The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

23 June 1720 (Westchester Town Records) -- Abraham Underhill and wife Hannah sell to John Williams, Jr., all of Westchester, a dwelling and orchard.¹

10 Dec 1734 -- (Westchester Co. Land Records, Liber G, p. 238) Abraham Underhill, John Williams and Phoebe Cranston, late Phoebe Cromwell, Executors to the last will of Thomas Cromwell, late of Westchester, dec'd., all that 25 pounds privilege of ye sheep pasture of Westchester, whereof ye sd. Thomas Cromwell died seized, and was given him by his father-in-law Joseph Hunt, Esq.²

Abraham Underhill made his will Aug. 18, 1750, which was proven in Westchester County, N. Y., before Samuel Purdy, Esq., Oct. 2, 1750, and is recorded in New York published wills, Vol. 4, p. 302. In it he mentions his wife Hannah, sons Abraham, Jacob and Isaac; daughters Hannah and Martha, and makes his brother, Nathaniel, and Caleb Horton his executors. The will is witnessed by Wm. Hooker Smith, Benjamin Roe and Caleb Hyatt, Jr.

Humphrey Underhill and his sister, Mary, came to New Amsterdam at the invitation of their uncle, Thomas Hall.¹

He must have come to New York before 1666, as on Feb. 14 of that year his sister was married there. They are presumed to have come over to live with their uncle Thomas Hall in Manhattan, and the first mention of Humphrey is in the will of Hall's widow, Aug. 31, 1669.

His sister Mary Underhill, b. 1640, m. (1) 1666 Thomas Naylor; m. (2) 1668, Richard Stites.

By Dec. 20, 1669 Humphrey was at Jamaica, Long Island, where he lived for the next six or seven years, and was elected fence viewer and pounder. It was there that he married Sarah, widow of one of Jamaica's ubiquitous Smiths. Neither her maiden name nor the first name of her Smith husband is known, but Mrs. Frost suspected she was a sister of John Rowleson, a Dutchman to whom Humphrey sold his Jamaica house and some twenty acres, Sept. 14, 1675. The last mention of Humphrey at Jamaica was Apr. 6, 1676, when he sold his rights in the town's undivided lands. He removed to Rye, where in 1681 he purchased the "Vineyard Farm" for £700 in provisions. He also acquired land in the White Plains Patent of Rye, and eventually settled in that section of the town. In 1705 he was to build a mill on the Mamaroneck River, where son-in-law Samuel Hunt would grind corn. Humphrey became a prominent citizen of Rye. The town's records often call him Captain, presumably a militia rank. In 1689 he represented the town at a county meeting, and in 1696 was elected one of Westchester

County's delegates to the NY General Assembly. In this period Rye, as a border town, also sometimes gave its allegiance to Connecticut, and in 1692 and again in 1697/8, Capt. Humphrey was a Deputy to the Connecticut General Court at Hartford.

In his will, he wrote: July 3, 1722. I, Humphrey Underhill, of Rye, in the County of Westchester, being sick. I leave to my wife, Sarah, all my estate during her life. I leave to my daughter Elizabeth, wife of Samuel Meritt, and to her heirs, all that my piece of land, which he has now within fence, on the south side of the highway, and so along by the said highway, as far as to the old Lots, and so along by the said Lots southerly, within a rod of the Great Swamp, as far as my land goes; and thence cross a white oak tree which stands marked, and thence to the corner by the road; Also the land where his house stands, from the place where the marked tree is, between that and Samuel Hunt's land, as far as the fence now goes along the road, and then northerly a rod over the run, and thence to a heap of stones, to make it equal front and rear. I leave to my daughter Mary, wife of Samuel Hunt, 5 shillings. I leave to my grand-children, Underhill Barnes, Thomas Barnes, and William Barnes, Elizabeth Clarke, Sarah Clarke, Hannah Clarke, and Elizabeth Clarke, £3 10s. To my two daughters, Sarah Budd and Elizabeth Meritt, all my household goods. I leave to my wife's son, Benjamin Smith, £3. I make my wife Sarah, and Samuel Meritt, and Jonathan Haight, executors. Witnesses, Jonathan Smith, Jonathan Purdy, John Carhart. Proved, October 22, 1722.

Sarah Underhill is mentioned in the will of Robert Field of Greenwich, Conn., dated Aug. 26, 1784, proven Nov. 2, 1784, as his daughter. He also mentions other children, Uriah and Jerusha Field. (Wills at Stamford, Conn., Liber P., p. 182.)

Bolton in his History of Westchester County, N. Y., states: "In the old family mansion which stands on the Pines Bridge Road is shown the room in which Major Andre and Joshua H. Smith breakfasted on Sept. 23, 1780. At this period the house was occupied by Isaac and Sarah Underhill, she a daughter of Robert Field, whose nephew was a resident of Yorktown, and appears to have been a woman of good resolution and courage. While entertaining Andre and his companion she took particular notice of the former and imagined she read in his confusion a person embarrassed in some great undertaking. A few days previous to this event she had visited headquarters to recover some cattle carried off by a band of marauders."

In a letter written by Abraham I. Underhill, son of Isaac and Sarah, he states that his mother was ill some time before her death and was rendered speechless and helpless. The letter is of great length, giving minute details of her final days and of her

religious spirit, but is without date.

