joseph Andrew, Parmenus Horton. Proved, August 6, 1743. [NOTE.--The lands at the Highlands, purchased of the widow Brasier, are in the vicinity of West Point.--W. S. P.]

I leave to my son William "a roan horse, called Tin ware," and all the cattle and sheep belonging to me on the farm, and the best feather bed, and 1/2 the crops now in the ground. I leave to Solomon Tuthill my pacing mare and a bed with linsey woolsey ticking; Also 1/2 of a bond for £6 due from Benjamin Harlow, Jr. I leave to Thomas Tuthill my great iron pot and a bed. To John Tuthill, a black horse. All the rest of my movables are to be sold, and the money paid to my 3 younger sons. I make James Tuthill executor. Witnesses, Abigail Horton, Patrick Mullen, Alexander Smith. Proved, May 8, 1747.

My executors are to sell all my estate at such a time and in such a way as they shall think most to advantage of my children. I leave to my son Jonathan æ50. The rest of my estate I leave to all my children, "except my daughter Mary, and to her I give 5 shillings" [rest of children not named]. I make my good friends, Abimal Youngs and Joseph Wodkins, of Ulster County, executors. Witnesses, Hugh Byrn, William Bancker, Benjamin Tusten, Derrick Smith. Proved, February 28, 1771, before John Gale.
