The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolution of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

I welcome, and would be grateful for, any additions or corrections, especially with source citations.

In the marriage record they were: Dirck Janszen Van der Clyff, j. m. Van Alphen, en Geesje Hendricks, j. d. Van N. Yorke. Dirck Van der Cliff and his wife Geesie owned property outside the Wall that was called "Smith's Fly" or "Smit's Vlie" which was purchased from Hendrick Rycken on 9 August 1681. A description of the property and farm is given by J. H Innis in "New Amsterdam and Its People" with the probability that it was a place of resort, and that a tavern was operated there. Indeed, in 1686, Geesje and her husband were living "outside the Wall" according to the Domine Henricus Selyns Membership

List of the New York Reformed Dutch Church. Dirck van der Cliff was an attorney or arbitrator of note in New York, and represented clients in the Courts, and gave power of attorney to his "trustworthy friend" John Tuder on 25 April 1681. On 13 October 1684, Dirck Van der Cliff was chosen or elected assessor of the City, and elected Assistant Alderman on 14 October 1687. Dirck Van der Cliff was part owner (with Dirck Smith) of the sloop "New York" as evidenced by a suit initiated by Nicholas Bayard against them. In his will, Dirck Smith (Van de Venter) appointed Dirck Van der Cliff and Peter Stoutenburgh as overseers and guardians of his son Jan Dirks, a minor. When things were not going well, they appealed to the Court for an order and guidance. As a burgher or inhabitant of New Amsterdam, on 19 April 1665, he was taxed a total of 18 fl. for the quartering of soldiers while living on "The Cingel or the City Wall." He worked closely, in several cases, with Jacob Leisler and was instrumental in settling the estate of his sister-in-law, Grietje Hendricks, the widow of Cornelius Dircksen (Van Wensveen).²

They were the owners of the farm on the north side of Maiden Lane in New York, and through which Gold street and Cliff street were laid out. On this tract Dirck Van der Cliff had an orchard and house of entertainment, which seems to have been a popular resort.

To the Worshipful Mayor's Court. Dirck Van Der Cliff, Plaintiff, against Mr. Jacob Abramse and Mr. Jan Harpendinck "and their adherents." He demands payment "for two calves of one year old Which two months past did dye in ye night very miserable, and found early in ye morning, first by Adrien ye Bastard, who did wonder, seeing ye said Calves lying there dead, having seen them ye night before in that way called the Magde Paige, in health and well eating, but in the morning saw them dead, in ye same place, about two or three steps one from ye other. Therefore it is ye opinion of ye Plaintiff, that ye said Calves did dye of ye Dust of ye Tanned hides, whereon was poisonous Lime, for it seemeth to be so by all circumstances, because the said Calves were very much swollen, and for ye reason that ye Defendants did not shut their tan places, being ye Custom in ye whole World, yt they be kept well shut to hinder such inconveniences. The Plaintiff craves humbly for your Worships to take in serious Consideration ye cause concerning ye neglecting in shutting of ye Tan places, and to make restitution." [Note.--The scene of the above catastrophe was in Maiden Lane. The owner of the "Shoemakers' Pasture" had their Tan vats, etc., at a low place of ground on the north side of the street, about 100 feet west of Gold street.--W. S. P.]

In his will, written 6 May 1678, probated 10 June 1684 New Castle, DE, Dirck Jans Van de Venter (aka Dirck Smith), of New York, mariner, appointed Mr. Dirck Vander Cliff and Mr. Peter Stoutenbergh overseers and guardians of his minor son, John Dircksen, and overseer of his estate.

(Prob) 30 December 1679. To the Worshipful Court of Mayor and Aldermen Shewith with due respect. Peter Stoutenburgh and Dirck Vandercliff, tutors for the under aged son of Dirck Jansen Vandeventer, alias Smith, state that the said Dirck Smith has undertaken to aliment and maintain his said son, with victuals, clothing, and instruction in reading and writing, as by agreement made by Allard Anthony in 1676. But now the said Dirck Smith, assisted with his son in law, Jarvis Marshall, gives notice that he is not able to maintain him any longer. And it is unknown to your petitioners in what manner the boy Jan is maintained by his brother in law, as he saith he is. And that the said Dirck comes with unreasonable and blaming words, and makes demand for the alimentation of his son. They therefore appeal to the Court for an order.