It is not definitely known when John Underhill arrived in New England, but he was in Holland Feb. 26, 1630, when his wife received her share of her father's estate and is first mentioned in New England on Sept. 7, 1630, when the Court of Assistants met at Charlestown and ordered that Mr. Patrick and Mr. Underhill be allowed one-half year's provision, two hogsheds of meal, four bushels of malt and about ten pounds in money for other provisions. "The public to stand the charge and the year to commence from the time they begin to keep house." (Records of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay, Vol. 1, p. 75.) On Sept. 28, 1630, the Court ordered that Mr. Patrick and Mr. Underhill should have a certain allowance in money, to purchase household stuff and for help to wash, brew and bake. (Ibid., p. 76.) At this same meeting it was decided that there "shall be levied and collected out of the several plantations, the sum of fifty pounds for the maintenance of Mr. Patrick and Mr. Underhill." (Ibid., p. 77.)²

John Underhill and Daniel Patrick were in the Guard of the Prince of Orange in Holland and were brought to New England by John Winthrop, where they became the first paid military officers to direct the colonists. On May 18, 1631, they were made freemen (New England Register, vol. 3, p. 90) and before that time the title of Captain had been conferred upon them. The fact that they were accepted as freemen indicates that they had joined the church and taken the oath of allegiance and Savage states that the name of John Underhill was No. 57 in the list of members of the First Church in Boston. On July 26, 1631, the court ordered a general training of Capt. Underhill's Company, on every first Thursday in every month in Boston and Roxbury.²

Daniel Patrick had also married a Dutch woman, Anneke van Beyeren, who after the tragic death of her husband in 1644, in Capt. John Underhill's home in Stamford, Conn., became the wife of Tobias Feke of Flushing, where on Aug. 14, 1649, she gave power of attorney to Adraien van der Donck, who was about to "depart for the Fatherland," to investigate the state of her affairs there and to collect whatever "may be coming to me." As late as Jan. 13, 1662, a letter from the Court of Holland to the Directors at Amsterdam, recommended a petition of Cornelis van Delvendee and others, regarding property at The Hague, belonging in part to the children of Anna Aelbrechts van Beyeren, widow of Daniel Patrick, an Englishman, residing in New Netherland, praying the Directors at Amsterdam to institute inquiries in New Netherland, for any heirs or children of said Anna. (Dutch Manuscript, pp. 48, 297.)²

In May, 1634, John Underhill was elected Deputy to the General Court and on 7 mo., 1 day, 1634, is listed as one of the Selectmen, which record is the earliest existing of the town of Boston. (New England Register, Vol. 4, p. 124.)²

At a court held at New Town, Sept. 3, 1634, he served on a committee with others to locate convenient places for forts on Castle Island and in Charlestown and Dorchester. (Records of Colony of Massachusetts Bay, Vol. 1, p. 125.) On Nov. 6, 1634, he was about to sail for England and carried with him a letter to Winthrop's son and was given permission to visit his friends in Holland, although there is no evidence to show that he did so. When he returned is not known, but before September, 1635.²

The Massachusetts Bay Colony Records, Vol. 1, p. 191, state that on 1 mo., 9 day, 1636/7, John Underhill was chosen Captain for Boston and for the "country's service" doubtless preparatory to participation in the Pequot War, through which he so ably served that John Fiske in writing of his valor there as well as of that of Capt. John Mason, considered their "overthrow of the Pequots a cardinal event in the planting of New England and removed the chief obstacle in colonizing the Connecticut coast." In August 1637, the court consented to allow Capt. Underhill continued maintenance for three months at Saybrook. (Ibid, vol. 1, p. 200.)²

No one escaped the religious controversies of the day and Capt. John Underhill with his liberal views was no exception. He had fallen under the influence of the teachings of Ann Hutchinson and her husband's brother-in-law, Rev. John Wheelwright, who was tried for a sermon he preached in the Boston church on fast-day 1637 and declared guilty of sedition and contempt and sentenced to be banished and disfranchised. Capt. John Underhill with his love of justice signed a petition in his behalf and in consequence he was discharged from further service (and was to have a quarter's pay for a gratuity), by the court held 2

of 9 mo. 1637, but for putting his hand to a seditious writing was ordered disfranchised, put from the Captain's place and disarmed (Mass. Bay Colony Records, Vol. 1, pp. 208, 211). It is of interest to note in the list of Boston men who signed the petition for Rev. Wheelwright, that twenty of them already were, or shortly became members of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of that place.²

It was probably about this time in 1637, that the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Boston was formed, although it did not receive its charter until 13 of 1 mo., 1638. It is the oldest military organization in America and a direct offspring of the Honourable Artillery Company of London, England. Its publication states that Capt. John Underhill was the eleventh signer on the original membership roll, but although one of its founders he never became an officer in the organization. In its list of members were enrolled forty-one veterans, members of the Honourable Artillery Company of London, among them being the name of John Underhill who was admitted Sept. 27, 1614. The Boston Company is "a living link between generations past and present and has outlived every institution, excepting the Christian Church and the Public Schools, that was in existence on the American continent, when it was chartered."²

The first charter of the Honourable Artillery Company of London, was granted Aug. 25, 1537 by King Henry VIII, to certain of his subjects belonging to the fraternity of St. George, as a "Guylde of Artillary of Longbowes, Crossbowes and Handegomes" and a piece of ground was set apart for their use and known as "The Artillery Garden." During the reign of Queen Elizabeth, important services were rendered there by the Company, by fitting citizens for the command of the City trainbands and drilling private soldiers for general musters. In 1598, the Artillery Company as it was then styled, numbered six hundred members and in 1632 was addressed by King Charles I. as the "Voluntary Company of the Artillery Garden" and it was granted by him its armorial bearings. The Honourable Artillery Company as it is known today, with its original parade ground still flourishes in London, taking part in all wars in which England has since been engaged. It is said to be the oldest existing military organization in the British Empire.²

