

-- VAN WOGGELUM --

The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolution of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

Jan Pieterse Mackelyck/Gemackelyck/Soogemackelyck, also called Van Woggelum, an innkeeper at Beverwyck, later Albany is first seen on 3 Dec 1652 as a resident of the fort (orange) when he was given permission by the court to tap. The next year he was fined for having tapped after the nine o'clock bell (curfew) and for using abusive language. He purchased a lot in Beverwyck 13 Jan 1655 from Adriaen Dirickse DeVries for f112 plus the f8 patent fee.

In the Brooklyn Ref Ch record of their (1) marriage they were: Jan Pieterszen, young man from Amsterdam, to Stijntje Jans, from Oetmarsem. Witnesses were: Annetie Pieters, grandmother of the bridegroom; Johannes Marcus, stepfather of the bride, Esje Hendricks, mother of the bride.

Jan Pieterse Mackelyck appears on the assessment lists of Brooklyn in 1675 and 1676, but he and Syntje were "of Staten Island" when they had their youngest son, Adriaen bp. at Brooklyn.

On 30 Dec 1680, two patents for land on the north side of Staten Island were issued to "Capn. Cornelis Coursen & Company," the company consisting of Andries Jurianson, Derrick Cornelison [Hooglandt] and John Peterson. This Peterson seems to have been Jan Pieterszen Van Woggelum.

In the Brooklyn Ref Ch record of their (2) marriage they were: Jan Pietersen Mackelick, widower of Stijntje Jans, "born in Amsterdam" to Mrs. Hendrika Strockels, widow of Monsieur Michiel Hamel, "born in Deventer."

Jan Woglum was a member of the New York Colonial Assembly in 1698-9 for Richmond County and John Wooglam, Esq. was a Justice of the Peace for Richmond County.

In his will, he wrote: I, John Wooglam, of the County of Richmond, being in good disposition of body. I leave to my beloved son Adrian, £50, "and my new Northwester" [coat]. I leave to my grand son, Dowe Wooglam, the eldest son of my son John, deceased, my lot of land lying on the north side of Staten Island, fronting to the Kill von Kull, bounded west by the land of the widow Hooglands, east by the lot of Jacob Corsen. Together with the half lot lying in the woods, in the rear of said lot, with all the meadow, houses, orchards and barns. Also all the meadow grounds by me purchased in New Jersey, lying at a certain place called the West Vly, within the bounds of Elizabeth town, and he is to pay to my executors the sum of £260. But he is not to enter into possession until his sister is 15 years of age, unless his mother Blandina should die before his sister comes to that age. But if my grand son Dowe Wooglam should die, then the lands are to go to his brother John Wooglam. I also give to my grand son Dowe, my wearing apparell, and my gun and a copper vessell containing two barrels. I leave to my four grand children, Dowe, John, Christina and Blandina, £250, and 6 pewter dishes, 6 plates, 5 iron pots, a gridiron, 2 flax hetchells, 4 augurs, 24 iron teeth for a harrow, 2 beetle rings, 2 hooks for thatching, cattle and horses, "and one negro man which I paid Samuel Bayard for." I leave to my grand son, John Wooglam, my long gun, and to each of my grand daughters a feather bed. I make my brother Peter, and my son Adrian, executors. Dated March 1, 1717. Witnesses, Mercy Butler, James Simpkins, Augustus Graham. Proved, April 8, 1719.

Blandina's mother, Suster Bous/Bois/Bont, m. (2) Douwe Aukes, for whom Blandina would name her eldest son.

In the 1709 census, John Woglim's household included his widowed father and unmarried brother, his wife "Blandino," sons Dowe, Cornelis and John, and dau. Christine.

In his will, he wrote: I, John Woglim, Jr., of Staten Island, being very sick. I leave to my eldest son, Dave Woglim, my gun and sword. I leave to my wife Blandina all estate and lands during her life. After her decease to my children, Dave, Cornelius, John, Christina, Sytie, and Blandina. My sons Dave or Cornelius may have my lands if they pay £400 to the rest. I make my wife executor. Dated, March 30, 1712. Witnesses, Jacob Courson, Joel Van Pelt, Oswald Foord. Proved, July 22, 1713.

Blandina Viele m. (2) about 1713 **Benjamin Corsen**, son of Cornelius Corsen & Marritje Vandergrift, and brother of Jacob Corsen who had married Blandina's sister Elizabeth. They removed about 1726 to Northampton Twp., Bucks Co., PA; they d. in Bucks Co., PA.

Pieter Adriaensen Van Woggelum was at Fort Orange as early as 3 Dec 1652 when he was given permission by the court to tap. He was an innkeeper at Beverwyck, later Albany. He purchased a lot in Beverwyck on 13 Jan 1655 from Adriaen Dirckse DeVries.

He owned land at Schenectady and was one of its original proprietors, but may never have lived there.

On 15/25 May 1668 Harme Vedder and Pr. Van Waggelen contracted to buy the farm originally of Jan Berentse Wemp alias Poest, in Lubberde's Land on the Poesten Kill in Rensselaerswyck (now part of Troy). In 1675 Wemp's son Myndert sued Pieter for the fourth payment, The deed for this farm, "where the aforesaid Pr. van Waggelen now dwells," was finally recorded 6 May 1679, the seller being Sweer Teunissen van Velsen, who married Wemp's widow, Mary Mynderts.

Pieter Adriaensen Soogemackalyck [Van Woggelum], on 11 Feb 1669 conveyed to this son a lot in Lubberde's Land with part of a garden and fruit trees. Pieter gave up farming 29 April 1682 when he leased his farm, which he called *Woggelum*, in Lubberde's Land, to Andries Albertse Brat. A month later, on 27 May 1682, he purchased a house and lot in Albany, bounded on the east by the Hudson River, from Claes Jansen Stavast (recorded 2 Aug 1684).

By 1683, Pieter was the skipper of the open boat *Unity*, engaged in the transportation of goods between Albany and New York.

He was a Captain of the Albany County Militia in 1690. He moved from Albany to New York City by 1703

In his will, he wrote: 23 day of October, 1724. I, Peter Woglum, of New York, yeomen, being in health of body, I leave to my wife Anna all my estate for life. I leave to Peter Vantooeger Horn [misreading of nephew Pieter van Wogelum], living on Staten Island, my negro boy, called "John," and my gun and silver hilted sword and cane. I leave to Adrian Woglum, my brother's son, and to his wife Zelitie all the rest of my household goods. My negro man John, and my negro woman Mary are to be free after the death of my wife. I make my wife Anna executor. Witnesses, Mattler Hock, Abraham Messier, Peter Merselis. Proved, November 21, 1724, and the widow, Anna Woglum, being dead, Letters of Administration are granted to Adrian Van Woglum and his wife Zelitie.

In his will, he wrote: ...I, Peter Woglom, of Richmond County, March 17, 1762. "My executors shall sell my half of the Boat which I have in partnership with my brother, Andries Woglom, and enough of my movable estate to pay debts and to raise £170." I leave to my daughter Mary £50. To my daughter Ann £50, and a cow and calf and a feather bed, when she is 18. I leave to my daughter Sarah £50 and a bed, when 18. I leave to my wife the use of all the rest of my estate, real and personal, during her widowhood. If she marries she is to have £250, two cows and a bed. After her death I leave all my estate to my son Peter. I leave £20 to my granddaughter, Mary Wood. I make my wife Mary and my son Peter and my trusty brother, John Woglom, executors. Witnesses, Andreas Woglom, Abraham Woglom, Jacob Rezeau. Proved, November 6, 1773.