In their joint will, they directed: July 24, 1686, appeared in their own persons, before me, Wm. Bogardus, Notary Public, in New York, admitted by the Rt. Hon. Thomas Dongan, Lieutenant-Governor, &c., and in the presence of the underwritten witnesses, Dirck Van der Clyff and Mrs. Geesie Hendricks, married people, living within this city, well known to me and to the witnesses, and both in good health." The survivor is to have full possession and disposal of all the estate, and is to maintain the children, and they are to be taught "to read and write, and an art or trade by which they may live." He leaves to his son John Dircksen Van der Clyff his sword with a silver handle. Mentions daughter Maria and the "under aged children" (not named). "All this being distinctly read to the testators, they declare it to be their last will and testament." Witnesses, Hans Kierstede, Jacobus Kip. Benjamin Fletcher, Captain-General and Governor, &c. To all, etc. Know ye that at New York the 19th of April, 1694, the will of Dirck Van Der Cliffe, in Dutch, remaining in the Secretary's office, a translation whereof is annexed, was proved, and Geesie Van der Cliffe, the widow, is confirmed as executor.¹

[NOTE.--Dirck Van der Clyff was the owner of a tract of land, bounded south by Maiden lane, north by the Beekman farm, west by the Shoemaker's Pasture and east by the rear of lots fronting on Pearl street. This he bought of Henry Rycken, of Flatbush, August 9, 1681. On this tract he had an house and orchard, and kept a place of entertainment. After his death it was laid out in lots, and streets were opened, namely, Gold street, Orange (now Cliff street), Van Cliff street (now John), and Nassau (now Fulton). Geesie Van der Cliff was one of the three daughters of Hendrick Williams, whose house was on the north corner of Broad and Bridge streets.--W. S. P.]

Jan Van Cleef emigrated in 1653, probably from Cleef in the Netherlands. He was a farmer in Gravesend in 1656 and settled in New Utrecht by 1659, when he became a patentee and a member of the Church, and where he took the oath of allegiance in 1687.

Confusion about the date of Jan & Engeltje's marriage is discussed by Wilson V. Ledley, C.G., in his "The Van Cleef Family". Jan Van Cleef made a statement on 14 February 1664 that at that time he was 36 years old. This would place the date of his birth about 1627 or 1628. He came to New Netherland in 1653 when he was about 25 years old. At the time of their marriage, Jan was about 33, and Engeltje was 15. Ledley comments that the 1681 given as a marriage date by Teunis G. Bergen on page 314 of his "Register of the Early Settlers of Kings County" is a misprint. (This typo has confused a lot of researchers!) Documentation that Ledley is correct is to be found on page 222 of the "Calendar of Dutch Historical Manuscripts", where on 10 March 1661 a petition was filed with the New Amsterdam court by "Laurens Pietersen consenting to the payment of the estate to his daughter Engeltje, recently married to Jan van Cleef" (emphasis mine). According to Ledley Jan van Cleef and Engeltje Laurens had 14 children between 1662 and 1688 (when Engeltje would have been 42).¹

3 Oct 1662 -- Fiscal Nicasius de Sille appears in Court with Jan van Cleef and Titus Cyre stating, that they bought Jacob van Couwenhoven's horse mill and that Titus Cyre sold his share to Jan van Cleef, who sold it to Albert Albertsen Lintwever [Terhune]; on which aforesaid horse mill he paid and disbursed above his just third part the sum of two hundred and ten guilders, and that he and Albert Albersen again sold the mill, as they bought it, according to agreement therefor, to Jacobus Backer, Govert Loockermans, Jacques Cosseau, and Hendrick van de Water, and that the aforesaid Albert Albertzen has given an assignment of four hundred guilders on the abovenamed van de Water, which remarking a fearing, that he should not get his own, he directed the Court Messenger to attach the money, which being done requests the attachment to be declared valid, until it shall be found to whom the most is belonging. The Worsh. Court declares the attachment valid.²

Ledley's revised opinion is that the child Angelica in the list below may be a mistake. Jan van Cleef left no will, and the date of his death is unknown. On 4 March 1701 (Town of Gravesend Vital Records) an "Angelica Van Cleef" married **John Emans, Jr.** Ledley was of the opinion that this "Angelica" could well have been Engeltje Laurens [the widow of Jan van Cleef]. If Ledley is right, Jan and Engeltje had only 13 children, and Engeltje married twice. There is no other marriage for Jan van Cleef of record in New Netherland.¹