Late in 1637, Capt. John left for England, where the Calendar of State Papers, Colonial Series, London, 1574-1660, page 267, have the following notice of him: "Brooke House, March 24, 1638. Minutes of a Committee for Providence Island. Capt. Underhill was this day entertained on these conditions: To go by next ship to Providence; to have his own and one servant's transportation, borne by the company; to have one hundred pounds sterling for one year, whereof seventy pounds in hand, the rest to his assigns, immediately on the first notice that the year is expended, the said year to commence from May 12 next; to have meat and drink found him and his servant, in the Island." (Colonial Entry Book, Vol. 3, pp. 228-9.) He evidently never went there, and under date of April 26, 1638, in the ancient register of Stationers Hall in London, is: "Entered for his copy, under the hands of Mr. Clay and Mr. Apsley, warden, a book called 'Newes from America,' by Capt. John Underhill." The title page states it was printed for Peter Cole and that the books were to be sold at the sign of the Glove in Corne-hill near the Royale Exchange. There are four original copies now known to exist, owned by the British Museum in London and two New York Libraries and a Boston Library. There have been several reproductions, the latest being in 1902, by D. Harris Underhill, the family historian, the remaining copies of which are owned by the Underhill Society of America. The book contains forty-four pages and gives a dramatic account of his activities in the Pequot War and an enlightening opinion of a woman, as follows: "My selfe received an arrow through my coate sleeve, a second against my Helmet on the forehead, so as if God in his providence had not moved the heart of my wife to persuade mee to carrie it along with me which I was unwilling to doe, I had been slaine. Give me leave to observe two things from hence first when the houre of Death is not yet come, you see God useth weake means to keepe his purpose unviolated. Secondly, let no man despise advise and Counsell of his wife though shee be a woman; it were strange to nature to thinke a man should be bound to fulfill the humour of a woman, what armes hee should carry, but you see God will have it so, that a woman should overcome a man; what with Daliahs flattery and with her mournful teares must and will have their desire, when the hand of God goes along in the matter," etc.²

That he was in Boston again by Aug. 1, 1638, is evidenced by the fact that on that day he sold to Thomas Makepeace of Dorchester, his house in Boston with 100 acres of upland at Muddy River (now Brookline), etc., and "his share of woodlands in the Islands with a garden at the house and another behind Parker's house to the quantity of one-half acre and somewhat more and also near half an acre upon the Fort Hill, for one hundred pounds."²

Because he still believed he was right in his religious convictions and would not retract what he had proclaimed in signing the petition previously mentioned, he was on 6 of 7 mo., 1638 (p. 237, Massachusetts Bay Colonial Records), sentenced to be banished, as Mr. John Underhill; to leave within fourteen days and not to return except to take passage for England in the ship Salem. He followed Wheelwright, leaving Boston late in September, 1638, for the neighborhood of Exeter, now in New Hampshire, and became Governor of Dover and Exeter, serving about a year. That he was early considering changing his residence is evidenced by the fact that on Sept. 8, 1639, the Dutch records of New Amsterdam have the following minute: "Whereas Governor John Underhill residing towards the North requests permission to dwell with some families here under our protection. On condition of enjoying such Freedom as the other inhabitants residing here, said Underhill's request is granted, provided that he and the people accompanying him shall take the oath of allegiance to their High Mightinesses the States General and His Highness the Prince of Orange."²

That he thought of New Amsterdam for a new home was but natural, for there is every evidence that his sister and his mother were residing there at the very period of his request. The first mention made of Petronella Underhill is in the Dutch Colonial Manuscript, when on May 16, 1638, J. de Voocht gave her a note for 300 guilders and on Sept. 17, 1638, he paid 50 guilders on account. Before Aug. 6, 1639, she was the wife of Ulrich Lupold and the Dutch Baptisms in New Amsterdam, Vol. 1, page 10, state that Lupold had a son baptized Aug. 2, 1640, one of the witnesses being Leonora Onderhyll. The grandparents, if available, always witnessed the baptism of a grandchild in the Dutch Church of that period. This baptism with its witness more than strongly suggests that Petronella was the daughter of Leonora, therefore making Petronella a sister of Capt. John. Ulrich Lupold was appointed Provincial Schout Fiscal in Holland in 1637 and in New Amsterdam, March 28, 1638. (New Netherland Register, p. 38.) On March 14, 1641, he was about to be sent to Holland to answer for his delinquences as a store keeper, but on Sept. 12 of that year, on petition of "some respectable Englishmen," he was permitted to remain in New Amsterdam. Petronella Lupold on Dec. 22, 1641, witnessed in the Dutch Church, the baptism of Jannetje, daughter of

Theunis Nyssen, whose wife was Phoebea Faelix from "Jarleston," England. On Aug. 28, 1642 (Dutch Mss. Vol. 1, p. 81) Lupold was again in trouble with the authorities and the probabilities are that he and his wife sailed for Holland shortly after, as they are not again mentioned in the records of New Amsterdam. Leonora, had doubtless, before their departure, returned to Exeter, N. H., the exile home of herself and husband.²

Why John Underhill did not take advantage of the permission to reside in New Amsterdam at this time cannot now be determined. The General Court at Boston, on 13, 1 mo., 1638/9, had granted him safe conduct to come and answer certain charges against him and gave him until the 22nd of the 3 mo., to comply. (Col. of Massachusetts Bay, Vol. 1, p. 251.) On the 29 of 11 mo., 1639, the request was renewed at his solicitation and he was assured by the authorities that he could come and return in safety, provided the time he was to be in Boston, would be the first week of the first month next, or the second week of the third month and not stay more than ten days, after receiving notice to depart. (New England Register, Vol. 16, p. 158.) The Court held at Boston, 7 of 8 mo., 1640, shows that he delayed accepting the privilege accorded him, but that he was there at that time and openly and humbly acknowledged his sins and errors and was again received into the church, but his banishment was to continue until the end of the next Court of Elections, when it was to be further considered. (Col. of Massachusetts Bay, Vol. 1, p. 301.) And at the meeting of the General Court held in Boston, 14, 4, 1641, the order of his banishment was repealed. (Ibid., p. 329.)²

On his return to Dover in 1640, he found Thomas Roberts had been elected in his place.²

The records of the First Church of Boston, under date of Aug. 22, 1641, state: "Our brother Capt. John Underhill and our sister Helena, his wife, were this day granted letters of recommendation to the church at Exeter." This gives us the knowledge that he was still lingering in New England, but the West India Company's records state that they received a letter from him dated New Amsterdam, Jan. 6, 1642, and the Dutch records of that place give evidence again of his intention of residing under its jurisdiction, for on Jan. 16, 1642, he leased from Andries Hudde, the latter's house and plantation in Flatlands, for two years from May, 1642, the yearly rental being two hundred pounds of tobacco, well cured. He may have occupied this plantation during that summer, but it appears doubtful.²

