

-- VERLET, VARLET --

The family groups represented in this collection may not be complete, because information was entered bit by bit as I found it or happened upon it; I have not done any systematic research on these families. Because they do not compose whole family genealogies, these listings are arranged differently from most genealogical records or histories. Each listing is a family group, and is arranged and filed alphabetically under the name of the head of the family.

Names are generally in alphabetical order (disregarding spelling variations and middle names), then in approx. chronological order. The first sorting is by surname (mixing together any and all spelling variations), then by given name, then by approximate birthdate (when known) in approximate chronological order. For easier reference, surnames in headings are grouped together under the most common spelling usage that evolved in this geographical location, regardless of individualistic spellings in the records themselves. Cross references are used in most cases where surname spellings substantially vary.

Within the quoted records, the individual spellings have been (mostly) retained because they sometimes provide clues (although in general—but with exceptions—they seem to largely reflect the record keeper's particular orthography and not always, at this early period, any special family preference). Those interested can see the variety and evolution of a particular name's spelling and the interesting and sometimes amusing attempts at phonetic reproduction. Keep in mind that before names and spellings were standardized, records reflected the individualistic whim of the particular recorder (often two different spellings of the same name within the same document). In addition, all records were handwritten, and sometimes deciphering a handwritten name in early records can be quite challenging! So expect to search under all possibilities of spelling (for both surnames and given names).

Given names are grouped together without regard for middle initials or middle names. Because middle names and/or initials are sometimes used, sometimes not used in various records, it seemed simplest to arrange entries as if the middle names or initials did not exist. Usually all variations of a given name are grouped together as though spelled one way: Jan, Johannes, John, etc. are all grouped as one (but also look under the other forms).

Sources and references are included with each "family" grouping, but may or may not include sources that are cited (or are obvious, such as baptismal records, etc.) within the narrative or listing itself.

As with any compiled genealogical record, researchers should regard this information as leads and clues, and should verify all data with independent research.

Casper and Judith sold property in Utrecht about 1625 as they were moving to Amsterdam, where he was engaged in the silk business and where he ran a silk mill.

They may have come to America as early as 1633. Jasper Varleet was in CT in Aug 1658 (CT Court Records).

Casper sold his farm before Oct 1661 to his son-in-law Paulus Schrick, who had married his dau. Maria (int. 29 Nov 1658). Stokes (Iconography of Manhattan...) vol 6, pp 107-108 shows by citing later deeds and transfers that this land was near the Fresh Water pond and near land of Wolphert Webber. Daughters Judith and Sarah had an altercation with Wolphert in 1655. (RNA 1:326-327).

- **Judith Verlet**, bp. 8 Nov 1629 Oude Kerk, Amsterdam (wit: Marij Pottij, Joris den Etta); m. banns 23 May 1666 NYC Ref Ch, **Nicholas Bayard**. She was accused of and imprisoned for Witchcraft about 1662 in Hartford, CT.
- **Catherina Verlet** (Catrijna), bp. 2 Sep 1631 Nieuwe Kerk, Amsterdam (wit: Catrijna Hack); buried 17 Oct 1633 Amsterdam.<sup>5</sup>
- **Jacobus Verlet** (Jacus), bp. 24 Nov 1633 Amsterdam (wit: Jacob Jacuss, Dacus Jacket, Sara Stafmakers); buried 22 March 1635 Amsterdam.<sup>5</sup>
- **Catrijna Verlet** (Catherina), bp. 22 Jun 1636 Nieuwe Kerk, Amsterdam (wit: Daniel Verlet, Walberchje Piet[ers]); m. (banns Aug 1657 NYC Ref Ch), **Francoys/Francois Jacobsen de Bruyn/de Bruynne**.

Capt. Nicholas Varlet/Varleth was an officer in the service of the Dutch W.I. Company.

6 Sep 1647 [Amsterdam?] marriage intention of Nicolaes Verlet, from Utrecht, 25 years, assisted by his father Casper Verlet, residing in the Brughstraet; with Susanna Jans, from Amsterdam, 20 years, no parents, assisted by her guardian Gerrit Klerq and her petemoeij [aunt] Jannetie Claes, residing in the Ness. The entry is signed by: N.Varlet and Susanne Jans.<sup>1</sup>

In the (2) marriage record, they were: Nicolaes Verlet, Wedr. Van Susanna Jillis, en Anna Stuyvesant, Wede. Van Samuel Bayarts.

Varleth was one of the chief merchants of New Amsterdam, who sometime prior to October, 1665, left that city and settled permanently in Bergen, New Jersey, where he filled various local offices, and in November, 1666, was appointed a member of Governor Carteret's Council.

Administration on the estate of Capt. Nicholas Verlett, granted to Samuel Edsall and Peter Stoutenburch, 3 July 1675.

Anna Stuyvesant, sister of Gov. Peter Stuyvesant, came to New Amsterdam 11 May 1647 as a widow, with her brother and her three sons.

Anna Stuyvesant Bayard owned 564 acres at Hoboken. Her great grandson, William Bayard had inherited the property, but became a Loyalist and it was confiscated. It was purchased by Col John Stevens (a steamboat inventor), who was Treasurer on Horseback, of the New State of NJ, during the American Revolution.

He was a silk dyer and merchant in Amsterdam. He was one of the shareholders of the West India Company.
