

-- VAN BRUGH, VERBRUGGE --

The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolvement of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

He was an Englishman, called Charles Bridges, who visited New Amsterdam as supercargo of the ship *White Raven*, coming from the West Indies in 1639, and in 1644 he was appointed Member of the Council and Storekeeper in Curacao, where he was first called Carel van Brugge. He came to New Netherland with Stuyvesant in May 1647, was made Commissary at Fort Orange November 1647, Commissary of the Provincial Accounts in 1651 and Provincial Secretary and ex officio Venuemaster in 1652. He held this office until November 1653, and appears in various official positions during the next years. When the English took New Netherland he resumed his English name, appearing under it as one of the patentees of Flushing. With the return of the Dutch in 1673, he became again Carel van Brugge and was appointed Clerk of the English Towns on L.I., now Queens Co., residing at Flushing, where he died in August 1682. His wife was Sarah, dau. of Thomas Cornell of Westchester, often called Cornelis, and widow of Thomas Willett of Bristol, England. She survived him and married subse-

quently John Lawrence. Jr., of Flushing, L.I.--E. O'C.¹

In the marriage record they were: Carel Ver Brugge, j.m. Van Cantelburg, en Sara Cornelis, Wede. Van Thomas Welert.

In their will, they wrote: Charles Bridges, of Flushing. "I Charles Bridges, and Sarah his wife, taking into consideration their great and decaying age, and knowing that the hour of death is near, and not willing to depart this world before having disposed of their worldly goods." We leaving unto our son Thomas Willett one half of our land lying in Newtons neck, as by deed of gift may appear, the rest shall remain for us and the survivor. If I come to depart first, my brother Thomas Bridges is to have (???) Pounds, the rest to remain as above written. "This will was written by said Charles Bridges, intending to sign it, but by a sudden change and departure from this life was prevented. The same was found after his decease, all of his own handwriting, but not signed or sealed. But being produced before the Governor and Council, several persons of good faith and credit, stated that some short time before his death they heard him say that he had made his will, to the effect of the said writing." It was allowed and proved August 28, 1682, and Letters of administration were granted to his wife Sarah Bridges.

John Lawrence, Jr., being sworn says: That in or about June or July last, being in discourse with Mr. Charles Bridges, between the Town of Flushing and his house, walking to the Town, the said Charles Bridges said, that he had arranged it as his will, that the longest liver of him or his wife should take all the estate, only he intended a small legacy to his brother Thomas, about four or five pounds. And that the will produced is in the said Bridges hand.

John Smith, Rock, being sworn says: That about the beginning of July last, being in company with Charles Bridges at his house, and walking in the yard, he the said Bridges told him that his wife and he had concluded to keep what they had as long as they lived, and that when either died, the longest liver to have all.

Myndert Courters sworn, says: That on the 13th June last, he being in discourse with Charles Bridges of Flushing, he heard him say, that he had made his will, so that the one that lived longest of himself or his wife, should have all the estate, and that the will produced was in his handwriting.

In the (1) marriage record, they were: Gielis Jansz., bachelor, of Haarlem living in Begynestraet, with Janneken Setten, spinster, also of Haarlem, living in Gierstreet."

On 3 Jul 1635, Gillis Verbrugge and Janke Sette, his wife, made their joint will.

In the (2) marriage record, they were: Gillis Jansz Verbrugge and Geertruy de Pon, widow of Gillis Reyniers living at the Hague.

On the 19th of May, 1650, Gillis and Geertruy du Pond drew up their marriage settlement.

Gillis was still living in June 1664 when his niece, Barbara van Brugh, named him in her will (Archives of Haarlem, Protocol of Notary J. Schont, Inventory 20151, fol 142.) It is thought that Gillis died shortly thereafter. This niece, Barbara van Brugh, was the daughter of Gillis' brother Pieter who was married to Helena Pottai.

Johannes was a prominent merchant and magistrate in New Amsterdam. He was one of 3 Burgomasters of New Orange (NYC), under the brief Dutch restoration, and served in the Common Council, under the English. Capt, NY Militia. Their house was valued at \$15,000, in 1674, Class 1, at Pearl St, between Wall and William Sts.

In his will, he wrote: Johanes Van Brugh, New York, "Merchant," "Being weake in body," leaves to wife Catherine for life or during widowhood, all estate real and personal. But she is not to sell without the consent of the children, or the greater part of them, and he makes her sole executor. "And whereas our daughter Elizabeth Rodenbergh, now wife of John Donaldson of New Castle in Delaware, has due unto her out of my estate the like proportion as her sister Lucretia Rodenbergh has received in full of her proportion of the estate of her father Lucas Rodenbergh, the executor is directed to pay the same, to be paid according to the terms of a marriage settlement made between the said John Donaldson and Elizabeth his wife, February 24, 1691/2. And whereas I have purchased for my son Peter, a tract of land on Delaware river next to the land of John Donaldson, the same is left to him. He also leaves him £5 "in consideration that he is my first born son." After his wife's decease the property is to go to the children, Elizabeth Donaldson "my wife's daughter by a former husband," Helena, wife of Teunis DeKay, Anne, wife of Andrew Gravenraedt, Peter, Catharine, wife of Henry Rensellaer, Johanes, and Mary wife of Stephen Richards. (No witnesses.) Proved (???), 1699.

In the NYC Ref Ch record of their marriage, they were: Johannes Van Brug, j.m. Van N. Yorck, en Margareta Provoost, j.d. Van N. Yorck, beyde woonende alhier.

In his will, he wrote: November 14, 1705. I, Johanes Van Brugh, of New York, mariner, being in good health. I make my wife Martha executor, with full power to sell all estate for payment of debts, and to maintain her and my children. If my wife shall marry, then before matrimony an inventory of my whole estate shall be taken, and 1/2 shall remain to her use and 1/2 to my children. My son Johanes shall have for his being my eldest son, the sum of £5, before any division, and then to share with the rest of my children, Johana and Catharine. I make my brothers, Peter Van Brugh and David Provoost, Jr., executors. Witnesses, Barent Rynders, Leendert Hugge de Kleyn, Joris Alsworth. Proved, April 27, 1727.