The records of the First Church of Boston, page 76, show that it was his desire "to go to the Dutch," but the church wished him to locate with the English at Stamford, Conn., near the Dutch. "He had been restored into favor with the church sufficient to induce them to fit him out with a pinnace to take him and his family to some place where he could find better employment," and at a Town Meeting held in Stamford, in October, 1642, he was given eight acres of land and on 5 of 2 mo., 1643, he was elected Deputy from that place to the General Court of New Haven (New Haven Colony Records, 1639-1649, p. 85), proving conclusively that he had decided to establish his residence there.²

During 1643, the fear of an Indian uprising was felt among the Dutch and English Colonists and on Oct. 27, 1643, as per the General Court of the Jurisdiction of New Haven, Conn., a proposition and request were made "by Capt. Underhill and Mr. Allerton, by instruction from the Dutch Governor and some freemen of that jurisdiction, for the raising of one hundred soldiers out of the plantation of the English and armed and victualled, to be led by Capt. Underhill against the Indians, now in hostility against the Dutch, to be paid by bills of exchange into Holland." (New Haven Colony Records, 1639-1649, page 116.)²

As the Court did not deem it advisable to send Capt. Underhill and the Englishmen who would have to serve under him, against the Indians, without the consent of the other members of their Confederacy (Massachusetts, Plymouth and Connecticut), Underhill requested a loan of twenty pounds, to be repaid by the town of Stamford out of the salary they allowed him yearly. This was duly considered and the loan made, provided Stamford would agree to its payment and "to prevent the snares of larger offers for his remove." (Ibid., 117.) It is not known that he finally accepted this loan, but it certainly seems apparent that he gathered a body of men to train, preparatory to an Indian attack. Capt. Patrick of Greenwich, had sworn allegiance to the Dutch, and as an inhabitant of that place had been killed by the Indians, a force was sent from New Amsterdam in search of the slayers. They were unsuccessful and marched to the home of Capt. Underhill in Stamford, where one of them after an argument with Capt. Patrick drew a pistol and shot him. Shortly after, a conspiracy among the Indians to slaughter both Dutch and English became known and the rumor not losing ground as time went on, the combined forces under Underhill marched on Hempstead, where a division was made, he having fourteen men to attack one Indian village. Each division returned successful, killing over one hundred Indians. On his return to Stamford, he was informed of a large Indian encampment near Greenwich, and journeying to New Amsterdam, advised an immediate attack.²

The New York Colonial Manuscripts, Vol. 1, pp. 186/7, by Brodhead, states that it was resolved to send one hundred and twenty men against the Indians, "the Burgher's in their company and the English under Sergeant Major van der Hyl." (Capt. John (in note), who later is called "General van der Hill," and he styled himself "General" in the Spicer conveyance, mentioned later in this article.) This Dutch minute may refer to the fight at Hempstead. However, in February, 1644, they left New Amsterdam and attacked the Indians in their encampment near Greenwich, killing fully five hundred of them and destroying their homes by fire, taking very few prisoners, and numbering only fifteen wounded among their own men. As the result of this engagement John Fiske states that "it would not be extravagant to call John Underhill the savior of New Netherland."²

After a short period of rest at Stamford, they returned to New Amsterdam, where upon their arrival "a Thanksgiving was proclaimed," which probably was the cause of the following depositions being taken before Cornelis Van Tienhoven, Secretary of New Netherland: Appeared (???) (Nicolaes Coorn, aged about 38 years), Hans Kierstede aged about 32 years, (Jan Jacobsen) aged about 30 years, Gysbert Opdyc aged 37 years, who conjointly at the request of Cornelis Van Der Hoykens, Fiscal, attest, witness and declare, in place and stead of solemn oath, if need be and at request, that they on the 15th of this (month) were invited in the evening with their wives to the public tavern of Philip Gerritsen, the landlord, where about one hour after the meal Jan Onderhil entered with his lieutenant Bacxter and his drummer, to whom the aforesaid Philip Gerritsen said: "Friends, I have invited these persons here with their wives. For that reason I beg you to withdraw into another room, where you may purchase wine." This they finally did after many words. A little after their withdrawal the said Jan Onderhil and his company (among whom Tomas Willet had likewise come in) came out and begged our witnesses that they have a drink with them; which was done. Then George Bacxter at the order of Onderhil came and asked that Opdyc be

pleased to come in with them, which he refused to do. Thereupon Onderhil and his company came into the tavern to the mugs that hung upon the wall, struck them down with unsheathed swords, as appears by the evidence, stopped and hacked them away and stuck them into posts and doors, and with their unsheathed swords in their hands they came into the room where the invited guests were. This the guards could not prevent. The guard resisted for a time holding closed the door. But finally Jan Onderhil and his aforesaid company by hook or by crook came into the room, where after using many words Captain Onderhil, his sword in his right hand and the scabbard in the left hand, the blade bared about one foot from the scabbard, said to the minister, as it is reported: "Go away from here or I cut you into a hundred pieces." Presently a number of English soldiers came to his assistance, whereupon the aforesaid Onderhil showed great insolence with his company. Then the Fiscal and the watch were summoned, upon whose arrival the English and the aforesaid Onderhil were compelled to retire, saying to the minister: "Let the director come hither. That is good. I should rather talk to a wise man than to a devil."(*) And so in order to avoid further and greater harm, even an outpouring of blood, our good company left unseasonably. This we declare to be the truth. Done the 17th of March, in the year 1644, in Fort Amsterdam. Jan Jacobsen, Nicolaes Koren, Gysbert Opdyck, Hans Kierstede. (New York Colonial Manuscript, 2, 101, b) (*) This witnesses say they did not hear.²

It is probably about this time also that Director Kieft presented Underhill with the land on Manhattan Island, the ground-brief of which has not been found. He never returned to Stamford, Conn., to reside, but must have permanently left shortly after April 16, 1644, when he met many Indian chiefs in conference there (Dutch Manuscripts, p. 88), who solicited him to sue for peace in their names, to which he agreed on condition "that they in future keep quiet." At a court proceeding in New Amsterdam on May 25, 1644, his absence is noted but the court "expects his return." The Dutch Manuscripts also state that on June 6, 1644, he was a referee in New Amsterdam in a case of Henry Sately against Adam Mot for debt; that on Nov. 26, 1644, he was a referee with Isaac Allerton in a difference "between Moor and Wedderly respecting a bark" and that on March 21, 1645, another court case was referred to him.²

The Register of New Netherland, 1626-1674, by O'Callaghan, page 15, states that on May 24, 1645, John Underhill was elected a member of the Council of New Amsterdam. This Council body acted in a twofold capacity: as an Executive Council and as a Court of Justice. The members could not be sued before, and were not amendable to, a Court of inferior jurisdiction. (Ibid., p. 11.)²

During the same year he became one of the eight men who were elected to adopt measures against the Indians. Five was a quorum and these delegates met every Saturday for deliberation. (Ibid., pp. 53, 54.) All of the above notes prove conclusively that Capt. John Underhill had established his home and was residing in New Amsterdam during the periods stated. His property on Manhattan Island, which was without doubt the location of his home, is mentioned in the Calendar of Historical Manuscripts, Part 1, Dutch, 1630-1644, page 49, and reads in the original entry still extant in Albany, N. Y., as follows: Power of Att'y. Cornelis Groesens to Cornelis Melyn, to demand from the director and council a ground brief of a certain lot of land sold to him by John Underhill and situated on the Island of Manhattan and to sell the same. Appeared before me, Cornelis Van Tienhoven, Sec'y of New Netherland, Cornelis Groesen, supercargo on the "Power of Enckhuysen," for the purpose of ordering and demanding in his client's name, the ground brief from the Director and Council for a certain piece of land, sold by Jan Onderhill to the aforesaid Groesen, situate upon the Island of Manhatans, that he may dispose thereof in full accordance with the order of the aforesaid Groesen, as though he himself were present, and pay the price according to the bill of sale. Done the 20th of Sept., 1644. The sales price amounts to two hundred guildens to be paid through Cornelis Melyn to Jan Underhill, viz., twenty-five guildens at once and the balance in May next, 1645. Cornelis Groesens. William DeKey, Witness. Adriaen Van Tienhoven, Witness.²

That Capt. John Underhill contemplated a removal to now Long Island is evidenced by the fact that on May 14, 1646, Director Kieft "has given and granted to Capt. John Onderhill, a small Island, formerly called Meutelaer's Island, separated from Long Island by two kills, containing about 50 morgens besides the meadows, which are granted to said Onderhill with said small Island, etc." Dated as above at New Amsterdam. (Documents relating to the Colonial History of the State of New York, Vol. 14, p. 66, and Dutch Manuscripts, p. 371.) He certainly resided there for he sued John Jones on a contract to serve him until the end of haying and he also sued Sgt. Huybert for the hiring of said Jones and on Dec. 22, 1647, he wrote John Winthrop from Flatlands and mentioned his wife and daughter, who must have been Deborah, as stated in his list of children. He also asked for a pear tree and one or two plum trees, indicating that he expected to become a permanent resident of that place, but on April 27, 1648, he was appointed Sheriff of Flushing (by Director Stuyvesant and his Council at a meeting held by them in New Amsterdam) "for the assured peace and unity of the said village." (New York Colonial Manuscripts, Vol. 4, p. 382.) He held that position as late as Aug. 24, 1651, when he wrote Stuyvesant and the Register of New Netherland, 1626-1674, page 88, states he was elected a Magistrate at Flushing in 1651 and was certainly serving as such in April, 1652. (Colonial History, New York, Vol. 14, p. 177.)²

Owing to the destruction by fire in 1789 of the Town Clerk's home in Flushing, where the records were kept, it is impossible to gather information concerning Underhill or the location of his property, if he had any, but it was while he was residing there that he sold his Flatlands property to Thomas Spicer, the original conveyance being at the bottom of a copy of a deed wherein the Indians sold the same property to Spicer July 20, 1652....The Island recorded in it as "Metler's" was later known as Bergen's Island but when patented to Capt. John in 1646, was described as "Meutelaer's Island."²

In 1653 John Underhill was arrested by the Dutch at his home in Flushing and imprisoned in Fort Amsterdam, for hoisting the Parliament Colors and addressing a so-called seditious paper to the people of Long Island, after hearing of contemplated war between the Dutch and the English. He wrote among other grievances that, "this great autocracy and tyranny is too grievous for any good Englishman or brave Christian to bear." The charges against him were dismissed and shortly after he left for Newport, R. I., where, in a letter to the Commissioners of the United Colonies, he had offered his services in the "common cause of England against the Dutch." On the very day his offer was received, May 19, 1653, it was agreed by the General Assembly of Rhode Island that it was necessary to defend themselves and they gave Capt. John Underhill and Capt. William Dyre full power and authority to take all Dutch ships and vessels that should come into their territory and the Assembly further resolved that Capt. Underhill be constituted Commander-in-Chief on land and Capt. William Dyre Commander at sea.²

Support from all the Colonies was not forthcoming and Newport could provide but little, but Underhill thought of the isolated Dutch post between Saybrook and Hartford, known in 1653 as The House of Hope, which had been fortified by Director Kieft in 1641. It being owned by the Dutch, hampered the development of Hartford and on June 27, 1653, Capt. Underhill seized it for the English, with permission from the General Court of Hartford. This fort he finally sold, excepting "the State's part" and this sale annoyed him in many ways for practically the remainder of his life.²

Peace with the Dutch was declared in July, 1654, and probabilities are that when he left Flushing he established his home in Southold, L. I., for on June 10, 1653, he and Capt. John Young, a Southold man, sailed for Boston, although he made deposition in Easthampton, L. I., Oct. 18, 1653, he certainly was residing in Southold in March, 1654, when he sought advice from the New Haven Colony, under whose jurisdiction Southold then was; also at a testimony, given in Huntington, L. I., in 1665, when he styled himself High Constable of Oyster Bay, he stated he was living in Southold in 1654. On April 12, 1656, he wrote John Winthrop from Southold, asking him to prescribe for his wife, as Winthrop at times administered to the sick. He said, "she daily continues in great pain, receiving last year a pain in her back with lifting a heavy stone and daily increases her pain and descends into her left leg so that she cannot turn in bed, nor go upright by day." In the same letter he wrote "I was late at Flushing. Hannah Feke is to be married to a verri jentiele young man of gud abilitie, of a lovli fetture and gud behafior." Capt. John's second wife was a sister of the above Hannah, who married John Bowne, the young man referred to.³

After the death of his wife Helena, in Southold, between Jan. 1 and Aug. 19, 1658, he sold his property there (which he had registered Jan. 12, 1658) to Thomas Moore, on April 1, 1659. The deed of the sale is evidently not recorded but when Moore made it over to his son Thomas Moore he states: "Thomas More, mariner of Southold, purchased of Capt. John Underhill, some tyme an Inhabitant in Southold, for the consideration of Twenty and nine pounds to him payed: All that his dwelling house scituate in Southold, together with the Barne, orchard, Garden, home lott and fence thereof and all other outland meadows, marshes, woodlands, commons and common pasture, etc. . . . belonging to said John Underhill . . . as per by his deed under his hand and seal bearing date the first day of Aprill in the yeare, One thousand, six hundred fiftye and nine." The deed describing the above is dated Feb. 16, 1662, and was recorded in Southold, March 19, 1679/80. (Printed Town Records of Southold, Vol. 1, pp. 182-184.)²

The first town records of Southold are lost, but on Jan. 12, 1658, Capt. John Underhill's property there is recorded as follows: Four acres more or less, the land of John Conckelyne on the east and Joseph Youngs, Jr., on the west; three acres of meadow, more or less, in the east end of the old field next the fence with a little Island therein; one acre and a half of land in the same field, lying next the South sea; six acres in the Neck adjoining Toms Creek, more or less, William Wells north, William Purrier, south; nine acres of Woodland in the Hogneck (???)?; one-half of the meadow being four acres and one-half adjoining the meadows of William Purrier, lying near the old cellar, running towards a spring in the head of the Creek; one acre and a half of land in the Old field adjoining the south beach. (Ibid., pp. 75, 77, 78.)²

Before January, 1659, he had married the second time and as per a petition presented to the General Court in Connecticut by the inhabitants of the plantation at Cromwell's Bay, as follows, he considered that place his home, prior to its date. "Cromwell Bay, alis Setauke, August ye 6, 1659."Signed by John Underhill, Richard Wodhull, Roger Cheston, John Jenner, William Frost, Thomas Harlow, James Coke, Johon Diar, Edward Rous, Thomas (???) ?, Thomas Mabbes, George Wood, Henry Rogers, Robert Acrely. "These in the name of the rest." (Colonial Records of Connecticut, 1636-1665, p. 341.)²

On Oct. 6, 1659, "Cromwell Bay" was received under the government of Connecticut, and the inhabitants of Setauket were invited to attend the next sitting of the Commissioners at New Haven and, "if they think meet, to act for and in their own behalf in ye premises." (Ibid., p. 40-1.)²

Just when Capt. John Underhill located in Oyster Bay is not definitely known, but it is claimed by some that he was there as early as 1661. Unfortunately the first land record there mentioning him is undated. He was to have ten acres between Nicholas Wright's land by the way to Hempstead and the Highway. It was to be 80 poles long and 20 broad. (Oyster Bay Town Records, Vol. 1, p. 7.) Whether this refers to the "House-lot," etc., mentioned under John, Jr., dated 25 of 1st month, 1663/4, is difficult of determination.²

On March 1, 1664/5, he was appointed a delegate from Oyster Bay to the Convention held in Hempstead, where a body of laws and ordinances for the future government of the Province was promulgated. They were commonly known as the "Duke's Laws," a copy of which was furnished each delegate to be filed in the clerk's offices of the several counties. They continued the laws of the colony until October, 1683. (Colonial History, State of New York, Vol. 14, p. 565; Thompson's History of Long Island (1839), p. 101.) On April 22, 1665, he was appointed Surveyor of Customs for Long Island (Colonial History, State of New York, Vol. 14, p. 567), and was holding that office on April 9, 1666. (Ibid., p. 576.)²

The following year he was appointed by "His Highness, the Duke of York," High Constable and Under Sheriff of the North Riding of Yorkshire on Long Island, with full power and authority to execute all laws made for good government in the Duke's territory. All other persons within the said Riding charged and required to take notice thereof. He was also to take the oaths of the Constables and Overseers of the town of Oyster Bay. (Dept. of State, Albany, Deeds, 2, page 16.)²

Governor Richard Nicolls, having received a petition from the Matinecock Indians complaining of the "wrong done them by the inhabitants by keeping their land from them without giving them satisfaction," appointed John Underhill of Oyster Bay Attorney for the Indians, Sept. 21, 1666. (Colonial History of the State of New York, Vol. 14, p. 589.)²

Capt. John Underhill made his will in Killingworth, L. I., "ye 7th month called, ye 12th day," 1671, and after quite a lengthy religious preamble, expresses his wishes as follows: "Shall Decently be Entered. I bequeath my whole Estate In possession of my wife Elizabeth Underhill During ye Time of her widowhood but if she Marry then my Brother John Bound, Henry Townsend, mathew pryer and my Son John Underhill, I impower hereby that they See to ye Estate that ye Children be not wronged nor Turned of with out Some proportionable allowance as ye Estate will afford and that my Son Nathaniel, Be remaining with his mother Untill Twenty one Years. I will that an Inheritance of Land and Some meadow as my Said Overseers Shall Judge Equal and Right be Confirmed upon him and his Linual Heirs and that no part of my Land be alinated from my present of spring. Signed Sealed as afore Said In presents of Henry Rudick, Nathan Birdsall ye 18th September 1671 Day and date above written. Me, John Underhill." This will was witnessed by Christopher Hawkhurst, William Simson and James

Cock. (Town Records of Oyster Bay, Vol. 1, page 78)²

The original of the following document showing John, Jr., as administrator of his father's estate is owned by the Long Island Historical Society of Brooklyn, N. Y.: "Edmond Andros, Esq., Seigneur of Sausmarez, Lieut. and Governor Gen'all under his Royall Highness, James, Duke of Yorke and Albany, &c., of all his Territory in America. Whereas Capt. John Underhill, late of Killingworth, within the Jurisdiction of Oyster Bay, in the North Riding of Yorksh upon Long Island, did in his last Will and Testament, bequeath his whole Estate, unto Elizabeth his wife, during the time of her Widdowhood, But in Case of her remarriage did nominate and appoint his Eldest sonn John Underhill with others to bee Trustees of his Estate, for the use of his Children as in the said Will is sett forth; And the said Elizabeth, being since likewise deceased--Intestate, without any dispoicion of the said Estate, These presents ay Certifie and Declare, That the aforementioned John Underhill, the eldest son and nearest of kin to the Testator, is admitted and Confirmed, to all intents and purposes, Administrator of the Goods and Chattels, of whatever nature or kinde so ever, heretofore belonging, or in any wise appertaining to his father, Capt. John Underhill, deceased...New York, this 4th day of November, in the 27th year of his Majesty's Reign, Anno Dom. 1675. E. Andros.²

Capt. John Underhill was buried in what is now known as The Underhill Burying Ground, in Locust Valley, L.I., said ground being a part of the 150 acres conveyed to him in 1667 by the Matinecock Indians. He was probably the first to be buried in it.²

Being a Friend, John Underhill in the 10th month, 1676, refused to train or to work on the fort in Oyster Bay, and the authorities, represented by Edward French, Sgt., "took by violence from him" a heifer, which was appraised at two pounds. th mo., 1681, subscriptions for repairing the Meeting House to be paid to John Underhill and another; 30 of 6 mo., 1685, he was appointed overseer or Trustee of the Meeting in place of John Dickinson, "in behalf of the burying place and Meeting House in Oyster Bay; 13, 8 mo., 1685, Matthew Prier and Henry Willis to see that a deed of assignment from Samuel Andrews and Isaac Horner be made and assigned unto John Underhill and John Feake and Richard Wilits, before they go from here."¹

The Quarterly Meetings on 30, 6, 1690; 29, 6, 1691, and 27, 6, 1692, were held at the home of John Underhill in Matinecock and on 26, 6 mo., 1693, at the home of Marie (Mary) Underhill, thus showing John and Mary lived in the neighborhood known as Matinecock at that period.

John Underhill made his will 15 day, 10 mo., 1692, and the Friends' Records state that "John Underhill of Matinecock dyed ye 28 day of ye 10 month, 1692." After the usual preliminaries in the opening part of his will, he devises his land lying at Cedar Swamp to his two eldest sons, John and Daniel, to be equally divided between them, "my wife having during her life and for the bringing up of her familie what she standeth in need for to make use of and if either of my said sons John or Daniel happen to dy without Issue that then their part, so deceasing, shall be equally devided among my surviving sons." "Item. I give to my two sons Samuel and Abraham all my land in West Jersey. Item, I give to my son Jacob all my homestead and Settlement that I now live upon together with my lands lying in Matinecoke that forty acres lying by John Cock excepted, which I give to my wife to sell or dispose of as she thinks good. I also give to my son Jacob all my meadow that lyeth adjoining to my said homestead for him to enjoy both land and

meadow after my wife's decease he paying what legacy my wife and the overseers of this my will shall think good for him to pay to my two sons Samuel and Abraham that enjoy my lands in the new Countray alias West Jersey. Item. I give to my two eldest sons John and Daniel all the Rest of my meadow but what is already given to my son Jacob, and also give to my said two eldest sons my two Rights of Commons in the new purchase. And if it should happen that either of my sons Samuel or Abraham happen to dy without issue that then his part so deceasing shall not be divided amongst my sons, butt his brother that enjoys the other half of my land in West Jersey shall enjoy his deceased brother's part. Item. I give to my four daughters Mary and Deborah, Sarah and Hanah all the rest of my moveable estate with negers and my right of land at Hog Island but so that my wife shall be wholle and sole executor of this my last will and shall have the whole estate belonging to the four girls in her hands and for her use to live upon and bring up her familie and for her my said wife to and with the approbations and consent of the overseers of this my will to sell and make sale of the said land negros or stok and improve the said money for her use and necessity and what remains of the said land money negros or stok my wife and the said overseers of this my will shall deliver in equal proportion to my said daughters as they are disposed of in marriage. And I do hereby Institute and Appoint my three trustie and well beloved friends, John Feeks, John Deusbury and Richard Willett to be the overseers of this my last will to see it performed and Impower them to act and do as fully and amply as need requireth to and with my wife toward the performance of the same and also if any of my overseers happen to dy I do impower the survivors together with my wife to choose whom they shall see good Instead of the deceased. In witness whereof I have sett my hand and Seale this fifteenth day of the tenth month 1692. John Underhill." Signed and sealed in the presence of us, Hendry Wylles, Nathaniel Birdsall, Caleb Wright, John Williams. Proved May 18, 1693, at Jamaica, L. I., and is recorded there in Book A. of Deeds, pp. 80, 81.

The Calendar of New Jersey Records, 1664-1703, p. 356, shows that on Nov. 6, 1683, there was surveyed for John Underhill 500 acres by the brook below Spring Hill, between Samuel Borden and Samuel Andrews, but there is nothing to show that his sons Samuel and Abraham ever went there to reside.

The disposition of the realty as named in the will of John Underhill, Jr., according to George W. Cocks in 1901, seems not to have been made as indicated therein, as John the 3rd and Samuel occupied the Cedar Swamp plantation, John taking the eastern part now occupied (1901) by the family of the late Richard Underhill and Daniel the western part. Daniel and Abraham were settled at or near Suscoe's Wigwam, in Beaver Swamp Hollow, which they probably called Wolverhampton. The name, however, was short lived, surviving only in a partly mutilated form as Wolver Hollow, and has since been changed to Brookville.

Nathaniel Underhill in 1729 was treasurer and one of the trustees of St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Westchester and is named in its Royal Charter, dated Dec. 2, 1762.

31 Oct 1740 (Westchester Co. Land Records, Liber G, p. 264) -- This indenture witnesseth that, Whereas my father-in-law, Robert Noble, late of Westchester, cordwainer, dec'd did purchase of my brother-in-law Joseph Appelby of sd. County, yeoman, land in Westchester...which land upon ye decease of ye sd. Robert Noble, did descend to my wife Elizabeth, his heiress at law, on reserving his wife, my mother-in-law's right during her life; who being also deceased, ye property and right thereof

is now solely vested in my sd. wife. Now Know Ye, Tht I, Thomas Johnson of Westchester, and Elizabeth my wife, dau. of ye abovesaid Robert Noble...sold the same to Nathaniel Underhill 31 Oct 1740. I, Joseph Appleby of Westchester Co. within named half brother to within named Elizabeth Johnson, and eldest brother and heir at law to my brother, Nathan Appleby, late dec'd, do release and confirm unto ye within named Nathaniel Underhill all right and title whatsoever that I or my heirs now have or ought to have.¹

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Nathaniel Underhill, of the Boroughtown of Westchester, Esq., being in good health. All debts to be duly paid. I leave to my wife Mary one good feather bed, and furniture, and one looking Glass, "now hanging in my new room," and 6 chairs, one table in my new room, and all my table cloths and napkins, and my riding chair and horse; Also the use of any room in my house, during her life or widowhood; Also £25 a year, and the use of a negro man "Pine," and her fire-wood and liberty to keep a cow and a horse. I leave to my son, Israel Underhill, all my houses and lands and a æ25 right in the Sheep Pasture, which I bought of William Faske (?). I also leave him a bed, and a great tub and my clock. And he is to pay to my son, Bartow Underhill, £500, and to my grandson, Gilbert Drake, son of my daughter, Elizabeth Drake, £50, when of age, and to my grandson, Nathaniel Drake, £50, and to my granddaughter, Frances Drake, £50, when 18. And he shall also pay to my grandchildren, the children of my daughter Purdy, £100 between them. "And my son Israel shall allow and set apart a piece of ground 4 rods square, lying in the field, called Hedden field, for a burying ground for myself and family forever, and I do except and reserve the same as I have showed him, and do order him and his to grant the liberty to pass and repass through my farm to the same." I also leave him three negro slaves I leave to my daughter Mary, wife of Doctor Nicholas Bayley, £200. I leave to my son Nathaniel £200, and £300 which he owes me. I leave to my daughter Helena, wife of James Morgan, £200. I leave to my daughter, Sarah Hyatt, all the money due to me from Elisha Hyatt's estate. I leave to the heirs of my son John £50. To my granddaughter Mary, wife of John Buckbee, £10. To my son Israel all farming utensils. My executors are to sell the rest of movable estate. (Revolutionary Papers, 1763-1789, in State Library at Hartford, Conn., Book 1, p. 436-a, also states Nathaniel arrested as Loyalist.) He made his will March 29, 1783, which was proven Feb. 13, 1784, and is recorded in New York Published Wills, Vol. 12, pp. 182, 183. He divided his lands in Westchester and elsewhere equally between Thomas McLeroth and Anthony Lispernard Underhill, "son of my brother Israel." He also gave the said Thomas one-half of his household furniture, a negro woman and her child and one-half of his sloop Tamer, but in consideration of these bequests, "said Thomas must pay Nathaniel's sisters, Helena Morgan and Mary Bayley, certain sums." To his nephew, Anthony Lispernard Underhill, he bequeaths three negro men slaves, with all stock of cattle, horses, etc., but he is to pay "my brother Bartow" 500 pounds, and "my nephew Nathaniel, son of John," 200 pounds; a negro girl to Glorianna Underhill; to Sarah, wife of Samuel Embree, 100 pounds; to Mary, widow of John Bugbee, 50 pounds; to Amelia Wright, daughter of Obadiah Purdy, and to Charity Dally, daughter of Joshua Hunt, 25 pounds each; to John and Benjamin Underhill, sons of John, and to nephews, Obadiah and Joseph Purdy, 50 pounds each; negro slaves Abraham, Phyllis and Peggy, their freedom; codicil not dated, mentions Gilbert Drake, son of sister Elizabeth, and Anner, daughter of brother John, and requests that the slave Peggy, to whom he had willed her freedom, be sold instead for behaving "contrary to the rule of a good servant."

He removed to Canada, where he was listed as living in Maugerville, County of Sunbury, New Brunswick with another Nathaniel.

Nathaniel Underhill as a Loyalist was captured by a company of men, headed by Isaac Martlingh as leader, and hung up by his feet in a barn and made to eat oats off the floor. They abused him otherwise and he vowed he would shoot them if he ever had a chance and later meeting Martlingh he kept his word. The American Loyalists in the Manuscript Room in the New York Public Library, Vol. 19, page 187, In the Sleepy Hollow Cemetery in Tarrytown, N. Y., may be seen a gravestone with the following inscription: "In memory of Isaac Martlingh/who was inhumanly/slain by Nathaniel Underhill/May 26, A. D. 1779/in the 39th year of his age."

Walter Underhill was a member of the Board of Managers of the Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents (House of Refuge), 1845 to 1866, and Treasurer and Vice-President of same, 1857-1866, and for the last thirteen years of his life President of the Mechanics and Traders Insurance Company of New York City. He was a representative to the 31st Congress from New York City.

Walter Underhill of New York City, made his will there, May 22, 1860, which was proven Oct. 24, 1866, and is recorded in New York, Liber (old) 167, p. 48. He mentions: wife, Mary M.; son, Walter M.; daughters, Annie E. Underhill, Mary S. Trimble, Lydia G. Lawrence. Executors: son, Walter M., and sons-in-law, Merritt Trimble and Henry E. Lawrence.
